Well gang, November 8th was a hectic day for those of you who took time out to pick a President but you still managed to turn out and support nomination night. We had high attendance and this was necessary to transact the business at hand.

The proposal to create the Vice-President's office as a separate office apart from the Secretary's office was discussed, voted on and approved. The necessary addendums to our Constitution and By-Laws will be so amended. As was pointed out, we now have need for the office to be fully functional rather than ceremonial.

We also found that our By-Laws allowing amendments is a bit too ambiguous. It should be more clearly worded, establishing the size of a quorum, from where the quorum is to be taken and the specific time period when changes or amendments can be made. There are other changes necessary and as a result, we should consider reviewing and updating our Constitution and By-Laws in the coming year.

One area, which I touched upon earlier, is establishing a maximum consecutive year limit for holding any office. The idea at this point has some support, but must be discussed in greater length by the membership. Also reviewing and redefining the duties of the Vice-Presidency, etc.

Regarding nomination night, the whole process went exceptionally smooth compared to some years past. The slate of candidates is excellent. With both Ray Miles and Milt Peacock aspiring to be President, we can't lose no matter how the ballcting goes. This is also-true of the candidates running for the other offices. Because of the quality of our candidates, I feel more comfortable with our coming election than T did with the National election. It will be strange, though, not having Don Nelson on the ballot. Don chose not to run. He has held the Treasurer's office longer than anyone has held an elected office in the history of our club. We are again in his debt for being patient and shouldering the load so long.

Regarding another matter, Ray reported John Owings will not be ready to fly from until the summer of 1990.

We have also been informed that the final plans include a 100 by 300 foot runway and a 90 foot C/L circle is being submitted to the State Environmental Control Dept.

Ray once told me he would like to get at least one flight in at John Cwings before he retired. Well, at this point it will be interesting to see which will occur sooner. With the growth of both South Carroll and WAM it is hard to imagine the local government officials can not see the immediate need for such a facility.

Time brings changes in many ways, even in growth. With new people, we see changes in the type of aircraft flown. One of the wonderful things about our sport is the varied interests. New aircraft are popping up all over the place, Electrics, Floater Powered Sailplanes, Vintage Freeflights converted to RC's etc. It all points to a very interesting future.

Well, it's time to sign off and I look forward to seeing you all at our Finner at Frocks on Tecember 4th. It should be an interesting affair and I'm sure you'll enjoy yourselves.

1. WAM BUSINESS MEETING - NOVEMBER 8, 1988

Thermal Glider-Flys better inside by the stove than outside.



Several small items this month - For those that go to the field often and fly several planes probably find themselves once in a while wondering where they are. Seriously, if you turn your radio on, start up, take off and fly, have you ever wondered how long my radio batteries have been on? Well, Radio Shack sells a miniature timer which is about $1\frac{1}{n}$ inches round that is a clock as well as a 15 minute resetable timer. You just stick it on your transmitter with velco and you are in business. Not only are you reminded of the time but you can keep an eye on the radio batteries.

For those that still like to use a little paint on their models you can get the neatest handle that snaps on to the top of spray cans. Presto, you have 100 percent more control over your spraying since it now is much like a regular spray unit. Works good.

Since its building season, everyone is probably getting with it. Does your bench have good light? Can you see? The Best Fabric Store in the Chartley Shopping Center in Reistertown has something for you. For \$19.95, you can get a spring arm light with about a 4 inch magnifier built into it. Mount this on the end of your bench and use it for normal lighting. However, when you have that small delicate job to do, pull it down and work with both hands while viewing the work through the magnifier! You'll like it. Also they stock X-acto products knives and blades, if you find yourself stuck sometime and need a #11 blade.


