- 2. The minutes of the December meeting were approved as presented in the Tailspinner.
- 3. President Wunderlich mentioned that we want to have a fun and enjoyable up-coming year. This will be a down year for field repairs and work parties.
- 4. Treasurer Bob Allen passed out the FY2000 budget breakout and proposed FY2001 budget. There was a discussion about the need for a portable toilet at Spiegel. So, come to the field under any circumstances and we'll see what Mother Nature sends us. If flying is impossible, we'll just eat more and try to stay warm while we gab and have fun.



KAMIKAZE AWARD OFFICIALLY PRESENTED TO TOM HIER



Wendell Richards brought his scratch-built Cloud Dancer. This is Wendell's 4th one. (We won't ask about the first three). It's done up in red and gold, has a YS 091 four stroke engine, and weighs 8 1/2 lbs. The wing area is 902 square inches. Wendell decided NOT to use high-tech servos, since a previous airplane crashed and the servos were probably to blame. NICE JOB, WENDELL!!

Our industrious and ingenious Dale Johnston showed off his project which produces a "machine gun" sound. The kit is by RAM and available at Tower Hobbies. The speakers work via remote control. Dale did admit that he put a little more voltage than called for in his 1st attempt and blew up the speaker. With a little reworking and ingenuity, Dale now has a great sound to play with. We're waiting to hear it, Dale.






Ron Bowen's AirplaneFlying on Channel 56





SOPWITH PUP

By Dale Johnston

I took my Nieuport 11 to the Dawn Patrol Rendezvous at Dayton last year

and got to see a lot of great WW I aircraft. One of the best represented was the Balsa USA Pup, both 3/4 and 1/3 size. **There must have been a dozen or more. The 1/3 size has been out for a long time. I first saw one fly in Texas 25 years ago. The 1/4 size has only been out a year or so. I had been thinking of building a 1/3 size for a long time but did not like the popular color schemes. Most WW I allied aircraft were painted dull brown or olive drab to make it more difficult for the enemy to see them. It also makes it more difficult for me as an RC flier. I like mine a lot brighter. I was looking for a subject with natural color, like my Nieuport. The one I found at Dayton was a replica built by Dick King in the 70's. I got photos of the real airplane from an outfit in N. Carolina, but they were of poor quality and covered in a blue haze. As a result, I ended up going with by the coloring on the model, which was built by Eric Williams.

Sopwith aircraft were predominant throughout WW I, starting with the "Tabloid" in 1914 and ending up with the "Snipe" in 1918. The most famous of the bunch was the "Camel," which was made in large quantity and was the largest killer of the war. The "Scout," affectionately named the "Pup" by the pilots, came along in 1916 and was among the first to mount a forward firing machine gun synchronized to fire through the propeller arc. I decided to add machine gun sound and muzzle flash to the .303 Vickers gun on mine. The RAM modules are available from Tower Hobbies for this purpose. One problem with onboard sight and sound is getting it loud and bright enough to see and hear while the plane is flying. I purchased the brightest light advertised to use for the flash and decided to "soup up" the sound to make it as loud as possible. The RAM sound module is advertised as operating at 18 volts. This is misleading, because the two little 9 volt batteries they say to use drop to 11 volts under load. The logical way to maintain better regulation of the battery power supply to use larger capacity batteries. There is plenty of room in the "Pup" and I was not concerned about weight either, so I hooked up two 9 volt transmitter packs in series. Now the voltage stays up to full 18 volts under load. But wait, the output transistor gets real hot under the full voltage. I find that the input capacitor is only rated at 10 volts!! Whoever designed this module did not expect it to be operated at 18 volts, even though it is advertised that way. I replace the capacitor with one rated at 35 volts and installed a better output transistor with a heat sink. The sound is much louder with the modifications. It is hooked up to a 6 inch speaker in the airplane. See you at the field!!



SHEETING FOAM CORES

From RRCC News AMA Newsletter, September, 1999

A friend of mine suggested that instead of using epoxy, sorghum, or other adhesives to attach sheeting to foam cores, try using rug and carpet tape. This is very thin tape that has adhesive on both sides. This made sheeting quick and easy as there is no drying time or need to weight down the surfaces.

You apply the tape to the foam core, peel off the backing, then roll on the sheeting. As this tape is designed to hold down rugs, it does have a strong tack, so be careful when aligning the sheeting with the core.



CHANNEL 28 MAY BE A PROBLEM

At the last meeting, it was mentioned by more than one member that they had had problems when using Channel 28 at Baugher Field. Definite interference occurred on more than one occasion, possible from the barn beyond the left end of the field.

If you are using Channel 28, you may want to redo your transmitter and receiver to avoid a possible loss of your plane. We believe that this interference is not coming from any members who live in the area and who might be operating a transmitter using Channel 28 at their home.

TOO MUCH ELEVATOR

From Prop Wash

AMA Newsletter, September, 1999

If your airplane seems too touchy on the approach, too quick to stall, or wants to snap, the problem could be too much elevator deflection. But you must be careful not to have too little. Catch 22!!

With too little deflection, you may not be able to pll the nose up at slow speeds or you won't have enough deflection to flair. To make your airplane safe, fly straight and level at full throttle, pull full up elevator. If the airplane does a straight and level loop, you are OK. If it snaps (pulls off to one side), it has too much elevator. Reduce the throw and try again. Some flyers like the snap, but most of us like the airplane to be safer at slow speeds.

FLYING REGULATIONS

From Reminisce, January/February 2001 Issue

Martha Hill of Osceola, Wisconsin came across these 1920 regulations for operating aircraft as set forth by the U.S. Flying Service:

- 1. Don't take the machine into the air unless you are satisfied it will fly.
- 2. Never leave the ground with the motor leaking.
- 3. Never get out of the machine with the motor running until the pilot relieving you can reach the controls.
- 4. Pilots should carry hankies in a handy place to wipe off goggles.
- 5. Riding on the steps, wings, or tail of the machine is prohibited.
- 6. No machine must taxi faster than a man can walk.
- 7. Do not trust the altitude instruments.
- 8. If you see another machine near you, get out of its way.
- 9. Pilots never wear spurs while flying.
- 10. If an emergency occurs while flying, land as soon as you can.



DOUGLAS BADER WORLD WAR II TRIPLE ACE!

It was June, 1940. The RAF Flight Commander stared out of the Spitfire cockpit at the black smoke spiraling up from the ruins of Dunkirk. Knowing that the British Army was in retreat below, Doug Bader looked back. As he expected, the four German fighters were coming on fast.

Pulling back on the stick, Bader clawed the Spitfire into the sky. He kicked the rudder, peeling the plane down behind the first of the German fighters. Seconds later, the Spitfire's eight machine guns broke into a staccato roar and the German plane burst into an orange ball. Doug Bader had just downed his first enemy plane. He had also proven that a legless man can be an effective combat pilot.

As a youth, Bader excelled at the English sports of rugby, soccer and cricket. Despite poor grades in school, his athletic skills won him admission to the

Royal Air Force Academy in 1928. Bader received his commission and his wings in 1930. It was December, 1931 when he almost lost his life.

He was flying low over a military airfield when his wing tip caught the ground. The crash pulverized his plane. To save his life, the doctors had to amputate Bader's right leg above the knee and his left leg 6 inches below the knee. According to the King's Regulations, it was the end of his flying career.

But Doug Bader had a mind of his own. As he regained his health, he demanded a pair of artificial legs. Soon after, he applied to the RAF for a return to flight duty, arguing that he was already a qualified pilot. He was furious when he was turned down.

Bader went to work as a pilot for Shell Oil Company; he married and settled down. Golf became a hobby and he was an expert. When he played, he wore a special pair of legs he had made for the game with one leg shorter than the other. The shortened leg compensated for his tendency to hook the ball! His other hobby was racing his sports car through the English countryside, for which he collected a large number of speeding tickets.

When England went to war with Germany in 1939, the RAF was so critically short of trained pilots that the bureaucrats waived the King's Regulations. Bader was soon back in a military cockpitthis time in the middle of the Battle of Britain.

From June 1940 to August 1941, the legless ace downed 22 German planes. All the while, there was a warrant out for his arrest on speeding charges.

At one point, to give him an edge if he had to bail out over water, he filled his legs with ping pong balls. When he climbed to altitude, they started exploding in the thin air! He thought he was under attack! [Thanks to Stacy Clark for this anecdote]

As a Spitfire squadron commander, Bader forever changed the strategy of aerial combat. He evolved the tactic of taking his squadron to high altitudes, where the pilots would wait and watch for German bombers. When they appeared, the Spitfires thundered down at them with machine guns roaring. When Bader argued to the RAF that larger groups of Spitfires flying together could be more effective than the 12-plane squadrons then being used, he was given command of a 60-plane test unit.

Within a month, his special unit destroyed 152 German bombers. As the Battle of Britain receded from the skies over England, the RAF sent its squad-

rons further afield. Separated from his squadron over occupied-France in August 1941, Bader made a solo attack against 6 German planes. He shot down 2 of them, but had his plane sliced in two by the propeller of a third. He bailed out, but his right leg caught on the Spitfire. He hung there as the plane plummeted toward the ground. Finally, the artificial leg snapped in two and he was free.

Parachuting to the ground, Bader was met by German soldiers who took him to a nearby hospital. In an act of respect and courtesy, the German officials radioed the RAF about Bader's lost leg and allowed a British fighter to parachute a new one in for him.

Back on two feet, Bader waited barely 48 hours before he escaped from the hospital by tying a dozen bed sheets together and lowering himself from a window. He was recaptured and sent to a POW camp in Germany.

Bader continued to try to escape and succeeded a number of times, only to be recaptured. Finally, the Germans locked him into Colditz prison--a 200-year-old castle with 70-foot walls built on the top of a sheer 100-foot cliff. By then, his legs were in poor condition and he remained there until he was liberated at the end of the war. Bader returned to England a popular hero, but he

WRAM SHOW REPORT

We boarded the bus at 6:00 a.m. at the Cockeysville Transit lot and headed north to the WRAM show in Westchester, New York. The weather was good: chilly but sunny. We had a full bus and enjoyed coffee and donuts on the way up. We arrived at the show at 10:00 a.m.

As we entered the lobby, we were looking at a large, fully operational RC German tank about 7 feet long. What a project! Entering the main hall there were rows and rows of exhibitors. There were some of the biggest and most unique engines on display that you have ever seen. There were also some 1/4 scale ARFs. They were all balsa. I saw very little fiberglass at the show. Although the emphasis was on aviation, thre were a number of RC car exhibitors on the floor. They even had a 4 lane race track in a side exhibit hall. There were also a number of ship exhibitors including a submersible RC sub with very complicated interior electronic gear.

This year there was a large number of electric flyers on display with Hobby Craft having the largest inventory of kits, motors, batteries, etc. Dumas Aircraft was there with their display of beautiful scale rubber powered aircraft. In that category was our old friends of Penn Valley Hobby Center. They had glow plug Old Timers and hundreds of scale rubber kits and hardware.

Downstairs had most of the RC tools and hardware on display, and vendors were doing a brisk business. AHC of New York City had set up shop in one corner and was moving a lot of transmitters and kits. It was a smaller display than last year, though. All of the flight pack gear and batteries could also be found downstairs.

Upstairs off the balcony level were the static display rooms for aircraft and marine competition. This year there were fewer large aircraft on display, except for one gigantic model of a B-25 Mitchell. It took up the whole stage and had to be 15 feet long. In the ship static display area was a very large "baby" flattop which was sunk in the Battle of Leyte Gulf in the Philippines.

In the SWAP shop, I saw a Stuka, just like Milt's going for \$1,250.00. There was not as much action in the shop as last year. On the main level off to one side was a very large room with a full scale original French Morane-Saulnier fighter of 1914

with a full rotary engine. It was on loan from "Old Rheinbeck."

We left the show at 3:00 p.m. and headed south. The cargo bay of the bus had plenty of kits and gear to take home. We arrived at Cockeysville at 8:00 p.m. with only one stop. The show was well attended but some vendors from past years were not present. Milt Peacock, Dale Johnston and myself went on the bus. Bill McKenzie drove up on Friday. We all enjoyed the show and look forward to attending again next year.






ANOTHER LABOR OF LOVE

JOINING SHEETS OF WOOD SEAMLESSLY

From <u>The Aviator</u> Frederick Model Airplane Club

One of the major problems that we have when constructing the size planes that we are interested in is getting a plank of wood that is long enough, or splicing two pieces at an angle. The method develoed by Jim Follin not only eliminates this problem, it yields a joint that perfectly matches, is easy to do, and gives a joint that is stronger than any other place on the plank.

To make a joint, overlap and tack glue two pieces of wood so that they give you the length/ angle that you want the finished piece to have. Then make a wavy saw-cut through the overlapped edges. Break apart the two pieces, discard the wavy-cut ends of both pieces, and join the two pieces along the cut. They will fit **perfectly**, since they were both cut at the same time.

Ray's Rule of Precision: Measure with a micrometer, mark with chalk, and cut with an axe.

John Schaffner brought in a "Buzzard Bombshell," an adaptation of a 1930's free flight aircraft modified for RC flight. It's a pretty blue and yellow plane with a scalloped trim scheme, and powered by a K&B 0.45 engine. Should fly well!



BAUGHER'S FIELD WORK DAY

Just a personal note of thanks to the members who helped with the field on May 5. (See names above).

Here is what we accomplished:

The field was cut. 2. The stickers and limbs along the stream were trimmed back to make grass cutting easier.
 100 feet of silt fence was removed along the stream from last years' drain work. That same area was dressed and rolled. 4. 100 feet of 4' high spectator fence was installed. 5. 50 feet of 3' fence was put up to create a pit area. 6. Landscape ties were put around the worktables and those areas filled with stone. 7. A 20 foot tall pole with a windsock was erected next to the impound box. 8. Three panels on the metal shed were replaced where fertilizer had eaten through the metal. 9. We disposed of most of the stone left over from last years drain work.



Agronomist John Sterrett has armed us with a squirt bottle of RoundUp which is in the impound box at Baugher Field to control any weeds which decide to sprout in the gravel around the impound box. THE PROBLEM: Does your "ZAP Kicker" spray bottle get clogged? (I can only speak about "ZAP Kicker", I haven't used any other). When you purchase the small bottle, it comes in a plastic container with a red top. (NOT the 'kicker' itself, but the tube (?) or bottle it was delivered in).

SOLUTION = When the 'kicker' is NOT in use, return it into the tube it came in & replace the red cap. Apparently the fumes from the product act upon the sprayer and it DOES NOT become clogged. It works for me!

<u>THE PROBLEM:</u> Does your *Permatex* "RTV Clear Silicone Adhesive & "High-Temp RTV Silicone Gasket Maker" become hard in the tube long before you use it up?

SOLUTION: 1. After use, wipe the excess goo from the tube. 2. Fill the cap with Vaseline Petroleum Jelly and then replace the cap. The next time you wish to use the RTV, squeeze out a drop or two to remove the 'jelly' from the tube and you will find the RTV as ready to use as it was originally. A tube lasts me over a year and it is still as good as new each time I use it.

This picture is terrific. Here is a case where flying the airplane is the easy part, but getting into the cockpit requires chasing away a pride of lions. THE FOKKER SCOURGE

By Dale R Johnston:

The Fokker "Eindecker" was one of the very first fighter aircraft. The name comes from the German "ein", meaning one, and "deck", which refers to the wing, thus a "One Winger". It was designed and built for the German military by Tony Fokker, a Dutchman. The prototype for the E-Series was produced in 1913 just as storm clouds were gathering for the "Great War". The Fokker E-1 had the first fixed forward firing machine gun installed that was synchronized with the engine to fire through the arc of the propeller without hitting it in 1915. The increase in effectiveness of a fixed forward firing weapon, where the entire airplane was pointed at the target, was a major breakthrough for accuracy in air gunnery, and heretofore only achieved by airplanes with pusher propellers. The great advantage achieved by the axis forces resulted in almost complete control of the skies over the western front, which lasted until the allies got around to installing similar systems on their aircraft. Among the first of these was the British Sopwith Pup, and the French Nieuport 17. The early German Aces flew the Eindeckers. Oswald Boclcke, who developed fighter tactics, and Max Immelman, erroneously credited by some as having invented the "Immelman Turn" both flew them. (Actually it would have been impossible for Max to have done so because the airplane was incapable of performing a half roll, but that's another story.)* The Fokker E-111 was produced in the largest quantity but differed very little from the l's and 11's. They were inferior aircraft compared to the allied types, but the gun more than made up the difference. They used wing warping for lateral control like the original Wright Brothers airplanes, which had been made obsolete when Glen Curtis invented the aileron.

I built my first E-111 model from scratch about 15 years ago. It was 1/5 size and turned out to be a real pleasure to fly. I recently got to thinking it would be nice to have a larger one. I had been very impressed with Proctor kits since I built the Nieuport 11. They are exact scale and of excellent quality so I decided to try their \(\frac{1}{4} \) scale E-111. It is the only kit on the market with actual wing warping. It turned out, however, that the Eindecker kit was designed by Dick Heining who had previously bought the business, and not Lou Proctor himself. The quality of material in the kit was good, and most of the hardware was furnished. Metal sub assemblies e.g., landing gear, cabanes, etc., were pre-built, but I was disappointed in the method of construction for the airframe. The text and pictures in the construction manual were hard to follow and often did not agree with the plans, which also contained errors and omissions. I learned that Dick has recently sold out and moved to Arizona. The model is made up almost entirely of hard wood and brass. About the only balsa in the kit is the cap strips for the plywood wing ribs. The reason given for the unorthodox method of construction was to try and copy the way the real airplane was made. For example, hardwood dowel is used instead of square balsa longerons and cross members to simulate metal tubing used in the fuselage. This might have seemed like a good idea at the time but turned out to be very hard to work with and will never be seen anyway when the airplane is covered!

I am installing an O.S. 120FS for power and building a dummy rotary engine to go around it. Am also working on an improved machine gun sound system for the single Spandau. It will be covered with linen Solartex. I hope to be flying it this summer. See you at the field!!

STICKY SITUATION

I got this hint many years back from Tom Durham. To epoxy hinges in place, first flatten a plastic straw, mix your epoxy with a bit of alcohol, dip the straw into the epoxy, and hold the other end with your finger. By popular request (and Pat Kowalski), WAM will have its 4th (I think) annual crab feast. This event


is open to spouses and significant others. Children are also welcome.



IN ALIGNMENT

When laying out lines, emblems, sunbursts, etc. on a covered model, you could use a fine point marker, but I have found it sometimes stains the covering. Instead, cut out some strips of low-temperature film and use them as your guides. The heat from your fingertips is usually enough to hold the strip in place, then you can set your design in place, remove the guides, and heat the design on permanently.

This method works really well when putting on letters and numbers.





LET'S FLY SOME COMBAT

HOW DID IMMELMAN TURN?

Max Immelman, known as the "Eagle of Lille" was an early WW I flying ace. Some say that he invented the "ImmelmanTurn", which today is a standard acrobatic maneuver consisting of a half inside loop with a half roll at the top that accomplishes a 180 degree in a vertical plane. My research into the subject disclosed that he could not have done so. Be-

degree in a vertical plane. My research into the subject disclosed that he could not have done so. Being an R/C scale modeler with a preference for WW I subjects, I decided to build a 1/5 size copy of Max's machine which was a Fokker Eindecker. Eindecker is a German word for Monoplane. There was a progression of the design from E-1 through E-IV. The Fokker E-111 which I modeled became the standard and was produced more than the others.

I was surprised and disappointed to find that my model would not perform an "Immelman Turn" as I had been lead to believe it should. Now the Fokker Eindecker was an archaic design that used wing warping for lateral control, a throwback to the earliest Wright Brothers airplanes. Definitely not state of the an even for 1915, and was easily outmaneuvered by allied planes that employed ailerons. Its success as a fighter was not due to its flying characteristics but because it had a fixed forward firing machine gun synchronized to fire through the propeller arc which made it more accurate than the swivel guns used by the allies at that time. I first thought I must not be getting enough warp in the wings even though it was built according to scale drawings. I increased the warp as much as I could but it still refused to roll. After seeing my frustration a friend suggested that perhaps the real airplane couldn't roll either. But how was that possible? Max had invented the turn himself in the Eindecker hadn't he? Or so I had been told.

My friend showed me a book from the Smithsonian Institution that described Immelman's maneuver as a climb with a "rudder reverse" at the top! I started checking other sources and found that most of them agreed it was a turn more like a "Wing Over." One allied flyer that faced Immelman in combat was quoted as saying "The Eindecker was incapable of performing a roll" and that the Immelman turn was actually a "Chandelle," the French name for a climbing turn. Some say he did the maneuver as we know it today and a controversy continues. One issue of "Cross & Cockade" magazine contains a discussion of the subject with pros and cons, but the bottom line is "The airplane couldn't do it."

I wrote to the curator of the Champlin Fighter Museum in Mesa, Arizona, where I had seen a full size replica of the E-III. I was rewarded with a very nice letter from Jim Appleby, the builder of the airplane. Jim informed me he had built and flown two full size E-11l's and was unable to get either one to perform a roll. It seems the original design did not intend for the aircraft to be fully aerobatic and the amount of warp provided was enough to keep the wings level for ordinary flight. I could not find any evidence that Max ever flew any other aircraft in combat. He apparently fought (and died) in the Eindecker.

So how did this man get a maneuver named after him that he never ever performed? It could have been an optical illusion. I'm sure the advocates thought they saw a half roll. We all know how our models play tricks on our eyes; sometimes they seem toturn inside out! Max originated a tactic that accomplished the same thing, i.e., a turn with an increase in altitude. When more advanced aircraft were fielded that could perform the half roll, the tactic was thus improved and Max Immelman got the credit for it.

Editor's Note: Thanks again to Dale for a great article. This is very interesting, well-written, and informative. Dale does know his stuff, and I'm glad he decided to share it with us.





Here is what James Gloss had to say ahout fuel tank pressure. When your .46 engine is at idle, the pressure return line delivers only about 0.02 psi


to the fuel tank. At maximum rpm, it gets about 0.8 psi. While operating your plane inverted, the hydrostatic head of the fuel tank cancels about 30 % of maximum, which leaves only about 0.5 psi. As your engine ages, these values decrease even more.

To really increase the feedback pressure to the fuel tank, install a check valve in the feedback line from the muffler to the fuel tank and watch the pressure double. Increase pressure will improve the overall running of your engine and give you a great idle. This achieves the same goal as a pump except it is pushing the fuel instead of pulling it. The pump only pumps efficiently if the rpms are up. With the check valve, when you start your engine and rev it up, the fuel tank will become pressurized and maintain its high pressure even at idle.

Tower Hobbies has this check valve under the Foremost brand for about \$ 5.00

We have a great hobby, a fantastic membership, wonderful camaraderie, and a great future here in WAM. To those newer members, please do not take this club for granted! We are where we are today through the efforts of many, many fine people. So when you go to the field to fly, remember the efforts of those who have guided this club to where it is today. We have it very easy compared to those who went through the rougher times. If you can find a way to help WAM in any way, do not shirk your responsibility and let "someone else" do it. Jump in, run for office, volunteer to run an event, and keep this club at the high level that it is today.



Subject: From a friend in Germany...

My words make no big difference, but after being in total shock yesterday I need to tell you that: Yesterday not only America and the American people had been attacked by some very weak people - it was an attack against us all! Take one thing for granted: the American people are not alone!! Our German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder said yesterday "This is a declaration of war against the whole civilized world" and we all over here agree with that.

I just can tell you a bit what happens over here: All people I know are deeply shocked, nothing else but this issue is discussed, major events and festivals in Germany had been cancelled, the US Embassy and US Armed Forces camps, federal and Israeli buildings and airports are protected massively by the German police, all flags on federal buildings and official institutions had been lowered, schools celebrating a minute of silence, a "march of silence" with thousands of people took place in Frankfurt today, the German Army is partly on higher alert and after several bomb alerts in Berlin and Frankfurt buildings had been evacuated today, but no bombs had been found. NATO declared the state of joint defense. This is article 5 of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization pact and it has never been used before! That means that NATO had been attacked and all countries that are part of NATO will help the USA in case of retaliation. Chancellor Schroeder declared that in front of the press a few minutes ago and he made clear that Germany will take part in whatever measures will take place.

When you know our history after WWII you might know that we don't do something like that so easily, but this is the time to stand up and show attitude. The organizers of this mass murder should die, no doubt about that. But it's important to get the right people. A blind bombing of some cities somewhere in the world will not help us in any way. Terrorism needs to be fought in a different way, it will be difficult and it could bring a lot of changes in this world and in our lives. But whatever those terrorists do: they can't bring us down on our knees!
