# CARROLL COUNTY Ray Miles

Things have been moving along-and you were briefly updated at our Nov. mtg. What I can report is that the alternative site offered us at the John Owings landfill is an excellent one. We accepted this area which is below and west of the hill site originally designated for our use.

This area provides: An access road, ample parking, good drainage, plenty of air space, remote from major roads, houses, etc, & has a solid base for an airstrip.

The soy beans have been removed and the airfield has been staked out. I received a call from Bruce Dutterer (Rec. Dept. Draftsman) whom we deal with directly on the field progress and indeed this has been done. I checked this out personally as have some of our other members.

Bruce informed me that Kieth Kirschnick (Public Works Dept) will have his dept. do the initial clearing, dragging, etc. with their equipment. It may be up to us to seed and fertilize. I have developed new county contacts that may provide us with assistance.

Due to the retirement of Jack Sterling, Public Works Director, Keith Kirschnick (now his assistant) will more than likely assume his post. (He has been promoted) Keith told me personally that his dept will preliminary grading and <a href="mailto:seeding">seeding</a> for us by late Feb. or early March. I made it known to him that we will be flying there this Spring. We may have to tread lightly for a while.

In the meanwhile I attended a meting with John Little (Director of Parks) in the Commissioners Chambers of which all three were in attendance. John presented maps and a complete up date picture of the area, along with a complete up-date. Without going into detail, all three Commissioners approved this area for our use. Minor details will be completed soon.

My hopes have been realized and it is now YOUR TURN to set up and maintain a class A Model Aerodrome. I will not be involved with that.

A project committee from both WAM & SCAM has been put into place. These people will do their thing.

After each phase of planning is completed, I will take it to the county and show them our intended improvements so they will be fully aware of what is being done such as where everything will be placed bariers, safety fences, pit areas, pavilion for shade, parking, you name it. The county does want to know what we plan before any actual implementation takes place. So-looking ahead I suppose some kind of field dedication should be in order later this summer. There are many persons we need to thank and recognize for the support that they have given to us.

#### SPACE PROGRAM SPIN-OFF John Schaffner

New flame-resistant materials.

NASA has been conducting research on flame-resistant materials minimize fire hazards in the Space Shuttle. One result is a new light weight substance that strongly resists ignition. When exposed to open flames it only chars and decomposes. one form it can be used for seat cushions, and in a harder type for wall, door, floor and ceiling panels particular application to trains, planes, busses, ships and rapid transit cars. The toxic smoke produced when such items burn is often the real cause of fire fatalities. This safer material is now commercially available.

NASA technology also contributed to the development of a new type of smokeless wire and cable insulation. I several subway fires burning wire and cable propagated the flames and created such smoke. Borrowing from solid rocket propellant technology, NASA developed an insulating material that is less likely to burn, and produces less smoke if it does. The material still has the required mechanical strength. A line of these cable assemblies is being supplied to mass transit systems in the Unites States and overseas.

### SPIN-OFF FROM SPACE TECHNOLOGY John Schaffner

Emergency lighting-

A lighting system originally developed for Apollo and Skylab manned spacecraft has resulted in a "Multi-Mode" electronic lighting system designed for plant emergency supplimental use, such as lighting, or "always-on"" stairwell lights and illuminated exit signs. Its advantages stem from the qualities demanded for spacecraft installation: extremely light output with very low energy drain, compactness, light weight, and reliability. The Multi-Mode system included long life fluorescent lamps operated by electronic circuitry, a sealed battery that needs no maintenance for 10 years, and a solid state bat tery charger. As a night lighting system for maintenance or security, fixtures can by-pass the battery operate on normal current at a fraction of the energy demanded of conventional night lighting.

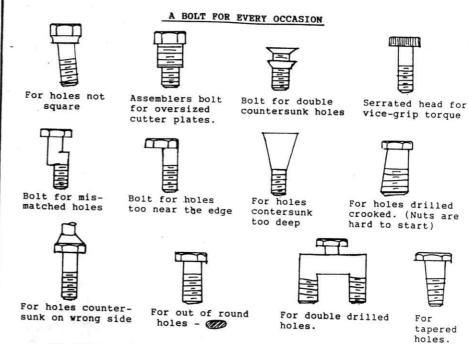

### NOSTALGIA in January John Schaffner

In recent years I have ben subscribing to a magazine called "Aviation Heritage". I'm not suggesting that everybody will enjoy its pages as much as I do but I have found of all the magazines that I Have bought over the years, this one I read cover to cover.

One passage, written by one of the authors in the latest edition, really hit home and I suppose this is the reason I like the magazine. The writers must be about as old as I am and we must have grown up thinking about the same things (flying).

I know that some (all) of you younger tads cannot possibly relate to these experiencesbut read on anyway.

This article is written by Luther Y. Gore, is titled "Art of Flight" and I will not get into the meat of it, but only to quote the first paragraph.

"Those of us who were kids in the '30tys used to imagine ourselves as WWI aviators. In corduroy knickers, high top boots and leatherette aviator caps (with fur lined goggles), we soared over the trenches of France. The merciless Red Baron was on our tails, opening up on us with his pair of death-dealing Spandaus. With a slick and sly maneuver, however, we could slip behind him, and coming out of the sun we could get on his tail and fill his bright red Fokker triplane with hot lead."

"We all knew with absolute certainty what aerial combat looked like. Hadn't we seen the "Dawn Patrol" at least three times? We knew that movie was not made during the war, but that didn't matter. Hadn't we all gazed hours on end at the numerous photos taken at the front? We were filled with images of WWI aviation, and we knew they were all real."

End of quote. The writer goes on the relate the story of Henry Farre' a French artist who at the age of 43 managed to obtain an enlistment in the French Army during WWI.

Farre' was already an accomplished artist and went on assignment enabling him to experience aerial combat and afterward record on cameras what he had witnessed. He turned out about 175 works during this time. His paintings have been exhibited by the USAF and the Smithsonian NASM in DC and as recent as 1990 by the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center. #### FRENCH TRICKLER - DATA SHEET

The FRENCH TRICKLER is a charge rate adapter designed for use with the standard rate charger that came with your radio system.

No soldering, wiring, or additional plugs are required. The F/T simply plugs into an AC outlet ahead of your standard charger.

We must first discuss the normal oper. of you std. rate chg'r. in order to show how the F/T changes into a trickle chg'r.

The mfgr. of your radio system equiped it with a chgr. that plugged into an AC outlet & properly plugged into the TX and airborn bty. pack, charges at aprox. 1/10 of their amp/hr. rating (Chg. rate = capacity by 10 or C/10). This is considered std. rate. After 10 hrs. of chg'ing. + a few hrs. to ensure saturation of chg. (most mfgrs. suggest 14-16 hrs total) your std. rate or "overnite" chgr. should have your batt'ys charges to 100% of their capacity.

Now if the F/T is plugged into the AC outlet ahead of your chgr. it's series current limiting circuitry effectively limits the primary winding current of your chgr. This in turn drops the charge current to your batt'ys down to aprox. C/50. Trickle charging now can take place indefinitely until you are ready to fly!

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS -

Q- Can I plug More than one system into a F/T at one time? A- NO the F/T is calibtated to monitor ONE chgr. at a time.

Q- Can I get away with  $\underline{only}$  trickle chg'ng. after ea. flying session? A- Yes , but we recommend std. rate chg. o'nite after each flying session & then trickle chg. to hold that 100% peak chg. Trickle charging alone would take days.

Q- Can I forget about cycling my baty's. now that I use the F/T.? A- NO, batys. age w/time & use, their seals dry out etc. The only way to know what a bty's. capacity today is, is to test it. We recom. cycl. your bty's. 2-4 times a yr.to monitior them. Q- Is trickle chg'ng. good for my baty's? A-Yes, excessive std rate chg'ng. & hi rate chg'ng. are harmful to your baty's. & are to be avoided w/o proper monitoring equip. & the know how to use it.

Q- Do you think triclke chg'ng. my old baty. pks. that failed me will bring them back from the graveyard? A- NO, baty's. that are 3 yrs old or more should be watched closely with an expanded scale, loading Voltmt'r. Any old bty. that tests bad during cycling should be disabled.

#### SPINNOFFS OF THE SPACE PROGRAM John Schaffner

This is a "reading" machine for the blind. It is a device which converts regular ink print a readable vibrating tactile form enabling blind persons to read almost anything in print, not just braille transcriptions. The device is called "OPTACON" or OPtical-to-TActile-CONverter. It combines optical electronic technology developed in aerospace research.

The blind reader moves a miniature camera across a line of print with one hand, & with the fingers of the other hand senses vibrating image of the letters the camera is viewing on a tactile array screen. For school use, the OPTACON makes the instructional mat'ls. of the sighted available to the blind. It helps the sightless to obtain jobs, win promotions, & enter vocational areas once closed to them. A related spin-off of opticalelectronic technology is the paper identifier, a small device the size cigarette pack which scans a piece of paper money, reacts to the different colors of the bill, and generates an audible identifying the denominations.

#### THE SPACE SHUTTLE

John Schaffner

Just about everyone knows about the Shuttle & what it looks like. People watch it go & watch it come home, but here is something most folks probably don't know.

Two solid rocket boosters & 3 main engines mounted on the orbiter provide the thrust to lift the whole assy. off the launch pad into orbit. the 2 solid boosters are expended in about 2 min. after lift-off, then separated from the vehicle. The main engines are spent after about 8 min.

Fuel for the main engines is liquid oxygen & liquid hydrogen. Fuel is supplied to the eng. at the rate of 47,000 gal.of hydrogen & 17,000 gal. of oxygen per minute. Mixing of the propellants is so complete that a combustiuon efficiency of 99% is attained. Each eng.dev. 488,000# of thrust & the acceleration rate is throttleable. The acceleration forces are controlled to not exceed 3G's. The design goal for these eng.is to operate for 7.5 accum. hrs That is aprox.56 flights. The ox tank=143,000 gal. & the hyd'gn.= 385,000 gal. @ -4200 F.

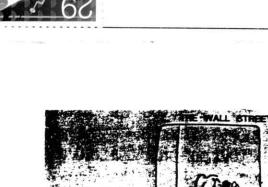

DUES ARE DUE NOW!

(Ed: Art sent this to me for the TS so I'll copy it for everyone - it sounds good)

I ran across a little thing which I believe buld be of interest to anyone who does fly quite a bit. It would be particularly advantageous to someone who might show up at the field having forgotten to charge his receiver batteries or someone who simply likes to stay in the air a lot or a plane with many servos causing a high drain on the receiver pack. This device was in the helicopter section of the AMA mag., Jan/92 issue. It is called the "Automatic Fast Field Charger". When I first saw it I thought "Great Idea !", however after checking into the thing discovered there was no such lamp as a #767 so I substituted but couldn't get it to adjust properly. I contacted Ray Stacy of the Pittsburg Area Rotor Runners (the circuits founding father) and we ironed it out. I have since completed mine & it works great & I've enclosed a new correct circuit schematic \*\* since a couple of the resisters were also incorrectly shown in the MA article. It is relatively simple to construct. The suggested source of parts is:

#67 bulb - PEP Boys or other auto store #LM 317 T Volt regulator - Radio Shack

15 turn pot - Baynesville Elec./Towson all resistors - Radio Shack

May I suggest it be built into a small Radio Shack project box about 1½"x 2"x 3½" or so, even larger will do. Also buy terminal strip # 274-688. One mounted into the center of the box will give you something to wire all the stuff to. Also I added a DC charge jack at the output so you could make up several cords to mate with different mfgr's. battery packs. If you only have one kind of radio you could just hard wire a cord that fits your particular battery pack.

This little unit really does work & would cost only a few dollars to make & could save a days flying or a plane some day. However please do go to the Jan/92 issue of MA pg. 38-39 and read the portion of the article pertaining to the charger - - then use the diagram shown

here to construct it.

A couple of notes - my measurements show that my #67 bulb draws 580 ma therefore the charger is capable of charging at 580 ma, not 400. Also it isn't true that any light will work, at least as intended since automotive lights vary from about 200 ma to 1500 ma. Be rised.

#### THE BALLOON BROS. - John Schaffner

Joseph & Stephen Montgolfier, the French brothers who invented the balloon, faced problems not unlike those faced by the Wrights as well as modern aeronautical engineers.

Their first bag, completed in Nov. 1782, was oblong and had a capacity of about 40 cu.ft. It was made of paper. The brothers held this bag over a hot flame in a high-ceilinged room and released it. It flew until it touched the ceiling.

soon found that they had But they discovered, instead of a flying machine, a rather inadequate toy. The paper in their bag leaked like a sieve. A bag big enough to lift a man would only leak like a big sieve.

Make a bag of better paper ? The brothers - their father owned a paper mill - had the best there was. Use some other material?

They were up against the first of that endless number of technical problems which haunt aviation to the present. Their problem was as difficult to lick in its time, as, say, the problem of vibration supersonic speeds today.

They tried a number of combinations during the winter of 1782-3, finally using linen lined with paper. Their first bag was round and 10 times the size of the model -600 cu.ft.

They solved the fuel problem and the lift problem by securing the bag over a pit in which they built a fire of chopped straw and wool.

The bag broke loose and went up several hundred feet. This was June 5, 1783, some eight months after the indoor ascension - a record for development work.

### GOLD RADIOS ONLY IN '92 - R U READY ?

### SPINOFF FROM SPACE TECHNOLOGY - John Schaffner.

REDOX: A new type of battery -

Suppliers of electrical power must have enough capacity available to handle peal loads. At other times they must shut down some generators, since they have no way to store excess energy. NASA has developed a new battery, REDOX type of (Reduction Oxidization) which makes saving and storing large amounts of power practical. In the REDOX system, electrical power is stored as chemical energy, in solutions of chromium chloride and iron chloride. When these are pumped through a "stack" of flow cells the stored energy reappears as electricity, which can be withdrawn as it is from any battery.

The stack can be constructed in very large sizes, allowing power suppliers to meet some of their peak demand from stored energy. This can eliminate the need for relatively expensive, less efficient standby generating equipment. And, REDOX fluids do deteriorate as does battery acid; a REDOX stack can be used for 20 to 30 years. For many suppliers, such a storage system offers substantial gains in economy.

#### REGULATIONS

Operation of aircraft as set forth by the UNITED STATES AIR SERVICE

- 1- Don't take the machine into the air unless you are satisfied it will fly.
- 2- Never leave the ground with the motor leaking.
- 3- Don't turn sharply when taxiing. instead of turning short, have someone lift the tail around.
- 4- Never get out of the machine with the motor running until the pilot relieving you can reach the engine controls.
- 5- Pilots should carry hankies in a handy position to wipe off goggles.
- 6- Riding on the steps, wings, or tail of a machine is prohibited.
- 7- In case the engine fails on takeoff, land straight ahead regardless of obstacles.
- 8- No machine must taxi faster than a man can walk.
- 9- Do not trust altitude instruments.
- 10- If you see another machine near you, get out of its way.

- 15. Rudder control horn(s) for solidity (wiggle it).
- 16. Rudder and tailwheel control system for sloppy connections.
- Right wing panel for cracks or loose covering.
- 18. Right wing strut (if applicable) for condition and security.
- 19. Right wing aileron hinges (pull on it).
- 20. Right wing for obvious warps.
- 21. Check mounting and connections of all servos.
- 22. Landing ear and wheel for security and condition.
- 23. Batteries, cycle, and eck condition.
- 24. IF FEASIBLE, do range check and control surface movement check. This should also be done before every flight session.

If this check list is used to check out all models before the first flight of the season and thereafter every few weeks, many problems could be avoided before they become crashes. Now, if there was only a test for "dumb thumbs".

I want to apologize for using the number 767. It turns out that this a manufacturing number and not the number that the automotive parts store uses. The correct number is #67. Any 12 volt automotive 1 ght will work such as a parking light or a brake light. The #67 is the one that I used and it works great.

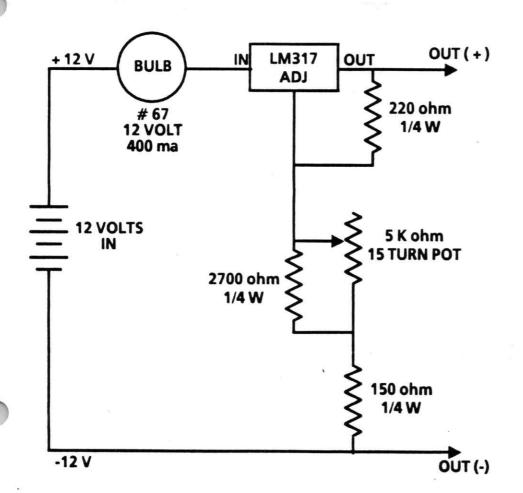
Make sure that you have at least a 15 turn pot. This is necessary to get your 5.70 output voltage which should be set with a digital voltmeter. A 20 turn pot will work well also.

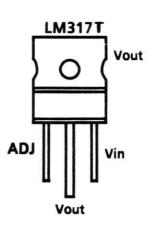
Also there was an error in the circuit printed in the AMA magazine. The circuit shown below is the Correct one. Notice that that the 150 ohm resistor and the 2700 ohm resistor have been swapped.

This is designed for a 4.8 volt pack. It doesn't make difference whether its a 500 or a 1000 mil. After one flight, approx. charge time should be 5-7 minutes. After 3 flights, around 15-20 minutes. These times a re from a helicopter using 5 servoes and a gyro on a 1000 mil pack. Keep in mind we are only charging at 400 mils. This gives acceptable charge time without hurting or even making the batterys warm.

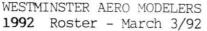
No sooner than the balloon had been invented, than pilots began to appear calling themselves "Aeronauts". The first was Jean Francois Pilatre deRozier. (The honor almost went to couple of nameless convicts who offered themselves in exchange not being killed on the wheel if they survived.) Jean Francois made a captive ascent in a Montgolfier with a built-in burner, at Paris, Oct.15, 1783. A few days later he took up the first passenger on a captive flight, Girond de Vilette, who made a number of other ascents. The first passenger on a free flight was the Marquis

d'Arlandes - Nov.21,1783.

The trick was to build a roaring fire in the grate in the center of the passenger basket to keep the bag aloft - but not too big to set it ablaze. Let the fire die, and you crashed into a chimney, roof, or tree. Let it roar and you came down in flames. Threatened with a crash, d'Arlasnder later said that he took straw and "shook it in the middle of the flame". This worked. "The moment I felt as if I were lifted up by my arm pits. But a few minute later, the bag caught fire- "part of In machine," d'Arlander explained calmly, "was full of round holes, several of which were of considerable size". Cords holding the basket began to smolder. The only fire fighting equipment was a wet sponge. The cords all held except two which gave way. A crash landing threatened, and again they built up the fire. After narrowly missing roof tops, they landed, apparently none too soon. In the seconds it took d'Arlander to jump clear and turn around, the balloon "perfectly emptied and quite flattened."

There is no record that d'Arlander flew again; once was probably enough. But deRozier, the first to fly, was the first to die. He attempted a France to England flight on June 15,1785. Hydrogen was the favorite lift by then, but deRozier tried to compromise with a hydrogen bag above a hot-air envelope. His theory was that with the hot air he could control his altitude more readily. A

spark exploded the hydrogen bag. con't. on pg. 7

# FCC opens space to start 2-way TV

WASHINGTON — The Federal Communications Commission cleared space on the airwaves yesterday for two-way television.

Soon, you should be able to shop, bank, pay bills, take classes answer surveys through your Tweet, no telephone necessary.

The FCC says it will start taking applications in three to six months from companies who can build these systems for each broadcast area. As early as next year, some consumers could be signing up.

The action taken by the FCC just the first step in a process that will take years to complete - stems from a petition by TV Answer Inc. of Reston, Va., which has a two-way system ready for market.

It's "the next logical generation of advanced television," said Fernando Morales, president of the firm.

The concept has been under development for many years and used minimally by some cable companies. But the FCC's action provides space near Channel 13 on the public airwaves used for television, which will make it available to more people.

The spot is sometimes referred to as the "backwater band" and was allocated to the maritime telecommunications system, which didn't use it.

Basically, here's how the twoway system would work:

You get a controller box that hooks up to your videocassette recorder, cable box or television set. You also get a remote control

shaped like a pistol.

You turn to the interactive channel and your television set acts like a computer loaded with various programs.

A menu appears on the screen, offering options like educational, shopping, news, sports, automatic banking, polling or pay-per-view entertainment. You point the remote control at the item you want to engage.

Your credit-card number, address and telephone number are stored in the controller box, and you need a personal identification number to get access to the ser vices provided by the system.

If you choose banking and bill paying, for example, you can be hooked up to a system that allows you to transfer money from your bank to creditors, get creditcard balances and make other personal financial transactions.

If you choose shopping, your credit-card information is automatically supplied to the seller when you indicate by your remote control that you want to buy something.

TV Answer has said it would charge about \$12.95 a month for the service.

The FCC says it will issue two licenses per service area to companies who can provide such a system. The service areas coincide with the 734 cellular service areas that are well known to the communications industry and

blanket the country.

Also yesterday, the FCC proposed that some radio frequencies reserved for purposes such as police and ambulance dispatching, but not fully used, be reassigned to new technologies.

Subject:

MODEL AIRCRAFT OPERATING STANDARDS

- 1. PURPOSE. This advisory circular outlines, and encourages voluntary compliance with, safety standards for model aircraft operators.
- 2. <u>BACKGROUND</u>. Modelers, generally, are concerned about safety and do exercise good judgement when flying model aircraft. However, model aircraft can at times pose a hazard to full-scale aircraft in flight and to persons and property on the surface. Compliance with the following standards will help reduce the potential for that hazard and create a good neighbor environment with affected communities and airspace users.

#### 3. OPERATING STANDARDS.

- a. Select an operating site that is of sufficient distance from populated areas. The selected site should be away from noise sensitive areas such as parks, schools, hospitals, churches, etc.
- b. Do not operate model aircraft in the presence of spectators until the aircraft is successfully flight tested and proven airworthy.
- c. Do not fly model aircraft higher than 400 feet above the surface. When flying aircraft within 3 miles of an airport, notify the airport operator, or when an air traffic facility is located at the airport, notify the control tower, or flight service station.
- d. Give right of way to, and avoid flying in the proximity of, full-scale aircraft. Use observers to help if possible.
- e. Do not hesitate to ask for assistance from any airport traffic control tower or flight service station concerning compliance with these standards.

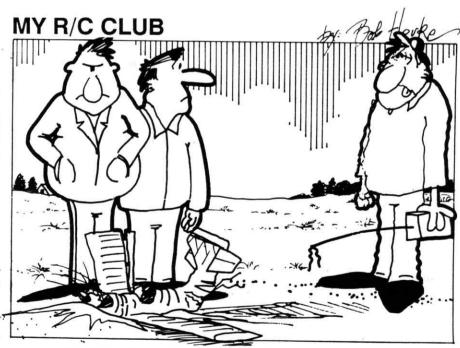

"Information for this report was gathered etween the hours of 11:00 AM to 12:00 noon, Thurs. March 12,1992.

Commercial station at 72.020 MHz was continuously broadcasting during the entire monitoring operation. All the others were short intermittent broadcasts.

The report shows the commercial stations indicated were active at this time. This does not assure that there are not any other stations that could cause adjacent channel interference.

Commercial radio signals with an "S" meter reading of "S-5" or higher, interference to old style wide band receivers that are operating on adjacent channels is a definite possibility.

Preliminary information indicates that the new 1991 style narrow band R/C receivers will not experience adjacent commercial signal interference until the observed signal level on the "S" meter indicates an "S-9" signal level from the commercial station.

MODEL CRAFT HAS A LINDBERGHIAN TASK Maynard Hill of Layhill Hopes to navigate a model plane across the Atlantic in an attempt to break his own distance record.

Maynard Hill built his first working model airplane in the 1930s as a boy in PA. It was powered by one rubber band, and Hill says it "probably flew 9-10 ft".

This yr., six decades & 18 world records later, he will try to fly a model plane across the Atlantic Ocean.

Hill, 66, of Layhill, is one of the worlds foremost builders and fliers of record setting model airplanes, The planes have been a hobby all his life, and evolved into his profession, designing small "remotely piloted vehicles," or RPVs for the military.

He spent 26 yrs at Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Lab. in Laurel, then retired, then promptly started a company called H-Cubed Corp. with 2 other people, to continue the work." The hobby's always been mixed with the business", he said.

Hill currently holds four worlds bests, one of which is listed in the 1991 Guinness Book of World Records: In 1970 he set an altitude record for planes launched from land, guiding a radio controlled plane to 26,929 ft., about 2,100 ft. short of the height of Mt. Everest.

The only reason he stopped at 26,929 ft. was that he would have lost sight of the plane had it gone higher. "If I could ever fly that airplane at Cape Canaveral where they have the telescopes that track the shuttle, I could probably get it to 50,000 feet," he said.

He also holds records for cross country distance, 289 miles, set in 1983. That record attempt began with Hill launching a plane in Greencastle, PA near Hagerstown.

Then he, a driver & 2 officials got into his 1962 Mercury Cougar convertible & chased the plane for 5 hrs. down I-83, almost to the Tenn. boarder.

Hill also holds the altitude record for planes launched from water, 18,900 ft. set in 1969 and the speed record on a set course, 150 MPH over a roughly ½ mi.course.

The 1991 Guinness book lists him as holding the closed course distance record, but that has since been broken, he said.

His current project is a plane that he hopes break his own cross country distance record, and the duration record of 22 hrs & 13 min. held by an Italian man.

It is a 6 ft long plane built of orange & white mylar stretched over a balsa wood frame, with a span of  $9\frac{1}{2}$  ft. It is powered with a 4/stroke gas engine that uses fuel sparingly - About  $1\frac{1}{2}$  oz./ hr. Without fuel the plane weighs 7 lbs. Mounted on the planes frame is a control mechanism that keeps the plane homed in on a signal from a radio transmitter. That's how Hill wants to cross the Atlantic later this yr.

"If we put that transmitter on the fantail of a ship, the plane will just soar along behind us like an albatross across the ocean Hill does not have a pilots license, and does not particularly want one. "I've always felt its a lot more fun to fly them from the ground. I find sitting in a light plane going from here to there is very dull, compared to having a radio controlled airplane that you can loop, dive & roll. (Article contributed by - Richard Jakubs)

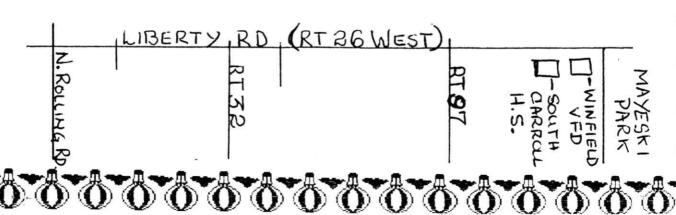

#### SPINOFF FROM SPACE TECHNOLOGY -

John Schaffner

SOUND GUARD - Lubrication technology originally developed for a series of NASA satellites has lead to commercial products designed to protect surfaces from friction and corrosion. A spray called "Sound Guard" deposits on phonograph records a microscopically thin protective coating that prevents the hard diamond from wearing away the softer vinyl material of the disc.

The anti-static quality of the coating also retards particle accumulation on the stylus. The lubricant technology, developed when it was discovered that known lubricants were not suitable for moving parts exposed to space for several months, also is used in manufacturing. The spray produces a film that dries to form a hard, slippery surface that doesn't chip, peel, or rub off. These surfaces function well in molding pressing operations, protecting against unwanted adhesion and heat produced by power robbing, product damaging friction.

The coatings are used in producing drugs, on food processing machinery, computers, turbines, pumps & valves, and many more.

#### AVIATION'S 10 COMMANDMENTS OF FLYING

I- DON'T SHOW OFF - Zooming over your girls house, or turning to wave good-bye to her on a take-off is an easy way to terminate our romance suddenly.

II- KNOW YOUR LIMITATIONS - Don't try to perform the impossible with yourself or your ship. Don't be afraid to take a little extra time to check yourself out on a strange ship. Especially, find out when it spins and why, so you won't be surprised some day.

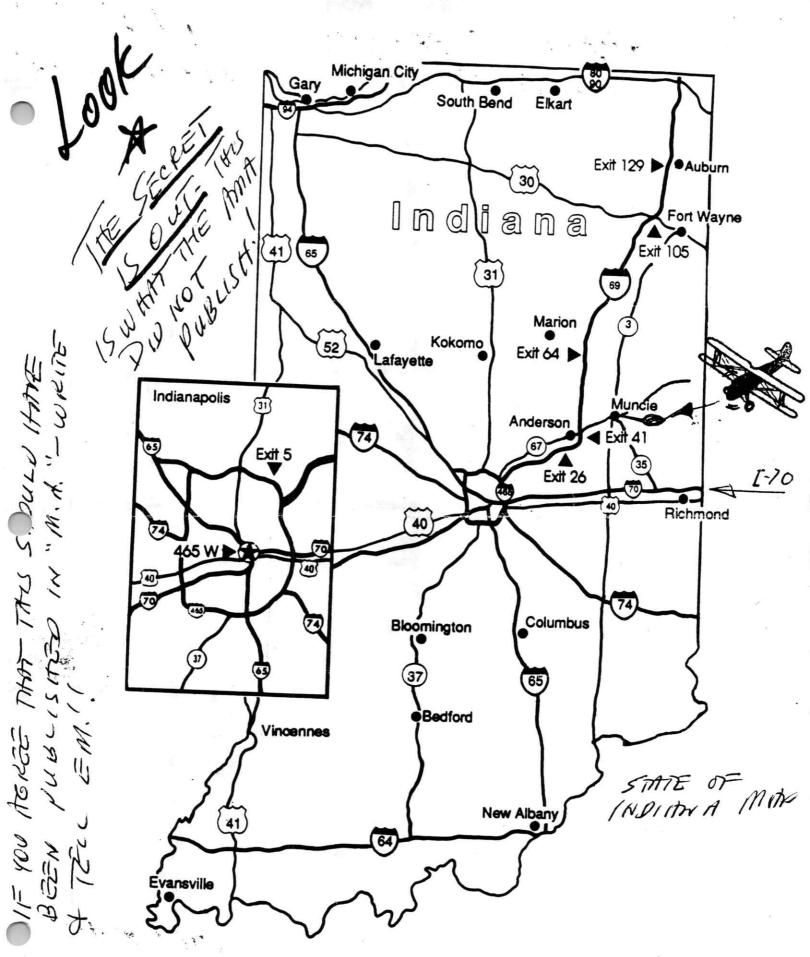

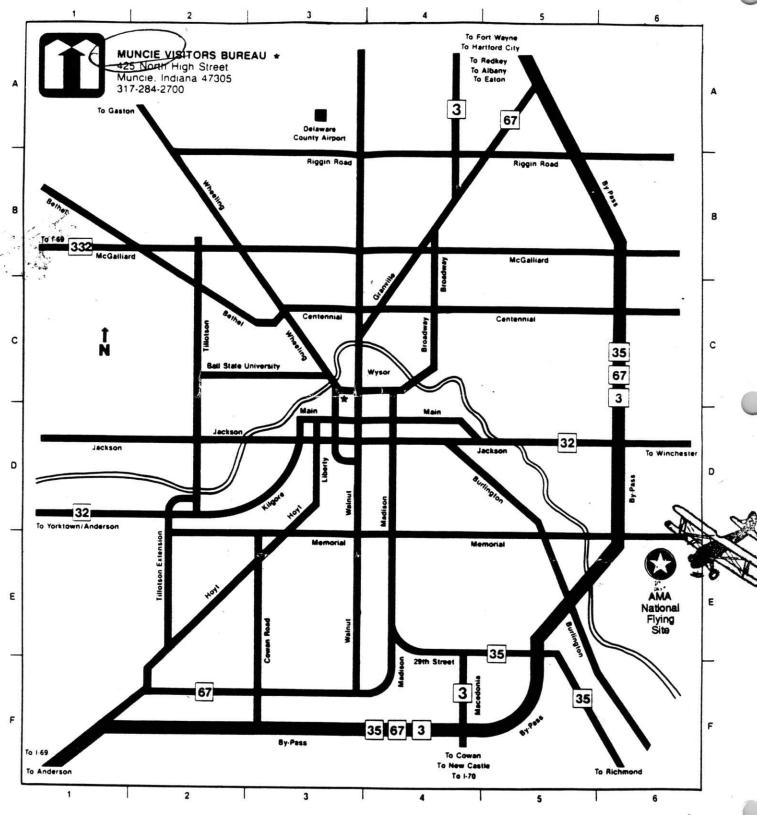

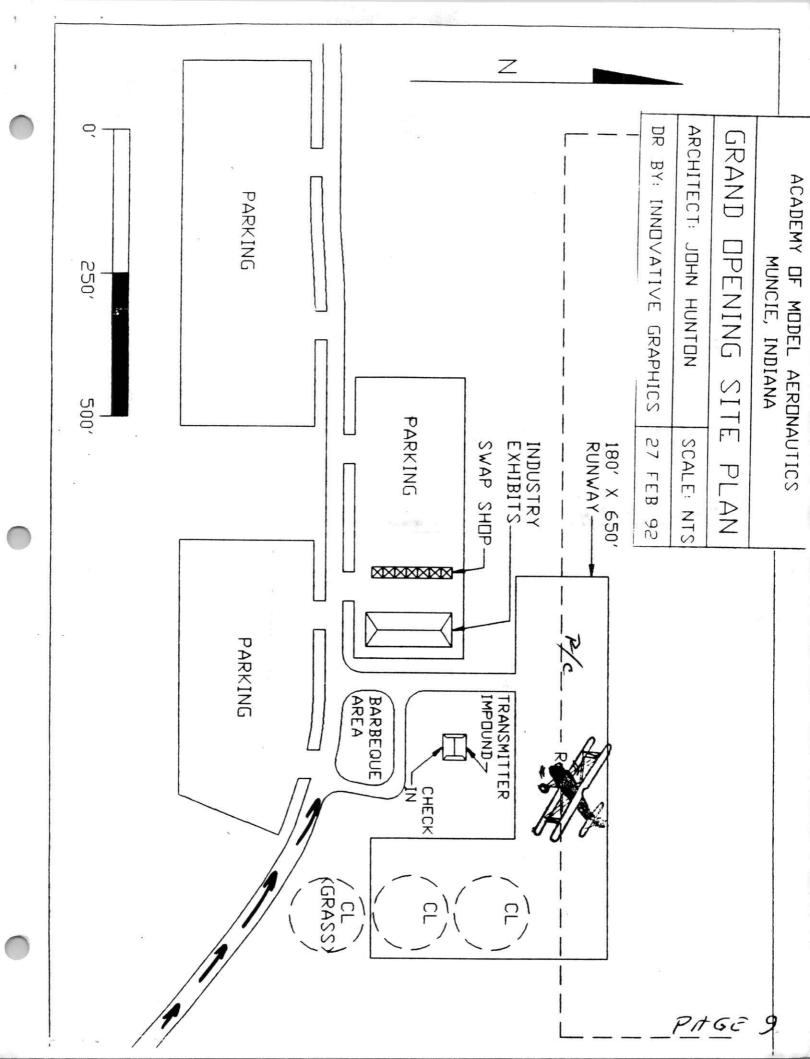
Map of Muncie on reverse side.

DENTAL ARCH WIRE- Straightening teeth is a difficult process requiring months, often yrs., of applying corrective pressure means of arch wires- better known as braceswhich may have to be changed several times in the course of treatment. A new type of arch wire material, called Nitinol, is helping to reduce the number of brace changes, due to its elasticity. An alloy of nickel & titanium Nitinal was originally developed for aerospace applications. Because ability to return to its original shape after bending, antennas or other hardware could be compacted effectively in a satellite during launch, and later expand to full size when in orbit. The same property allows braces made of Nitinol to exert continuous pull on teeth, reducing the frequency of office visits to change or adjust braces and, in some cases, actually trimming overall treatment time.

## A WORD OF CAUTION A TRUE STORY

NOTE: This item is not meant to embarrass anyone - so don't ask as to who - when - or where this incident occurred but it did happen. Just take heed !!

Even with the use of a freq. pin board accidents in the use of frequencies can occur and recently did occur.

A flier was preparing to fly and took a pin from the control board & put in on his radio. He then proceeded to fly his model. All is

well up to this point.

Another modeler was preparing to fly and took a pin from the freq. board and placed it on his radio. When flier #2 tried to check out his controls WITH THE ANTENNA DOWN nothing worked on model #2. This was odd because an hour prior to this all worked properly. TX & RX switches were checked, flipped, double checked and once in awhile a control surface would move and then stop. (flier #1 was standing about 20'-25' from #2 while flying)

#2 now EXTENDED his antenna and suddenly everything worked on #2 plane. The TX was

2'-3' from #2 RX.

Panic sounded when #1 called out that he could not control his model which was heading back to earth with a terrible crash.

Both fliers checked the freq. pin on their own radio and was satisfied that all was OK.

While #1 was picking up the pieces, #2 & chers went to look at #1's radio and found that #1 HAD THE WRONG FREQ. PIN on his radio.

BOTH WERE ON THE SAME CHANNEL. #1 had taken the **wrong** pin from the control board. When #2 extended his antenna, it apparently sent a stronger signal to #1's model and caused it to crash.

Fortunely, no one was injured and no property was damaged. However think about

what could have happened.

All involved parties feel badly about the occurrence but at least we know the cause was two on the same channel and not that we had mixed signals or interference within channels MORAL OF THE STORY - CHECK FOR CORRECT PIN.

## A M A NEWS - Taken from VP Howard Crispins Newsletter

AMA AND OTHERS: I have received a newsletter from one club in the District which states that they have joined SFA. The reasons given show a very, very poor understanding of what the two represent. It also shows that people absolutely do not read material sent to the clubs or published in Model Aviation.

One of the statements was that SFA is primary to the site owner. The policy of SFA definitely states that SFA IS PRIMARY AFTER ALL OTHERS! AMA insurance is, and always has been PRIMARY for site owners where listed, club officers and clubs. The SFA insurance does not in any way exceed the AMA policy terms. The statement that AMA coverage is secondary to any and all insurance is an absolute misstatement of fact. This club has paid a fee of \$100.00 for something that was included in the club charter fee for the Academy.

You bet that the SFA says to keep AMA membership. They are excess to any coverage by the Academy and thus would be very unlikely to have to ever pay for a claim. Do not believe that you are now protected in any sense better than before. The statement was made that they could now teach non-members to fly. This is not true, as an AMA Chartered Club. You must understand that the Academy can not provide primary coverage for a club and then have members violating the terms of that coverage.

This is especially of concern with sanctioned events. The Academy WILL NOT sanction events which are dual sanctioned, such as by SFA. Again, that supposes that the organizer would permit fliers holding SFA insurance cards (?) to participate and thus be covered by the Academy. This we can not permit. This does not apply to sanctioning by IMAA, for example, which is a special interest group within the Academy and does require AMA membership for participation.

I find it very disturbing that there is no statement in this newsletter referencing any contact with the Academy in this matter. It is also interesting that no one has stated that they obtained a copy of the AMA policy and had it reviewed. I have not personally talked to anyone who has had a copy of the SFA policy for comparison. Read their own ads and then compare. They have made many statements in their ads which are completely untrue and since they employ two former employees of the Academy, they know they are not true.

The status of this club, and others around the United States, will depend on how they relate AMA and SFA membership. To remain a Charter Club all members of the club MUST be AMA members. To enter an event sanctioned by the Academy requires that an entrant MUST be a member of the AMA. It is of no concern that the individual is a member of SFA. The sanction provides protection, in a variety of ways, by the Academy of Model Aeronautics and we can not provide that if the requirements are not met. We can not protect the club from incidents intentionally caused through permitting non members access to, and use of, the Chartered Club's flying site. I think that when your land owner and/or local governmental agency looks into this there may be other concerns. After all, the Academy has an excellent track record of protecting the members and the clubs. There is much more to all this than simply promising to pay out a claim under certain conditions.

There are exclusions which differ, to be sure. The Academy covers, for example, Control Line flying and SFA does not. The SFA says that they have no weight restrictions for aircraft. Was this done to entice some large number of individuals building 100 pound aircraft? The Academy

and IMAA spent much time developing a set of rules for the acceptance and certification of aircraft weighing in excess of 55 pounds and under 100 pounds. This was done to be reasonably sure that these aircraft would be safe to operate. SFA has said they will cover all aircraft over 55 pounds and they have no safety requirements at all in regard these aircraft. Since the FAA is becoming interested in very large aircraft, under the guise of RPV/UAV machines, control on our part is essential. We are involved in discussion with the committee dealing with this as well as anti-terrorist use under Defense and State Department studies. Safety is paramount with the Academy.

The point is, why spend additional amounts of personal & club funds for something which in fact does nothing for you. Perhaps there is some other way is which the Academy can explain something to you. On the other hand, make sure that the grass is indeed greener on the other side of the fence. Make certain that it is not greener because of the tinted glasses the representative of some other company gave you. Your Academy insurance does provide for your needs, is much less costly, and has an excellent record.

There may be faults within the Academy, and some of us are attempting to correct these faults, but the insurance program (only a part of the Academy's service)  $\underline{is}$  not one of these areas.

#### PERSONAL NOTES - Milt P. (ED)

I don't know why all this hub-bub is going on with the SFA insurance & the AMA insurance.

I would like anyone prove to me that the AMA ins. DID NOT do the job intended.

When did the AMA FAIL to provide coverage for your activities?

How much has it cost YOU EXTRA for this service?

Do you realize that the AMA members are their own WORST ENEMIES? The majority of claims have been member to member. In other words, you are claiming against YOURSELF.

You must accept the risk of the activity you are involved in <u>Accidents</u> will happen. <u>IF</u> there is <u>negligence</u>, then act on it.

The SFA is just another ins. co. trying to make a buck and that is all. Face the fact.

When a new automobile, homeowner, etc. company appears in the marketplace, DO YOU JUMP OVER TO IT? Are they really better than what you already have?

Another thing you should know is that a "Grade A" rating for an insurance co. is NOT the top of the heap. You should be very careful in any ins, co. selection. There have been a lot of AA & AAA co's. go down the tubes these last couple years. So take heed. Think.

All in all, I personally am sticking with a winner. As far as I am concerned, the AMA is giving me what I feel I need. My biggest concern is ME, & I can add \$1,000,000 cov. to my Homeowners policy for just a few bucks and that is with a co. that I trust.

#### FIRST "AIRBORNE" AMERICAN

The first American to be airborne was age 13 - Edward Warren. He went aloft in a captive balloon built by Peter Carnes near Baltimore. The flight was on June 24,1784. Either Carnes was afraid to go up, or the balloon was not big enough to lift him. Warren was unafraid and his feat preserved in purple prose the next day by Maryland Journal and Baltimore Advertiser: "He bravely embarked as a volunteer and behaved with the fortitude of an old voyager. The gazing multitude below wafted him their applause, the receipt of which as he was soaring aloft he politely acknowledged by a significant wave of his hat".

## DO YOU USE AN ESV?

o you use an Expanded Scale Voltmeter before every flight? You should, as it is probably your most important single means of protecting your airplane from a total wipe-out due to internal problems. Just about every regular user of an ESV will tell you that it has saved them at least one airplane, and it is very likely that it will save one for you. Also, the damage that an out of control airplane can cause is both immense and life threatening.

There are at least two important reasons for using the ESV before every flight, especially on the first flight.

(1) You must learn the discharge characteristics of your NiCd pack. This means you will form a mental picture of the discharge curve (table of graph) of your pack, in relation to its charge.

(2) You must know that your pack is potentially able to complete the next flight.

Your NiCds will deliver far less than

their rated capacity if:

(1) They have not been recently charged — a week old or two old charge, for example, is not safe for ordinary cells, especially if they are a couple of years old.

(2) They have not been used, or cycled, recently. Check them at least every 2 or 3 months on a cycler. If they don't reach at

least 75% rated capacity after 2-3 cycles, don't fly with them.

- (3) They have been regularly overcharged, and thus allowed to generate excess heat, or stored for long periods in a hot environment (like in a South Florida garage).
- (4) Your charger is not delivering what it should.
  - (5) Your cells are old.

(6) There is corrosion or fracture in the wires of the switch harness, battery pack, or charge cords. These conditions are very common. Of course there are also many less common reasons, like leaving your Rx switch on when you thought you were charging!

You must also be familiar with what the ESV is telling you. For example, a nearly dead pack can read full scale on an ESV if you charge it for only a minute or two, and then immediately take a one second reading. If, however, you leave the ESV plugged in for 20-30 seconds, you will be able to see the reading rapidly fall. Thus, you should always leave the ESV plugged in — with its load — for 20 seconds or so, to get a meaningful reading.

The average sport flier uses a four penlight cell pack or 500 mA capacity, with

four servos. This draws around 250 mA in flight for an average 10 minute flight. The following table shows typical ESV readings before each flight, with a fresh, fully charged pack:

- (1) 5.20V
- (2) 4.95V
- (3) 4.90V
- (4) 4.87V
- (5) 4.84V (6) 4.82V
- (7) 4.80V First warning.
- (8) 4.78V I might not take off.
- (9) 4.74V I wouldn't take off. It is better to stop with at least a 25% reserve in your pack, and some authorities advocate 50% reserve.

Two or three year old packs will fall faster than the above example, as will packs with poor cells. When you find your pack does not perform like it used to — replace it!

Again, be sure to use the ESV before the very first flight. All too often cells fail on charge, chargers don't work, the auto timer doesn't complete the circuit, the Rx or Tx switch was left on, you didn't check the pilot light on the charger, or a wire broke or developed corrosion and high resistance, or. . . or. . or. Any one of a million and one things can go wrong that the ESV will alert you to.

#### NEW WORLD ENDURANCE RECORD SET - DCRC Release

Rockville, MD - June 19,1992

At the Pegasus R/C Field near Hagerstown, MD a R/C model flown by DCRC member, Maynard Hill set a new world endurance record on June 4/92 by flying nonstop for 24 hrs, 4 min., & 15 sec. This flight surpassed the previous record of 2 hrs, 19 min, 15 sec. set in 1987 by Gian M. Aghem of Molenella, Italy. Although flown only by Hill during the flight because of record-setting regs. the plane & flight was a team effort by Hill, Paul Howey, Tien-Seng Chiu, & M. Scott Hill.

The plane is designed & certified to meet the regs. of the FAI and applications have been filed to have the flight certified as a new world record by the FAI. The plane weighed just under 11# at T/O including fuel & has a span of 8½. The single cyl. 10cc 4 stroke eng. was modified to burn gasoline instead of alcohol, was intentionally stopped at the end of the flight when the fuel tank was still ½ full. A small TX on the airplane relayed eng. RPM,

altitude, rudder position & voltage. The strain of controlling the model for 24 hrs. was relieved by another on-board device that automatically kept the plane near a ground radio beacon.

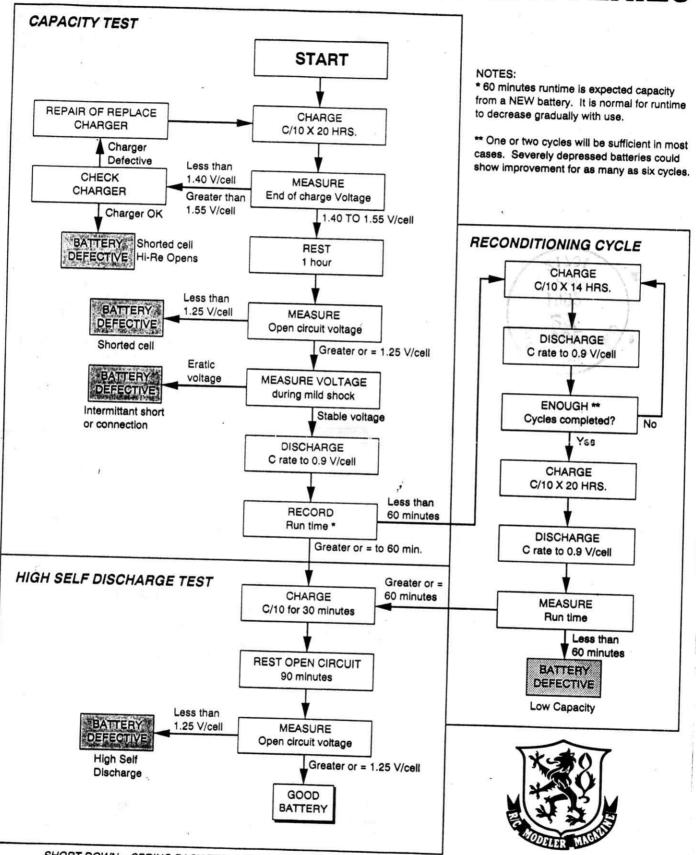

## TROUBLE SHOOTING NICD BATTERIES



SHORT DOWN - SPRING BACK TEST This test is designed to detect potential shorts.

Discharge individual cells to 0.9 volts. Short out individual cells for 24 hours. Remove short and let cells rest open circuit for 24 hours. Measure open circuit voltage. A good cell should "spring back" to greater than 1.0 volts. Any cell falling to reach this voltage is suspect and should not be used for flight critical applications.

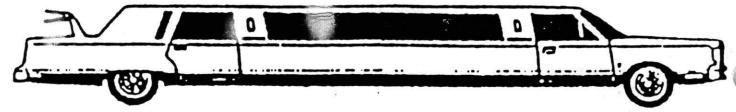

# NIEL ARMSTRONG, astronaut- When Neil began aero modeling as a child, little did he know he would be making "One small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."

Armstrong became an active member of the AMA in the 1940's, flying in many model airplane competitions. He was also a member of the U.S.Navy team at the 1949 NATS, competing in CL speed events.

Most noted in his aviation career was the Apollo-Saturn II landing on the moon in July 1969, making him the first man to walk on

the moon.

Neil, a member of the Aviation Hall of Fame, his model building and tivities significantly contributed to his interest in aeronautics and had a primary influence on his choice of education in the field of aeronautical engineering.

FRANK BORMAN, astronaut- Frank, an Aviation Ha11 Fame member, became of interested in model aviation as a child, leading to his exciting career astronaut. He is widely known for the space exploration that allowed the nation its first glimpse of the moon when the lunar surface was televised to earth from the Apollo-Saturn 8 in Dec. 1968.

According to Borman, model aviation instills patience, skill, creativity most important, the satisfaction of a job well done. He feels that almost all aviators begin their cereers with an interest sparked by a hobby.

# ROBERT [HOOT] GIBSON, astronaut- Gibson has built and flown airplanes all his life and compares his 1986 Space Shuttle Columbia piloting tasks with those performed years earlier on model airplanes.

Through aeromodeling, he said he learned problem solving, aerodynamics, stability and control, structures and other engineering functions, which have guided him throughout his careers in engineering and aviation.

Gibson remains active as an aeromodeler and enjoys the camaraderie, satisfaction and education the hobby provides.

PAUL MacCREADY, engineer/inventor- An award-winning engineer, Mac has national acclaim for such inventions as the Gossamer Condor and the Gossamer Albatross flying machines propelled solely by man power; the Solar Challenger, a solar-powered electric craft that climbed to 11,000 ft. and flew 163 miles.

In recognition of his pioneer feats, he was named the Engineer of the Century by the American Soc. of Mechanical Engineers in 1980.

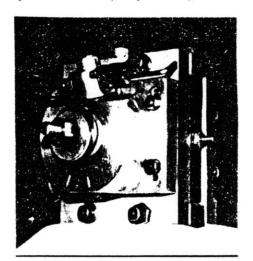

### Status of MCC Engine Development

By Frederick L. Erickson

Several articles on the Migrating Combustion Chamber (MCC) full expansion engine appeared in publications in 1991. In particular, Howard Crispin, Jr.'s article in Model Aviation, December 1991, generated a number of inquiries from Radio Control (RC) Modelers.

The majority of the RC Modelers were interested in knowing when the quiet MCC engine would be available for purchase. Therefore the intent of this first journal is to convey the statu of the MCC engine.

Currently, two .60 Cubic Inch
Displacement (CID) and one 1.2 CID
Full Expansion (FE) engines are
undergoing flight testing. One of the
.60 units has over 50 hours on it and
is performing very well. However,
these are still prototype engines and
have not been subjected to the normal
usage of the average modeler.

refore five prototypes, machined from bar stock, are being fabricated. These engines will be flight tested and evaluated by a number of modelers in the spring of this year. Field testing will determine the need for any desired refinements. It will also provide ERA with input on potential MCC engine safety concerns.

One important point which should be stressed is that present model engines have not been performance tuned to obtain the best power versus fuel consumption relationship. Therefore several prototype engines will be used to gradually change the port timing until optimum performance is achieved. Different coatings and strip seal materials will be tested so that we can select the best materials for the production engines.

To keep the cart from passing the horse, we will make certain the five totype engines pass their flight ams before purchasing casting tooling. If all goes well, we should begin selling engines in the fall of 1992. The first pre-production run

will consist of approximately 100 engines. Each limited edition, preproduction engine will be serialized and dated.

We should be able to move much more quickly since I took early retirement as a staff engineer from the Philips Company in November 1991. My own staff at Engine Research Associates, Inc. (ERA) includes part time help from my two sons: Jeff, my Manager of Production and computer guru; and Rick, my Design Engineer. Rick uses MICRO CADAM Cornerstone software for all our engine designs. Both have helped me design and build engines for half a dozen governmental and commercial endeavors. Other members of my team include: George who handles the marketing and helps keep the government contract guys happy; my son-in-law, Dan who does my accounting with one of those fancy software packages; Greg a talented Machinist who supervises the fabrication of our MCC engines; and Jan and LuAnn who are the best secretarial gals in the world. Also Phil Gieseking, Owner of Phil's Hobby Shop, does most of my promotional test flying. I think we have a good idea and I know we have the best people; so you just might have a quiet engine alternative in the future.

On behalf of my staff and myself, I extend to you my deepest regard for your interest and support.

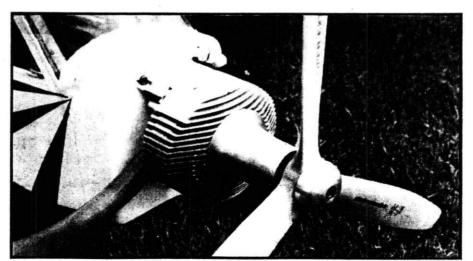
#### MCC Engine Historical Background

By Frederick L. Erickson

In the beginning, January 1969, the MCC engine was brought to life in the back workroom of my home. My first MCC engine was configured as a twocycle. It utilized two combustion chambers, each of which was fed by a separate pumping chamber. The design was typically very noisy. This was OK however, because two-stroke engines are supposed to be noisy. Any attempt to silence a standard twostroke or a single expansion MCC engine leads to back pressure problems and associated loss of power. In those early years, the noise from my MCC engine and the oily exhaust fumes from the glow plug fuel were not well received by members of my household. It didn't take many test runs in my workroom before my family requested that I move my test facility into the garage.

The early model of the MCC twostroke engine was very different from the standard two-stroke piston engine design. It possessed a non-symmetrical port timing capability due to the migrating movement of its combustion chamber. It also had a 90 degree phase relationship between the pumping chamber and combustion

#### E-Cycle Engine Tutorial

To the left is a drawing of the MCC Engine's internal mechanism. The mechanism has three moving parts; Orbiting Piston (OP), Combustion Chamber Member (CCM) and Overhung Crankshaft. The OP and CCM each use four simple strip seals. This is a twin so there is a glow plug hole on each side of the Center Power Block. There are two pairs of primary and secondary expansion chambers in the full expansion design. The June 1992 issue of E-Cycle Journal will give a detailed description of the Erickson-Cycle Full Expansion mode of operation.

chamber. These features made it possible to supercharge the primary combustion chamber to a volume of 1.5 times its total displacement without loosing a significant amount of fuel/air mixture out the exhaust port. The standard two-stroke with its symmetrical port timing and 180 degree phase relationship will lose fuel/air mixture out the exhaust if it is supercharged in this manner. The two-cycle design was developed in the 70's in a variety of sizes. One of the engines powered a mini bike and a .60 CID unit powered a U-control model plane.

As it turns out, the non-symmetrical porting feature, in combination with the 90 degree phase relationship, was the primary key to operating the engine in a reverse direction to obtain full expansion capability. All that remained was to further modify the porting to enhance this mode of operation. Thus in the summer of 1978, the first MCC full expansion engine was fabricated and operated. This event was even more exciting than when the first one operated as a two-stroke in 1969. It was quickly evident that this new cycle engine was extremely quiet, easy to adjust, and

had very good speed range and power. It had these attributes even though its usable swept intake volume was a little less than half of its two-stroke half brother. Due to the engine's ability to expand the high pressure gases out to 3.5 times its swept intake volume, the available power was very good. Current models possess over one HP per CID of swept intake volume at RPM levels between 5,000 and 6,000.

This new cycle of operation is explained by seven method claims in U.S. Patent No. 4,325,331. Eleven other U.S. and foreign patents cover the other attributes of the engine and mechanism.

Features attributed to the MCC full expansion engine are as follows:

- Negligible exhaust noise
- Very high torque allowing use of large, scale propellers
- Low vibration
- Thermally balanced
- Low exhaust energy resulting in low exhaust gas temperature
- Positive exhaust gas extraction Exhaust gases are physically pushed out like a four-stroke engine. This means that the

engine can operate with high exhaust back pressure. The exhaust gases can be pushed out of a long plastic tube through the tail of the aircraft. This will help keep the exhaust residue away from the aircraft's surface.

During the late 70's and into the 80's, several models of the quiet engine were designed and fabricated for various government agencies; such as the Department of Energy, Navy and four contracts with the Army. These engines were designed as either the pure full expansion engine or in one case as a combination of the full expansion design utilizing a pumping chamber and one combustion chamber. This design was refined to operate on heavy fuels like diesel, JP-8 and kerosene. It still remains very quiet with the expansion continuing in two chambers instead of one. A current contract with the Navy will be funding a 50 HP Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) engine utilizing the noisy supercharged two-stroke. They are primarily interested in brute power with the noise being considered a plus for psychological warfare.

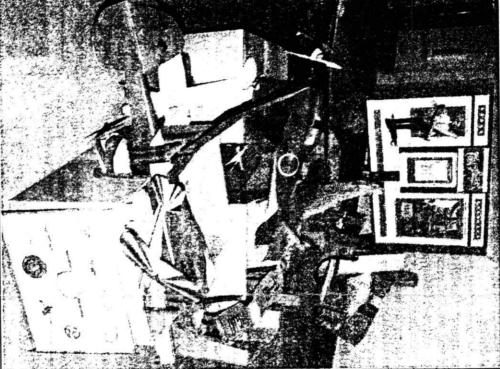
began to bring the Academy of Model Acronautics to Muncie, model airplane enthusiasts from across the country have begun to descend on the city to see its new complex.

"They're coming from all over," Phil Sullivan, public relations director at the complex said Wednesday.

Victoria Veach, executive director of the Muncie Visitors Bureau, said some 2,000 to 3,000 visitors and a similar number of local residents are expected to akend the AMA events each day. But those numbers could be off.

Two model airplane buffs from Muncie who plan to attend the festivities this weekend were enjoying the new runway Wednesday afternoon.

"It'll be great." Munsee Sky Chiefs president Mark Smith said about the complex. "Our whole club is excited about it. We've already used it a lot."

He and novice flyer Stanley Zimmerman called the complex the best in the nation.

"This is going to be the nicest facility in the country, there's no doubt about it. And it's in our own back yard," Smith said.

Zimmerman said the layout of the complex is ideal for model

airplanes.
Other model airplane flying areas will be developed during the next few years for more specialized kinds of craft. A building to house AMA's national headquarters and 70 staff members is also scheduled to be built during the next year. But the future of the AMA

But the luture of the AMA complex doesn't just lie with model airplanes and the academy's 200,000 members. Future plans might include a model boating area and places for remote-controlled cars.

#### DATE LINE - John Scfaffner

Washington, Dec.25,1903 (Special to NY Times) - The invent or of the airship which is said to have made several successful flights in N.C., near Kitty Hawk, are anxious to sell the use of their device to the government. They claim to have solved the problem of aerial navigation, and have never made a failure of any attempt to fly.

Their machine is an adaptation of the box kite idea, m with a propeller working on a perpendicular shaft to raise or lower the craft, and another working on a horizontal shaft to send it forward. The machine, it is said, can be raised or lowered with perfect control, and can carry a strong gasoline engine capable of making a speed of 10 MPH.

The test made in N.C. will be fully reported to the Ordnance Board of the War Dept., and if the machine commends itself sufficiently, further tests will be made in the vicinity of Washington, and an effort made to arrange the sale of the device to the government . The use to which the government would put it would be in scouting and signal work, and possibly in torpedo warfare.

#### SPIN OFF - SPACE - John S.

#### RECREATIONAL SPIN OFF -

NASA technology is finding new applications in the field of recreation. Developments in protective clothing for astronauts have been incorporated into a line of outdoor gear. A design borrowed from Apollo heating element is being used in circuitry rechargeable electric foot-warmers by leading ski-boot mfgrs. Thermaflex is a woven mesh material which was designed to accumulation of moisture under astronauts feet, by allowing air to flow under and around them. The same material is being used in the development of a "staydry" bicycle insole providing more an comfortable athletic and outdoor footwear. Electrically heated ski goggles incorporate technology similar to that once used in Apollo astronauts helmet visors, to provide fog-free sight during an activity total vision. De-fogging demands accomplished by applying heat to prevent moisture condensation. A small battery built into the goggles head band supplies electric heat. Heat spreads across the lenses by means an invisible coating of electricall conductive metallic film.

Now, when you start talking about a trip to Europe, it did not seen right to go all that way and not see some of the highlights, so that's how it grew into 34 days. Before it was over I wished that I had more time.

Some of our members have expresed some curiosity about the trip so I will try to set it down for you in installments. I spoke of the proposed trip in the June '92 TS so that is the real beginning.

An important part of such a journey is the planning. Like any other project, it doesn't just occur. Our traveling companions and we started talking about what we wanted to achieve way back in Jan. and had many meetings to settle the details. We wrote to the Tourist Bureaus of all the countries, acquired airline info and since we decided to use the railroad in Europe, the "Thomas Cook Railroad Timetables" which lists every ain schedule in Great Britain and the European Continent.

With this great pile of info in hand we were able to determine w hat we wanted to see and how to get around to see it. We then met with a travel agent and, with their help, made all the necessary reservations with the air line & hotels that selected. We also bought our "Euralpass" which provides 1st class accommodations on all but a few special trains that run on European continent. This pass relieves a from having to buy a ticket traveler everytime he boards a train. If you don't already know, a travel agent collects a commission on sales and does not charge a fee. No reason not to take a advantage of their knowledge and experience (& let them make all those long distance phone calls).

To begin the trip we selected KLM, not only for its reputation, but that we could fly direct from BWI to Amsterdma, our first city to visit. The flight was made on a 747-400 and departed 17:40. After a long smooth ride at 39-44,000' at 520-680 MPH-GS broke through the cloud over the

#### BELIEVE IT OR NOT ! "CARROLL COUNTY MODEL AERODROME" IS HERE !

On August 25/92 Pres. Wayne Creasy received a permit from CC Dept. of Rec'n. to use the facility near the Humane Society on John Owings landfill until Dec.31/92.

A meeting of the Executive Comm. was scheduled for Sun. Aug. 30 to determine just how we would operate the CCMA. Layout, where to & NOT TO fly, sound levels, # models in air at one time, etc.

Since a layout plan had been submitted to the county & had been appv'd. by the county, Bob Allen, Lloyd Briggs, Ken Eckard & Milt Peacock met at the CCMA on Sat. Aug. 29 to do the layout per the plan. The grass had been cut earlier [short on the runway & slightly higher in other areas]. We staked out the entire area, outlined the pit area with lime, installed five flight stations using two 24" patio blocks flush with the grass.

On Sun. Aug.30, the EC met at noon @ CCMA and established the field rules. I don't know how everyone will be notified of the rules but I will outline the basics:

1= 95 DB max.

2= Max. of <u>four</u> planes in the air at one time 3= <u>DO NOT</u> fly toward the Humane Society. There is a white & green house on the facing hill. That is the edge of the overfly area to the left. [Take-off & landing is the exception BUT stay <u>close-in</u> to the runway] 4= NO fuel spills. Use a catch bottle. 5= Take your trash home with you.

Needless to say the above rules are BASIC. Just use common sense and stay away from the neighbors homes. We all MUST live together.

Generally speaking, the overfly area is directly in front of the flight stations and also across the right end of the field in a basic "L" shape. If you fly there it will not be anywhere close to the Humane Society or any neighbor.

After the meeting flying started and here is the "Believe it or Not". We had not been in operation 1/2 hr. when Mr.Steve Powell, our friendly [ahem!] neighbor showed up stating that we were flying over the Humane Society and his property which is B--- S--- (Baloney Skins). Several of our members spoke to him and politely tried to explain to him that we both must learn to live with each other. We are in a "learning of the area" process and he likewise will have to learn where a model in the air really is. I assure you, NO ONE, was even close to his property. In the first place he is TOO FAR away for a normal flight pattern. He stayed around for about an hr. & left seemingly satisfied that we are trying.

I hope that Howard has no objection of me passing on this bit of information but he didn't say not to.

As you should know, we operate our aircraft radios on the 72 Mhz band and surface craft on the 75 Mhz band. This is legal.

There are freq. used for RC which are not in this spectrum. These are the 50 band. (HAM radio) These are assigned thru cooperation with the American Amateur Radio League and require that the operator have a Han Lic. in his possession. Please note that the use of these freq. without holding the proper lic. is a strict violation of AMA rules with resulting penalties. Even more important, this is a violation of federal law One can always take the view that one is not apt to be caught by the FCC. The problem is that any Ham seeing you operate without benefit of a license has an obligation to turn you in to the FCC in order to protect his own spectrum.

Hey! Anyone in WAM on 50 Mhz? If so beware! We owe compliance with the rules and a courtesy to those Hams who have cooperated in the past and have to protect their own spectrum from encroachment.

Other things of interest are printed in Model Aviation. No point in repeating it here. Stay up-to-date. It pays!

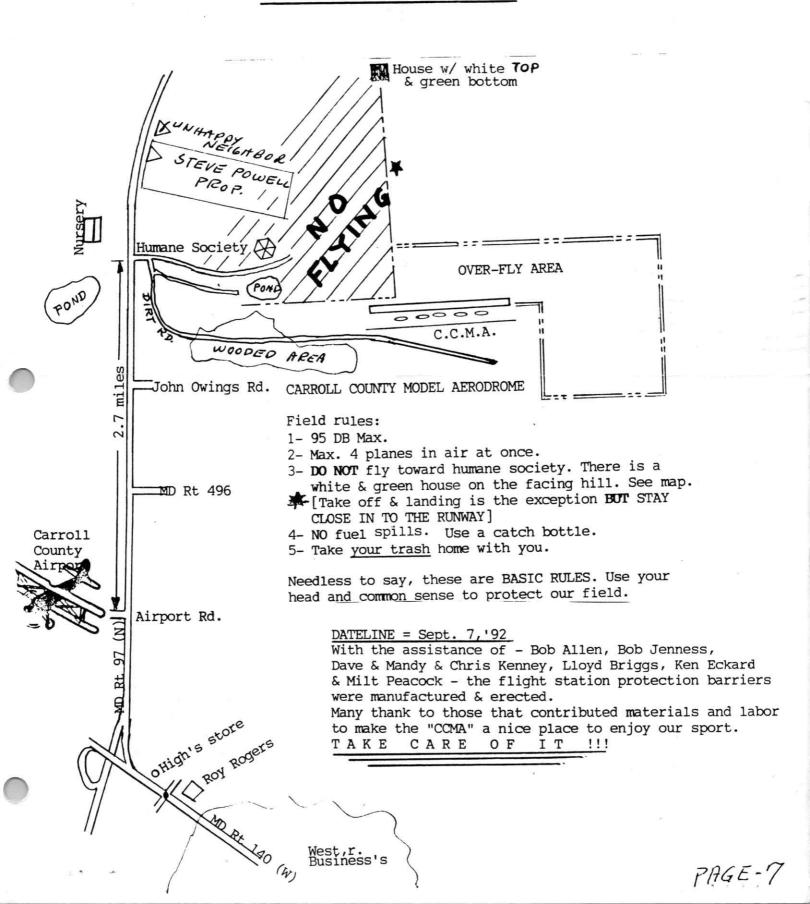

They also have ar actual show with special models for about ½ hr. mid day. All in all it was a very well run affair. A great time was had by all.

We left K/W about 4 PM Sun. with a lot of fond memories and good byes to lots of ole' friends from my travels.

#### TECHNICAL PROGRESS John S.

One of the first & longest lived aviation accessories is parachute. The first successful recorded in history was made by Joseph Montgolfier, co-inventor with his brother of the first balloon. The Montgolfier chute was made about 1779 and was safe enough to drop a sheep. The first man to make a chute jump and live was Jacques Garnierin, at Paris, Oct. 22, 1797. He probably survived because he4 designed a hole in the top of his devise to cut down on oscillation. First great American parachutist was Capt. Thomas Baldwin, of Calif. He was a "star" of 1880's. (ED: his name appeared before in the Talespinner) At least one balloonist discovered parachuting by accident. In

over Easton, Pa., John Wise went so

high in his balloon that it burst.

The casing doubled into the netting,

and an emergency chute was born. Wise

landed hard but staggered to his feet

full of happy plans, later carried

out, to do the accident again on

purpose as a crown catcher.

Baldwin re-discovered the basic design through a chance remark. One day his chute oscillated so wildly that he was slapped to the ground like a ball on the end of a string. "Why don't you put a hole at the top? yelled a boy in the audience. Baldwin

did and the oscillation was eliminated.

Friday - 5 June 1992

So here we are in Holland at this uge airport. I have not had much experience with this kind of travel but, so far-so good. It is now 0637 time & we have been on the go since before breakfast yesterday. Jet-lag they call it, and I know why. There is definitely a lag between the time you decide that you are going to do something & the time that you begin doing it. I've gone without before but we were much younger then. We trade off some travelers checks for Dutch Guilders at the airport, pass through customs & jump on a "people mover" (like a flat escalator) to find our way out of the airport. No problem so far with the language. Apparently English is not an uncommon language in Holland. We had booked rooms for 5,6 & 7 June at the Barbizon Palace, a KLM hotel, so we were able to ride a KLM courtesy bus direct.

We have flown safely across the Atlantic and now between the bus stop & the hotel front door we are in ortal danger of being run over by treet cars & bicycles. Pedestrians in Amsterdam need to have eyes in front, back, & both sides. It seems whoever is the biggest & going the fastest has the right-of-way. It's safer crossing the track at the Indy 500 than Prins Hendrikade.

Next we checked into the hotel only to find that they do not have a record of our reservations. Uh-oh, we are flying KLM & booked our big city hotels through KLM & now this. Well, not to worry. The concierge at the hotel phoned our travel agent in Cockeysville who phoned KLM in Georgia who phoned our hotel & cleared everything. Ah, the miracle of electronics. And all this before breakfast!

Go to bed nothing!! We have breakfast at the hotels' buffet & get moving. Sure, we are dragging, but there's a whole day ahead so we bought tickets for a tour of the city via canal boat. Amsterdam is built on land p-claimed from the sea & we find more anals there than in Venice. The canal

boat ride took us by the older sections of the city, including other things the Anne Frank House which is

now a memorial & the famous "Tower of Tears" where wives & girl friends of departing sailors waved good bye to their men, many for the last time. Life on the sea was a risky business in those days. But many did make it back. This is where Henry Hudson began his voyage to the new world. We return to the hotel early to relax before supper and then after go to bed early. Saturday - 6 June 1992

Next morning at 0620 still suffering from jet-lag & have breakfast at the hotel buffet again, including very strange coffee. We needed that.

We board a bus at 0900 for the "Floriade"", this is a gardening spectacular that is held every 10 yrs. somewhere in Holland. Except for being about an hours drive I don't know what to expect. The drive takes us out of the city & by much industry & new construction in progress. It apparent that the economy here is in good shape. The land is impossibly flat. It is said that on a clear day you can stand on a chair on one side of Holland & be able to see across to the other side. I believe it. Many, many bicycles. Even along the major highways there is a road parallel reserved for bicycles and it too, is busy.

Finally we arrive at the site of the Floriade. There are lots of people, but the show is spread out over a huge there is little, if any, area, so crowding. This place is a combination of Longwood, Sherwood, & several other gardens I've seen - to the power of 10. Very, very lovely. We were too for the tulips, but with everything else we did not miss them. This was the kind of day that we needed at this point in the trip, very relaxing & quiet. The bus returned us to our hotel about 1700.

Since our transportation from here would be by railroad we walked to the "Central Station" which was directly across the strasse & canal from our hotel. (We planned it that way) None of us had any experience traveling European trains so this is the time to ask questions. We had planned our schedule many weeks ago so it was just a matter of finding out where to be standing when our train stopped in the station so we could board with the least hassle.

With that out of the way we returned to the hotel in a light shower to decide where to have supper.

As a side note, there were many derelicts, both old & young, hanging around the plaza in front of the station. Filthy clothes & funky hair-dos & all. Most big cities must have them. Too bad.

We waited out a thunder storm with ice cream at the hotel cafe & after it cleared, walked through the old city to the Albatross restaurant.

After a delightful meal we hit the sidewalk for the return trip to the hotel. We were taking our time enjoying all the new sights until about two blocks from our hotel when that thunder storm caught us without our umbrellas. We took refuse in another hotel to wait it out but after about 45 min. decided to run for it. We got wet. We went to bed. Enough for one day.

#### SUNDAY - 7 June 1992

This morning we breakfast again at the hotel buffet. I will mention here that Europeans are accustomed to a breakfast of breads, cheeses and cold cut deli meats & strong coffee & you will find this everywhere. However, the better hotels also accommodate Americans with a selection of cereals, eggs, bacon & sausage, jams & jellies. We made out just fine with this.

Today we board a bus for a guided tour of the old cheese town of Edam & a visit to a village still operating the old windmills.

While in Edam we visit a small cheese making operation set especially for tourists & buy a small Guda to have for lunch. The commercial cheese mfg. is now located elsewhere & the village of Edam has become an example of a town with historical significance, something Williamsburg. The village residential & expensive for the folks living there. Many of houses date back to 1700, but are kept in "like new" or better condition.

We climb back on the bus to visit a small village in what they call "Poulder" country to get a close up of the famous windmills. The "poulder" refers to the land below sea level which makes up about 50% of Holland.

The canals that criss-cross this area are contained by levees much like parts of the Miss., & the water is much higher than the surrounding fields. It is a bit strange to be driving along a highway & pass a barge & have to look up to see it. The canal network is fed by the many fresh water lakes inland & very carefully controlled by hundreds of dams & locks until it if finally emptied into the sea at low tide.

We were able to closely examine a working windmill that is used to grind pigments for paint. But slightly dissapointed since that the day that we were there was low overcast with drizzling rain & no wind so nothing was moving.

Having seen the windmills we departed for the ride back to Amsterdam in a downpour. Heard that it rains in this area on more than 200 days annually.

The sky cleared about 1600 so we walked to the Bahnhof & had our Eurail passes validated.

For supper we discovered a small restaurant in one of the old narrow streets near the hotel. This area dates back to 1300 & looks it from the outside, but inside all is neat & clean & a very nice menu. The name of the place was "Het Melkmeisje".

Earlier, when we were in the Bahnhof (train station) we bought some gorgeous looking pastries for dessert. Mine turned out to be a delicious apple turnover but my traveling buddy picked one filled with liver pate'. Phooy!! Guess there is no accounting for taste.

We catch our train to Paris tomorrow at 0700, so early to bed.

PS: Amsterdam is exactly 5,397 mi. from Wall, S.Dakota, home of Wall Drug.

New Window into the Human Body.

Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) employs a magnetic field & radio wave to peer inside the body. Unlike X-rays, NMR can even see into the bones. But NMR images are more difficult to interpret than X-rays, which has limited their usefulness. By applying the computerized image enhancement technology developed to read Earth resources satellite photographs, NSAS was able to provide thematic "maps" of the human body. False color can be added to each type of tissue, making such problems as tumors or blood clots stand out sharply & clearly. NMR & image enhancement provide invaluable information to diagnostic physicians & surgeons, enabling them to provide better care to their patients.

#### AVIATION HISTORY - John S.

On June 4,1784 Madame Thible of France has been credited as being the first woman to fly when she ascended in a Montgolfier hot air balloon during a large public gathering. She was said to have shown "much greater courage" than her male companion as she sang the comic-opera aria, "Oh, to travel in the clouds" to the assembled ears below.

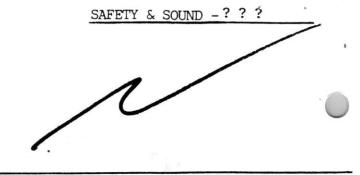

#### TAP-DRILL SELECTOR

NOTE ON SELECTING TAP-BRILL SIZES: The tap drill sizes shown on this card give the theoretical tap drill size for approximately 60% and 75% of full thread depth. Generally, it is recommended that drill sizes be selected in the 60% range as these sizes will provide about 90% of the potential holding power. Drill sizes in the 75% range are recommended for shallow hole tapping (less than 1½ times the hole diameter in soft metals and mild steel.

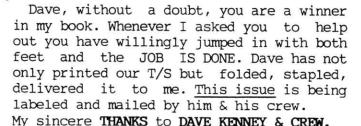

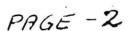

#### EUROPEAN TRIP - John Schaffner Con't. from Oct. issue

Up at 0600 today & make ready to leave Amsterdam. We have a quick breakfast at the hotel, of muffins & coffee, hook up our baggage & tow them across the bridge & plaza to Central Sta.& board the 0700 train for Paris. Not that easy! We were at the wrong end of the platform for the first class cars & had to hurry on past about ten cars to board, all out of breath. Figure we will eventually(& we do). Weather is pea soup. It's a long train ride across Holland into France. The scenery goes from totally flat land into rolling, studded with farms villages, not unlike Caroll Co. Of course the houses & farm bldgs. were of stone & even railroads totally are electrified, you can still see the water towers along the right-of-way that serviced the steam locomotives long ago.

Lunch time comes around & we buy a sandwich & cold drink from the cart that comes through the train. The sandwichs are "jam". That is to say you get either one slice of cheese 1/16" thick jammed into a French roll or one slice of lunch meat 1/16" thick jammed into a roll. No "Dagwood's" here!

We finally run out of the overcast into clear weather somewhat North of Paris & arr. at Gore du Nord (North Sta) about ½ hr. late. We change the Travelers Checks into French Francs at the sta. & catch a taxi for the hotel. This cabbie loaded all four of us in his cab, but then charges us as if two fares. We later find out Paris taxi's legally cannot carry more than 3 people, so he did violate the law. Oh, well!

He gets us to the Hotel et Choiseul at Rue St Honore, which is in the old section of Paris, at first impression is "this isa flea bag" but then after being shown our rooms I am convinced we are in a "flea bag". However it really was not. There was extensive remodeling in progress & we were right in the middle of it. The hotel turned out to be OK & it was located only one blk. from the Jardin de Tuilleries & the Louve Museum. We couldn't have been located much better.

We settled in & walked to & through the Jardin de Tuilleries, Place Verdorne & Place de la Concorde, up Chamos d'Elyses to Place Clemenceau & then along the "right bank" on the Seine, just as fascinating as the books say it is. It was about dinner time so we found a small Italian restaurant nearby to try. Nobody in there could speak English or French so we just bumbled our way through with sign language. All Italians know that. The food was good & not too expensive.

By the time we finished dinner it was growing dark so we window shopped our way

back to the hotel.

Room 414 (our friends Jane & Bud) blew a circuit breaker so they had to be moved down the hallway. No matter. We were too tired by now to make a case out of it. Before going to be we talked to the concierge & made a reservation for a boat ride on the Seine next day early & a bus ride to Versailles the following day.

Tuesday 9 June 1992

We slept well in spite of the loud street noises beneath our windows. Hotels (so far) have no air conditioning or even screens. Just have to endure the noise in the warm with the windows open. We had breakfast at the hotel, a nice spread around an open central court with Victorian (I guess) furnishings. Noticed many Americans having breakfast with us.

For our boat ride we walked from the hotel to the Seine to the landing of the Bateaux Mouches. The "long way of course. The directions given us by the hotel clerk were either incorrect or my French was. The traffic in the area was bumper to bumper & police all over the place. The boat ride was about 80 min. long & looped around the Isle St. Louis at one end the mini Statue of Liberty at the other. The narration was given in English for the benefit of us tourists & was very interesting.

After the boat ride we walked to the Eiffel Tower, erected in 1889 to mark the centenial celebration of the revolution. It was designed by Gustave Eiffel to be only a temporary structure. Almost 1000' high & weighing 7000 tons, it is held together by  $2\frac{1}{2}$  million rivets, nuts & bolts. Yet its pressure on the ground is only 57# PSI. Of course we rode to the top in an elevator that travels inside a leg of the structure & spent some time using the camera. It is said that on a clear day one can see 40 miles. Though not widely known, Eiffel designed the interior framework of the Statue of Liberty.

WE walked back to Place de la Concorde in hopes of meeting an old friend who was arriving on a bus tour, but instead we were to see the mounted accompanying Premier Mitterand, Queen Elizabeth & Prince Phillip. They were

heading for the Arch de Triomphe to perform a wreath laying ceremony at Frances' Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Because of re-directed traffic & huge crowd there was no possibility of finding my friend.

Since we were in the park & near food, what could be better than lunch. Lil & I ordered Crepes Glacèè & our friends stuck with American - hot dog & a beer.

There was a public toilet nearby & it cost to use it. Reminds me of the

jitterbug story. \*

Next we rode to the Metro to the Arch de Triomphe, the largest arch of its type in the world. Construction began in 1806 to mark Napoleon's victories; however it was not completed until 20 yrs. after his death. On Napoleon's birthday (15 Aug) the sun rises directly at the center of the arch. Martial friezes decorate the arch's exterior & the names of some of Napoleon's 128 victories & 558 generals are inscribed on the walls. In front of the arch a flame burns, remembering the Unknown Soldier. An elevator can be taken to the top for a view of the city.

Leaving the arch, we walked the Champs d'Elyses, stopping at a bank to buy more French money, & then boarding the Metro at George V station for the ride back to Touilleries & our hotel. Tonite "dress-up" night for dinner & show at the famous Folies Bergarè.

What an outstanding it was, outstanding, both the dinner & the show. The waiters were dressed as if they were serving King Louis XIV, wigs, lace cuffs, gold buttons, buckle shoes, the whole nine yards! Then a delightful show afterwards. Third row seats. I like to be down front for these shows because I am a little hard of hearing. After the show we were unable to get a cab so had to take the Metro back to our hotel.

Wednesday 10 June 1992

Another noisy night. I heard "Paris never sleeps" & I believe it, but I slept any how. Breakfast at the hotel & then ready for the guided bus tour to Versailles at 0930, touted as the most magnificent Palace in Europe. It was built for Louis XIV, known as the "Sun King" to house his court of over 20,000. The splendor of Versailles overwhelming. Today the chateau seems outrageously big - but it wasn't nearly big enough for the army of noblemen, servants, & hangers-on who moved in with Louis.

The chateau was built by French architects Louis le Van & Francois Mansart between 1662 & 1690. Enter through gilt iron gates & crossover a vast cobblestoned courtyard.

On the first floor, right in the middle, is Louis XIV bed chamber. The two wings were occupied by the royal children & princes of the blood, with courtiers making do in the attic. The hall of mirrors (264' lg.) was the scene of many glittering court occasions & in 1871 where Otto von Bismark proclaimed the unified German Empire after capitulation, & here, too, that controversial Treaty of Versailles, asserting Germany's responsibility for WW I, was signed in 1919.

The chapel & royal apartments, including Marie Antoinette's chambers, are open for view as is 250 acres of formally landscaped gardens.

The day we visited turned out to be wall to wall people & unless you were right next to the guide you couldn't hear diddly, too much commotion, but it was still a fascinating place & well worth the time to see, totally full of French art, history & architecture.

We returned to Paris for a late lunch on the Rue de Rivoli & made plans to get to Notre Dame Cathedral.

We hopped on the Metro again & whizzed under the city to Isle de la Cite where stands this (again) indescribable structure. The building was started in 1163, with an army stonemasons, carpenters & sculptors working on a site that had previously seen a Roman Temple, an early Christian basilica, & a Romanesque church. The chancel & alter were in 1182, but the magnificent consecrated sculptures surrounding the main doors were not put into position until 1240. It remained substantially unaltered until the French revolution when much of the statuary was damaged. Even today, much restoration work is being done, evidenced by a stonecutters shop set up in the shade of the cathedral & scaffolding hiding a portion of the main bldg

We return to the hotel & reserve a table for supper at a place called "Garlands of Jane" in the Place des Vosges. Dinner on the sidewalk by candlelight, good food, good wine, good service & a full moon. What more could you ask for? Just more time to see more of Paris, I guess, for tonight we must prepare to depart for Vience tomorrow.

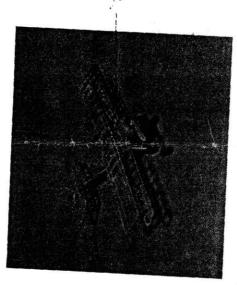

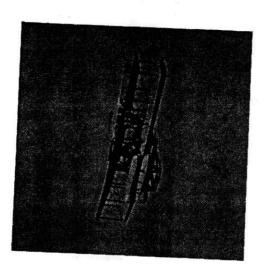

The IMAA annual fly-in of the giants will be held in Chicopee, MA on Labor Day weekend Actual location will be announced later.

#### AVIATION HISTORY - John Schaffner

The Curtiss A-1 Triad (air, land & sea) was the first amphibious aircraft, the first plane to be launched by catapult, the first US Navy aircraft to use airborne radio, at the winner of many speed and endurance records. It's first Navy pilot was Lt. Theodore G. Ellyson, Navy Aviator #1, who first flew the A-1 over San Diego Bay on Jan. 30,, 1912 reaching an altitude of 150 ft. during an 8 minute flight.

There is a flight-worthy replica of Curtiss's Triad residing in the San Diego Aerospace Museum that replaces the one lost in the disastrous fire in 1978 that totally wiped out the museum.

After the fire, aircraft engineer Henry L. Wheeler began building another Triad. Along with volunteer assistance over 4000 hrs. was spent building the replica. After the completion, the aircraft was taxi-tested in San Diego Bay and then on 26 Jan. 1984, piloted by James Dalby, skimmed low over the water at speeds up to 60 MPH. The Triad is on display at the San Diego Aerospace Museum along with 60 other original and replica aircraft if historical significance.

#### **EUROPEAN TRIP - ITALY**John Schaffner

Up at 0545, dressed & out by 0615. Two taxis arrive to carry us to Gare de Lyon to atch the train at 0714. Fare was 44FF each, Juch! We boarded the TGV for the first leg of the ride to Lausanne & departed on time.Our breakfast this AM was "continental" on the train prior to passing thru Dijon. This TGV train is very fast reaching speeds of 180 MPH-We were still sleepy but afraid we would miss something if we even blinked. The weather today is overcast again & we were in and out of light rain & some fog for awhile but eventually it clears. We enter into the Swiss Alps at Vallorbe, a mountain village like something out of picture books. Arrived in Lausanne 1106 (on time) & could have stepped right on another train to Milano but decided to have lunch at the station and continue on at 1255. Turned out to be a good move since we later found that no food this train. Changed travelers served on checks here for Swiss Francs for later. 3

Boarded the train for Milano at 1255 & rode thru Swiss scenery that was simply beautiful, even with a low ceiling & some light rain. There were so many photo opportunities on this stretch that I had to tranquilize myself with a Swiss chocolate bar & a coffee. The lilroad from Brig to Domodossola runs thru the Simpoln tunnel, some 32 km with only rare

breaks into the daylight. In Italy now & passing ancient villages that look as if the Romans could still be living there. Red tile roofs, stucco walls, & houses all joined together at different levels angles. The train has been strictly on schedule & we arrive at Milano with but 10 min. to transfer to the Milano-Venice train. time to fool around. This train was already crowded so we boarded in the 2nd class section & worked up a sweat finding a compartment with four empty seats. We were sharing with two young Italian men who spoke no English (one looked like Balkie) so there was no conversation with them. The ride was thru more light rain off & on, thru very flat farm land, bordered in the distance on both sides by mountains sometimes obscured by haze but backlighted by the late afternoon sun. More picture book scenery. The land seems to planted mostly in grains, orchards &

vineyards.
We arrive at Venice's Santa Lucia station
Schedule & were pleased to find that our
tel was less than a block away. Only a few
minutes drag for our baggage, & right on the

Grand Canal. Our two rooms are side by side & overlooking the canal, if you please, very tastefully decorated & equipped with inside plumbing, but old enough for Leonardo to have lived here. The floors are just a wee slant. The place is still on a fascinating, even after all we have read sbout it. As it grows dark this evening we look out on the canal with the gondolas gliding along & the sound of an operatic tenor singing to the music of an accordion. No boom-box, real thing, very romantic, full moon to boot. We had a light supper of pizza & wine at a sidewalk cafe for about 25,000 lira, did a bit of window shopping, then back to the hotel & to bed. It was a long day on the railroad. Time 2300.

Friday 12 June 1992

Woke up to the noise of the boat traffic in the canal outside. And, it's raining. The traffic is essentially the same as in most cities except it is totally boats. Boats carrying building mat'ls., laundry, produce, cases of food, drinks, supplies for shops & businesses, frozen foods, even a UPS boat. Boats crowded with commuters, going to work no doubt, shoulder to shoulder just like the Metro in Paris.

We had breakfast at hotel & Jane delivered our anniversary cards from our friends. 44th, you know. Very touching. Thank you!

After breakfast we boarded a commuter boat (vaporetto) for the ride to Rialto landing & from there walked to St. Marks Square. When going thru the basillica I could not think of a superlative that is adequate in describing this structure, (or Notre Dame in Paris for that matter). One needs to have a very cold dis-passionate attitude to not be awed by not only the grandeur of this object of man's labor, but by the realization of the vast amount of effort involved in bringing the dream to reality. The architectural design, the artistic talents, the production mountains of materials and last but not least the "hands on" labor that produced the whole. No picture or literal description can ever take the place of being there & seeing for yourself. It is no mere stone building. The entire floor is mosaic, made of every type & color of stone, laid &" piece by &" piece in geometric & artistic design. The entire ceiling, which is domed, is covered with religious artworks done in mosaic millions of tiny pieces of colored tile, glass & marble set in cement. I only wish it were possible for everyone to visit such a place for it will instill the confidence that no task is too big to accomplish if you set

your mind to it.

#### VENICE - Con't. from Page

We walked many back streets & alleys & saw how the people of Venice live & work. I took advantage of many photo opportunities. We had lunch at a "sit down" sandwich shop, not bad at all. Light rain showers off & on all day, not enough to slow us down, but we decided to cancel the gondola ride. Too bad.

Saturday 13 June 1992

Breakfast at the Grand Principe & a short drag to Santa Lucia rail station. Our train parts on time but then loses 21 min. at Mestre, then made an unscheduled stop at Dolo & lost another 6 min. Another stop on a siding before arriving at Padora 38 min. late. Weather now going from overcast to haze. After passing Vicenze we leave the flat country behind & begin to pick up the hills again returning on the same tracks back to Milano. Farms, vineyards & orchards & many wild flowers along the right of arrive at Milano especially poppies. We Centrale station at 1130, 40 min. late, but in time to transfer to the 1205 to Tirano.

Leaving Triano we begin to climb into the untains, passing to old villages with the Mow familiar tile roofs. We are in & out of tunnels here, mountains partially obscured in haze,, villages in the distance appear to be stuck on the slopes as in a photograph. As our train passes the stations villages there appears to be much marble in use in the form of waiting benches & facades on buildings. In & out of tunnels again & then along the shore of a large lake, the highway & railroad side by side. Skinny cedar trees are now appearing on the route between Liernk & Varenna-Esino. We are watching sailboats on the lake & a hydrofoil seems to be pacing the large train. Beautiful mountains now rim the lake & occasionally feed it with a cascading stream. The village of Dervio passes the window showing us more of the tile roofs & some houses roofed with flagstone or thick slabs of slate. My traveling companions are sleepy this afternoon but popping in & out of tunnels is helping to keep me awake. I don't want to miss anything!

We leave the lake shore at Calico & start up thru the pass, going by patches of forest, fir trees all planted in rows. Mountains on both sides terraced with vineyards & neat vegetable gardens. A cleared path for a pipeline takes a straight shot up, out & over the top. Next town is Sondria & there is a short layover to change over to a Swiss crew. Many of the passengers are leaving the train

here. This train was on schedule until now but we depart 17 min. late. As we clear the

town we see the mountain sides loaded down with grape vines. Somebody is going to be drinking a lot of wine. We arrive at Tirano & transfer to the Berninia Express. The station was only 100' away but if it had not been fushe help of a Swiss trainman I would still be looking for it. We were in Switzerland now so had to show our passports before we were allowed to board the train. There was a large tourist group waiting here to board so we just bulldozed our way thru (skuze me, skuze me) to get to the train.

We departed on time, 1530, for St Moritz, but were stopped momentarily to allow a couple of grim looking customs men to board. They OK'd us to continue. The train began to climb thru the Alps giving us what was to be one of the most spectacular rides of the entire trip. I don't believe that there was one section of straight track all the way from Trano to St Moritz. The scenery had my head on a swivel. It was worse than watching a tennis match. The track runs thru mountain villages past doorsteps & windows. The balconies & window sills all hold boxes overflowing with geraniums & petunias. Up, up, up, with the scenery getting beautiful by each mile by the power of 10. Did I mention with all of this a beautiful; blue sky with white puffs drifting along Mountain lakes pass by surrounded by wi poppies & something blue & something yellow & something white & the glacier at Alp Grum. We are above the tree line now, just rocks, wild flowers & snow. As we reach the peak at Berninia I thought I'd be able to describe it later but I've used all the superlatives | know

Arrival at St Moritz is on time, 1756, & we taxi to the Hotel Hauser. Our rooms are on the 5th floor with a grand view of the mountains. After settling down at the hotel we go out to supper at the famous Stephani Hotel Restaurant. A great meal topped off with great Swiss chocolate ice cream. We spend the rest of the evening walking around St Moritz. Darkness this time of the year is about 10:00 PM but we also have a full moon tonight. Tomorrow we catch the famous Glacier Express, an all day ride including dinner, to Zermatt. - - STAY TUNED!

#### SPIN OFF FROM SPACE TECHNOLOGY

John Schaffner

SMOKE DETECTOR = A sophisticated smoke & fire detection system, used in NASA's Skylab orbiting laboratory, is saving lives here on Earth. The detector normally operates on home electrical current, but also continuously self-charging nickel-cadmium battery which automatically takes over if home power fails. The device has an alarm horn which emits a loud piercing warning signal, & sensitivity switch permitting the homeowner to fine tune the detector, avoiding nuisance alarms such as those triggered by cooking. A special feature do-it-yourself testing system which allows the user to make sure all elements of the detector are working properly simply pushing a button.

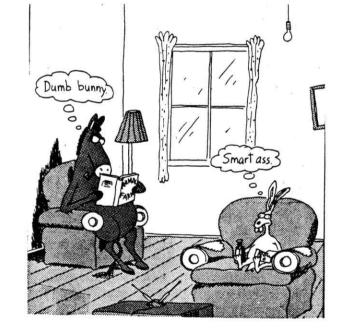
