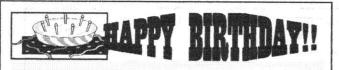

PERSONAL WINDSOCK

From HCRC Flier Peter Ciosek, Editor

One of the things we all learn about

flying is that we always take off and land into the wind. Even if there is only a light breeze, it is important to have it working for you, increasing your air speed and decreasing your ground speed. Occasionally, of course, you might have to land downwind if the plane is "dead-stick" or there is some other problem. But why would a pilot attempt a downwind takeoff? I have seen this several times recently at our field, once with the predictable stall and crash. There are at least two possible explanations for this.

1. The pilot is so comfortable with a left hand landing pattern that he really doesn't want to take off of land from the right, regardless of the wind.

The pilot is unaware that the wind has changed, especially on days with light and variable winds.

Number one can be cured by practice on a right hand pattern, and there is an easy cure for number two. Tape a short section of old cassette tape to the end of your antenna. A 12" length is about right. This light, thin plastic will respond to the slightest change in wind direction and serve as your personal windsock. You don't have to turn around to see the club's windsock or take your eyes off your plane. Incidentally, if you don't have a blank or damaged tape to use, you can use flagging ribbon such as is used to flag trees. (The last suggestion is Eddie the Editor's).

As a glider guider, I try to be sensitive to the wind as one clue to finding thermals, so I am naturally surprised when I see a flyer attempting a downwind takeoff. Ground speed means nothing without air speed. You really can't fool Mother Nature.

ELECTRIC STARTER SAFETY

I have seen people starting engines by turning on their electric starter and jamming it against the spinner or prop hub. This is both unnecessary and dangerous. The starter could slip and break props or needle valves or your hand could go into the prop.

Please, if you use an electric starter, place the starter firmly on the engine and then turn it on. This will save a lot of broken equipment and will create enough torque to turn your engine over effectively.

COLD WEATHER FLYING

Now that the cold is here again, here's a few tips, reminders, about flying in freezing weather. Some of them have been picked up from different articles, some from members, some from experience, some from who knows where.

- 1. Keep your batteries well charged in your flight box, ni-start and radio equipment. The cold temps really cut back on the efficiency of batteries. They don't hold a charge as long as in summer. Leave your radio, flight box, etc. inside your car or somewhere else that is warm when not in use. (As long as you leave your car running like most everyone does.)
- 2. Switch to a higher nitro content in winter, (15%). The engine will run better because of the hotter operating temperature. Keep your fuel warm, too, if possible.
- 3. Keep your plane in a warm place. It usually makes the difference of either getting your engine to start and doing some flying or just going for a nice drive. I learned a new trick from Marty at the last Fun Fly and that is to put your plane under the engine of your car if you have the ground clearance to do so. If you keep your plane inside the car and have skis on, make sure when you bring the plane out that you immediately push it around in the snow until the skis are cold, otherwise the snow sticks to the skis and the plane won't glide too well.
- 4. After you get the your engine running, leave the ni-start or plug lead on for a little while. Let the engine run at rpm until it warms up. You don't need to rev it up real high or stab at the throttle. Just let it run for a few minutes. You'll probably have to set the idle speed up slight higher, even after the warm up period.

In the winter time, it is possible to also connect an exhaust tube to the muffler to keep the fuel off of the plane. Fuel freezes to it and makes it difficult to remove until to remove until you warm up the plane. Then it runs all over. You'll probably have to richen the engine some, but it's nice having to clean airplanes to bring home. For tubing, I use a piece of clear plastic fuel line that can be purchased in any auto store. A hose clamp will hold the tubing on, and to keep the clamp from coming loose, due to vibration, Hot Stuff or epoxy works well.

The following are observations of actual happenings. Before any attempt at winter flying, cold soak your plane, transmitter, starter box battery, electric fuel pump, glo driver, starter, etc. Things that work well in warm weather may not work in lower temperatures. Radios, servos, and batteries may work at 40 degrees, but not work at 35 degrees. An airplane taken out of a warm car can cool off in the air and crash if the radio has a cold sensitive problem.

Engines that did not run well in warm weather may not run at all when cold. Check head, back plate screws, etc. and maybe try a new glo plug. The carb may need both high and low end adjustment.

Be cautious when running the engine with the antenna down. Wet ground, snow, pulse glo drivers, etc. can cause radio glitches during winter operations.

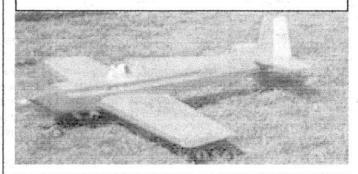

Tech Talk

by Jim Maroldo

Over the years we've seen many different ways to install radio gear in our models, some clean, some not so. One of the most often neglected areas, however, is the wire dressing within the model itself.

Most of us know that the receiver antenna should be routed as far away as possible from any power leads to avoid any stray pickup of interference (you do know that, right?). A corollary to that is that all leads should be fastened somehow to the framework of the model. This is often not a problem with the smaller planes as things are often pretty cramped anyway, but in the larger stuff, we find lots of open space within the cabin area. If leads are left to fly around loose, they will eventually fail due to metal fatique. one of our club's members had this happen to a power switch once which resulted in the loss of his aircraft! The post-mortem didn't reveal any obvious cause for the loss of control until we disassembled the RX switch. While the insulation was completely intact, one of the wires inside was broken at the strain relief just as neatly as if it had been done with a knife!

The moral of this story is simple: a tie-wrap or two, placed at strategic locations along the servo and power leads will go a long way toward a long life for that new plane!

Tips and Techniques

The Model Doctor Fiberglass Hint

How do you get the creases or lumps out of the fiberglass cloth we use to reinforce the center section of the wing? This method will probably eliminate them. Prior to applying the fiberglass cloth to the center section of the wing, take the time to iron it flat with your clothes iron. This will make it soooooo much easier to achieve a FLAT surface. Next, place the glass cloth on the center of the wing and tack it down to the surface with one drop of CyA (each corner, top and bottom). This may require that you have to pull the cloth taught, but don't overdo it! Now you should have the cloth resting smoothly on the top of the wing. Now apply the resins (or CyA) over the cloth. You may find that after 3/4 of the cloth is attached that you now have puckers along one edge or the other, but this is easy to fix. Lift the material where you tacked it to the wing (remember I said to tack it down, not permanently attach it), pull taught, and tack it down again, there you have it!

Failsafe: Fact and Fiction

How many of us who own a Pulse Code Modification (PCM) computer radio can honestly say that we have thoroughly read and understood the manual that comes with it? If it was anything like the manual that came with my Futaba 8UAPS it was about as an inviting read as the Greek classics in Latin, and made as about as much sense. I have been told that the JR manual is written better, but in either case help is at hand.

Harry Higley publishes an excellent book covering the basic set up for both the Futaba 8UA and the JR XP8103 for airplanes. Unfortunately, the book makes little mention of failsafe, and in fact leaves you with the impression that if you do not program this menu then there are no parameters set in this function or that this function is even activated. WRONG!

A large number of PCM radio owners are under the same impression. After a recent fatal accident in the United Kingdom a survey of the clubs PCM users showed that 80% did not know that they had active failsafe and/or what those parameters were. If you operate in PCM mode you have active failsafe, period!

If you have not gone in to the program menu and entered your own parameters then your model will default to the factory settings if the signal is lost. Do you know what these are? If you don't you could be in for a nasty surprise if you ever suffer interference.

First, understand that failsafe is not going to stop your model from crashing if the signal loss is long enough. What it will do is allow you to program parameters in to the menu that will help keep damage to the rest of the equipment to a minimum, and, from a safety standpoint, stop your model from coming out of the sky at full bore pointing at who knows what.

Let's start at the beginning of the menu. I have both the JR347 and Futaba 8UAPS and the menus are set up the same way, just the button(s) you push to

enter the information are different.

First choice is the amount of time delay from the loss of signal to entering the failsafe mode. The choices are in fractions of a second, and I don't really think it makes a big difference which one you use. I personally use the longest one.

Next is the choice of the position of the servos should the model go into failsafe. The factory setting is normally "hold last known position," not good if you happened to be in the middle of a snap roll at the time! In the case of Futaba the throttle will go to 50%, still a hard way to hit the ground! To enter your own settings in most cases just hold the control surface where you want it to go and press the data enter button(s). To check the function and to see if the inputs you programmed are correct just turn on the transmitter and receiver, wait one minute, turn the transmitter off and see what happens.

Why wait one minute? The transmitter sends the failsafe information you programmed to the receiver automatically once every minute, try this before then and you get the factory setting.

One of the last functions that falls under this section is battery failsafe. There is nothing to program here, just be aware of it and how it operates. When the airborne battery (in the case of Futaba) drops below a preset voltage the failsafe function moves the throttle to a predetermined position or to the position you programmed in the failsafe menu. In the case of Futaba you may temporarily reset the function by moving the throttle stick back to idle which will give you about 30 seconds of control before the battery function reactivates.

It is as simple as that, so are most of the other functions once you have been through the menus a few times. Play with your setup at home on the bench. If you really mess things up there is always the Data Reset function, which will put everything back to the original factory settings. Try to learn as much as you can about your own radio. I am always happy to give advice or lend a helping hand to programming the Futaba 8UA, but don't just hand the radio to someone and expect them to program the whole thing for you. You may not have to build or cover your own models in this hobby anymore, but knowing how to set up your computer radio properly can make all the difference in the world as to how your aircraft will fly and handle in the air.

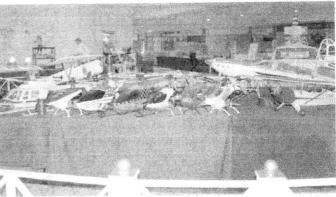

HOME GROWN!

Martin A-30 Baltimore

Manufactured by the Glen L. Martin Co. Middle River, MD (now the Martin State Airport)

The Martin A-30 Baltimore was initially designed as an improved and larger version of the Martin A-22 Maryland. This new design was given the designation A-23, but the Army Air Corps wasn't interested in the aircraft and it never went past the design phase. Great Britain was interested in the design and ordered 400 aircraft as Martin Baltimore Mk. I, II & III.

Early in World War II, before the US entered the war, the United States signed Lend-Lease agreements with Great Britain for export of the Martin Baltimore and used the A-30 designation strictly for contractual purposes. The aircraft was never intended to enter service with the Air Corps. The initial contract was for 281 Baltimore Mk.IIIA's. Additional Lend-Lease agreements for improved Baltimore Mk. IV and Mk. V aircraft using the A-30A designation were also signed.

The Army Air Corps received a few A-30's under reverse Lend-Lease agreements for second line missions like staff transport, trainer, liaison and patrol.

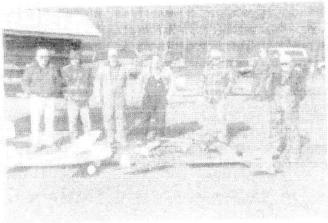

Wax Paper

Hints and Tips

Colored Canopies

Rit Cloth Dye, available in most supermarkets, fabric stores, or drug stores, will tint the clear plastic quite well. Mix up the dye in luke warm water in a container large enough to immerse the entire canopy. Dip the canopy for a period of one minute or so, until you get the feel of how fast the dye is "taking." Rinse in cool water and dry off. If it is not dark enough, dip it again. You can even be tricky about the tint by making a fixture to hold only a certain part of the canopy in the dye. The effects you get are only limited by your imagination.

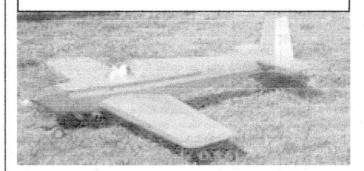

Welding aluminum with a propage torch

It is possible to weld aluminum with a propane torch. No expensive mig or tig welder is required. The finished joints look like they have been soldered rather than welded, but it is strong and worth consideration. Some practice is necessary to get the hang of it because aluminum does not get red like other materials when it is welded; it simply melts away without warning. You need to heat the aluminum and remove the flame, then touch the rod to the aluminum. (Do not melt the rod in the flame of the torch. This creates a meltdown that will ruin the project.) Some possible uses are repairing landing gear, making or repairing mufflers, wing struts, or any other small aluminum part.

Good gluing

A good glue joint is no accident, but it is not hard to achieve either. Materials must be clean and dry, and the pieces should make a good fit; most glues are not fillers. When gluing wood, your best choice is often to use white or yellow glue. Be sure to use a waterproof version if the materials will be exposed to moisture or humidity. Pressure should be applied until the glue sets. For most modeling applications, this can be accomplished with clamps, rubber bands, or T-pins. A good glue joint is usually stronger than the material being glued.

Steaming dents

No matter how hard you try to protect a model airplane, there always seems to be some hangar rash before you are finished. Here is a fix for a mild dent. Get out the iron, set it to steam, cover the dent with a damp rag, and get to work. The steam will cause the wood to expand, in effect, swelling the dent out. If the wood fiber has been crushed, put the iron away and get out the wood filler or be prepared to cut away the damaged part and replace it.

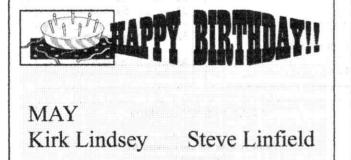

You can fly right side up, now try inverted flight

By JOSE VAZQUEZ

You have mastered flying right side up, or so you think. Your next challenge is to fly upside down.

While not required for all, knowing how to fly inverted could save your airplane.

I remember the first time I flew an airplane with flaps. After a brief takeoff with full flaps, my model started to loop and was on its way back to the ground. Since the flaps were new to me, I didn't realize what kind of effect they would have on the aircraft. I was even less familiar with the flap knob so I was not able to make a correction using it. My solution was to stop the loop by flying the airplane inverted while I cleared my mind and readjusted the flaps.

Flying inverted can save your airplane in many other instances, such as when your model drops from a hover or when you are not able to complete that low pass loop.

So how do you do it?

It's easy. When inverted, two of your controls—the elevator and the rudder—will feel like they are reversed. The ailerons will feel this and turn the airplane in the same direction as if it were flying right side up.

The easiest way to learn to fly inverted is by starting a loop (make sure you are at least 200 feet up for safety). When you reach the top of the loop, try to keep flying while inverted, like an immelmann without the roll. This will require you to apply down elevator (stick away from you) and steer/maintain level flight with your ailerons. Note that you will apply down elevator to raise the airplane's nose and up elevator to bring the nose down (opposite of what you've already learned). If you feel uncomfortable, just pull on your elevator and complete the loop.

Once you can hold the airplane steady for a while, use your ailerons to fly it like you would during regular flight. Fly a pattern around and do some figure eights. When you feel comfortable with this, you can start to use the rudder to make your coordinated turns, but remember that now the rudder acts opposite what it does when you're flying right side up. From there, it is up to you to see how many maneuvers you can accomplish while inverted—loops, snaps, spins, etc.

You can also perform a half roll to get your airplane inverted, but I do not recommend that when you are starting out since there is a greater loss of altitude involved if you make a mistake.

FOR LAUGHS: Basic Radio Control definitions

Angle of attack: Direction from which you are hit after setting up a nice mid-air with your clubmate's new airplane.

Autorotation: What your car does on icy roads.

Balsa: What dreams were made of.

Bernouillism: Name of an antique sect regularly discussing religious problems (the weight of air, the speed of air, the 'mystic' reconnection of air). Also—auto generates flames.

Blind nut: Judge at a pattern contest.

Carpet fiber: When others are bragging about their high-tech composite airplanes, and you have only the Gentle Lady you built on the floor of your two-room apartment, you mutter quickly, under your breath, "Yep, this baby's reinforced with carpet fiber!"

Circle tow: How to point someone in the direction of the scoring tent when you have both hands holding your airplane together until the quick epoxy sets.

Crash: Quick method of removing the radio and engine from one model to fit them in your new model.

Center of gravity: Point in which G-forces, dedicated to separating wing from fuselage, do their stuff.

Computer: Device that enables you to make mistakes at the speed of light.

Cyanoacrylate: Special glue, designed to instantly glue fingers to balsa structures. Also—special glue, instantly curing when parts are misaligned, will hardly (if at all) cure when parts are correctly aligned. Also—substance used to make eyes water profusely at critical points in construction.

Dead stick: Two of these can be found on your transmitter after failing to properly charge your batteries. Also—how the yucca your aunt gave you to clear the air in your shop looks after three months lack of water. **Downwind turn:** Sensitive item that, when posted in rec.models.rc.air, will generate more than 100 entries. **Engine:** Device designed to make noise. It will suddenly stop making this noise when beyond glide-in distance. **Epoxy:** The stuff that has replaced the balsa after the flying season.

Failsafe: Option on PCM radios that allows a pilot to choose whether to crash nearby or far away.

Firewall: Removable part of fuselage that comes off on landing.

Flare: What someone has when they're good enough to show off. Also—beginner's luck.

Flying wing: To be seen after too tight a loop.

Fuel tank: Plastic bottle, designed to leak when placed in totally inaccessible locations.

Fuselage: Optional interconnecting structure between wings and engine. Also: Receptacle into which the radio control (RC) pilot stuffs money in the hope his airplane will fly better.

Glitch: What you holler when you pull up elevator while flying inverted at a 10-foot altitude.

Gravity: Force of nature designed to reduce aircraft to their component parts.

Landing gear: Structure to separate fuselage from runway after landing.

Mean air chord: That nasty minor eighth note caused when your wings snap on launch and whack together. **Mixture screw:** Device to meter too little fuel to the engine at critical moments.

Nosewheel: Implement used to remove firewall.

Propeller: Rotating knife that cuts holes in the air, which the aircraft falls into, thus propelling the aircraft. Also—handy tool to cut away excess skin on knuckles.

Prop nut: What Glider pilots call Power pilots.

Radio: Expensive electronic device to randomly alleviate overcharged batteries.

Radio glitch: Documented electronic occurrence, causing immediate and irreparable loss of control. Also—the source of any crash when there is a possibility of someone

else's radio in close proximity to the airplane. **Sink:** Non-mythical meteorological event stimulated by RC soaring contests.

Snap roll: After a nice hard G roll, something snaps (usually the wing). Aerodynamic ability will slightly diminish.

Stall: Score: Gravity - 1, Mr. Bernoulli - 0.

Swept area: The only part of your apartment not covered in balsa dust.

Tail-dragger: RC pilot who has spent an hour looking for his airplane in a forest.

Thermal: Mythical occurrence of rising air usually where one's sailplane is not.

Tip stall: Offering several minutes worth of unrequested advice to a nearby pilot instead of taking your turn to launch off the winch; used when sink is in the air and contest points are at stake.

Trainer cord: Handy device for electronically instilling false confidence in rookie pilots.

Tree: Implement used to separate wings from fuselage. **Upwind turn:** Same as downwind turn ... No, it isn't! Yes, it is! No, it isn't! Yes, it is! and so on.

Wing: Device that, due to its airfoil, allows air to flow faster over the top, thereby giving you the opportunity to pour excess funding into the resulting low-pressure area.

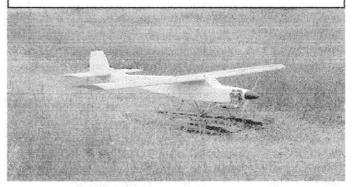
JUNE 8th FLOAT FLY

A NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT....

Fellow Members.

I wanted to take a minute to explain what has been happening and will happen with our tractor? field issues. I understand that some of you can not altend the monthly nectings so I wanted you to know what was happening. Over the last two months a few of us have myested close to 40 hours working the tractors at both fields multiple times. A fair estimate is that these repairs has cost the club roughly \$400 -\$500.

We decided at the Jime meeting to have an Executive Board meeting to discuss options to rectify this on-going problem. What the board identified was two things, one is that the tructors WAM possesses are not adequate to handle the task of our mutine field maintenance. Secondly although members intentions are good and helpful, members are not trained properly on operation and maintenance of the equipment. This has directly resulted in the demise of all three pieces of lawn gear.

Our solutions are the following:

- Purchase a new tractor that is adequate to handle the task of cutting Banghers field weekly. Bob Allen and I investigated options and decided that the John Deere GX 100 would be the best chains for the funding we wish to smoot.
- WAM officers will change the shed combinations to before control access to the maintenance equipment. This equipment, will be limited to grass culting crews and WAM officers only. There will be no other reason for members to access the maintenance equipment.
- Form grass founs for both fields. This is the field Marshall's personshifts to ore nize.

At the June resetting I asked for a vote to start a voluntary Tractor fund. Many members including myself have be generous and contributed. We asked that if each member could donate roughly \$40 - \$50 this would help offset the cost of the new tractor greatly. The remaining balance will be financed over the next two years. We will cancel the cutting service and apply that cost savings to the new tractor. At this point the Executive board agreed that a mandatory assessment be voted upon. This would assure that the club has funding to back our needs and plans. Once the tractor is paid in full the club can focus attention on our other items on our wish list.

We realize some members will disagree with the cancellation of the lawn service, but the bottom line is that it costs the club a great amount of money each year and we have no control over the quality. This has been a bad year for weather but I have been less than happy with the results of the lawn service. I would hope that we are all not that lazy that we don't want to protect and care for our investments in the club and our fields.

Radio Control equipment check list

List courtesy of Chuck Baker and Doug Gifford

AIRFRAME

- ' Check wing for warps and use a heat gun to correct if necessary
- 'Check wing attachment mechanism (dowels or bolt on)
- ' Check for loose covering and seal down and remove wrinkles if needed
- ' Check physical attachment of fin and stabilizer
- ' Verify that name, address, and AMA number are in or on aircraft and are legible

CONTROL SURFACES

- 'Check linkage for flexing/bowing—should be able to move servo with control surface (Note that some servos do not like to be reverse-driven, so be gentle)
- ' Check control horns and clevises for tightness/wear/keepers and replace if necessary
- ' Check thread-on metal clevises and tighten jam nuts and check keepers
- ' Check brass threaded couplers—use only on throttle (use stainless on control surfaces)
- ' Check for broken or worn hinges and replace if necessary

RADIO INSTALLATION

- ' Check servos, servo tray, and servo rails for secure mounting
- ' Check servo output arm screws and linkage attachments (clevis, EZ connector, Z-bend)
- ' Check receiver on/off switch for proper actuation and mounting
- ' Check all servo connections to extensions and the receiver itself
- ' Check receiver and battery foam padding-replace if worn or fuel soaked
- ' Check antenna integrity and routing
- 'Check battery capacity with cycler or ESV-replace if less than 80% of rated capacity

LANDING GEAR

- ' Check landing gear for bends and replace as necessary
- ' Check that landing gear mounting screws are tight
- ' Check nose gear/tail wheel linkages-verify travel and no binding
- ' Check that wheels spin freely and tighten wheel collars if necessary (use fuel tubing outside of collars)

ENGINE/PROPELLER

- ' Check engine mounting-engine to mount, mount to firewall, firewall to airframe
- ' Check engine cylinder head bolts and muffler attachment
- ' Check valve clearances on four-cycle engines
- 'Inspect propeller for nicks/cracks
- ' Check needle friction for both high-speed and low-speed needles (if applicable)

FUEL SYSTEM

- Remove fuel tank and check for debris and/or leaks (vacuum test)
- ' Replace fuel tubing between fuel tank and engine if it looks worn/old
- ' Use filter between muffler and fuel tank to eliminate debris
- ' Hold airframe nose up and shake to verify that fuel tank clunk is free

SUPPORT EQUIPMENT

- ' Empty out your flight box and clean it
- ' Review tools carried and remove any you don't use
- ' Stock up on glow plugs and props that you will need
- ' Charge/check 12-volt starter battery
- ' Charge/cycle glow plug battery and replace if necessary
- 'Test electric fuel pump/lines/filter to verify everything works properly

Sheeting a compound curve fuselage By AVEY SHAW

Sheeting a compound curved fuselage is difficult no matter what method is used, but I have come to the conclusion the best method is as follows. Select a firm but flexible balsa. If using 1/8-inch sheeting, be aware that in areas that have considerable contours you shouldn't try to use more than 11/4-inch in width.

Soak the balsa in hot water until it is flexible. Some people prefer ammonia. Dry the back side with your heat gun, and glue it to your frame work. That's your first piece.

So far it has been easy. If your second strip will contour to the shape of the first without much fight, you can continue gluing it into position. At this point, a considerable bow or bend will have developed, and a third strip, cut with parallel sides, won't work out.

Cut from stiff paper or cardboard a strip two inches wide and butt the edge of the cardboard to your mounted strip. Note the gap. Do not force the cardboard to close the gap. Measure the gap's widest opening and cut a scrap of balsa larger than that and about 1/2-inch long. Drill or punch a hole for a pen halfway, 1/4-inch from each end. Now let the pen protrude through, leaving enough material so it's larger than the gap. You can bank off the glued strip and run a line on the cardboard (see diagram). Cut along that line and match it to the curve on the strip. Adjust if necessary.

Spray 3M Super 77 adhesive on the back of the cardboard. Set it on the balsa you are going to use for your next strip. Run your X-acto knife along the edge of the cardboard, transferring the shape to the balsa. It is a good idea to flip over the cardboard and repeat that curve on the topside of the same strip you apply. Wet the strip down, and you're in business. Keep in mind to work opposite sides to keep the fuselage straight.

Wing servo mounting

One way to mount a servo on a foam wing is to mount flush. This is especially advantageous for racing airplanes or gliders, where drag reduction is important. Make a hole in the wing (hot cut, razor, or router), line with a 3/32-inch balsa on the sides, and put in plywood corner pieces to accept the screws for the cover.

The cover is made of 1/16-inch ply, to fit flush with 1/16-inch wing skin. Mount the servo onto pine or plywood blocks, glued to the cover (or use servo mounting tape). Cut a slot for the servo arm, and you're set. This type of mounting is strong, light, and allows for easy access to the servo.

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Eliminating bounce in your landings

In order for a taildragger not to tip over on its nose, its wheels must be ahead of the center of gravity (CG). As it is further forward, it can tolerate rougher ground and the tail wheel can get a better grip on the ground, but the tendency to bounce is worse. But when a taildragger lands, the impact of the main wheels tends to push the nose up, increasing the angle of attack, lowering the tail, and increasing lift—and the airplane is flying again. Eventually, air speed is reduced, and it falls to the ground again, maybe harder. The nose is rotated, and the airplane becomes airborne once again. This process will continue until all flyable air speed is exhausted. The aircraft may continue bouncing due to a phenomenon known as "loping."

Loping occurs in a taildragger when the bounce of the main wheels causes the tail wheel to slam into the ground while the main wheels are still in the air. Then, the tail wheel bounces, slamming the main wheels onto the ground. This argument between the front and rear continues until momentum is lost. But the severity of the loping can increase in the interim.

Loping can occur in trike-geared aircraft as well. If the nose wheel strikes the ground before the main wheels do, the nose is pushed up severely, slamming the main wheels onto the runway. Being behind the CG, the rebound of the main wheels rotates the airplane forward so the nose wheel slams down again, maybe harder than the first time. The process repeats.

Loping in a trike airplane can start with taxiing. If the main wheels hit a bump, weight is shifted forward onto the nose gear. It rebounds, returning weight backward. This pingponging can grow, especially if the airplane is accelerating. The only way to stop it is to stop the airplane. The longer the distance between the main wheels and the nose wheel, the greater the tendency to lope. Loping also increases if the main wheels are too far aft of the CG. Stiff struts and bouncy wheels aggravate matters.

Trike gear has less potential for bounce because the main wheels can be placed closer to the CG. When the main wheels touch down, the impact lowers the nose and the angle of attack, reducing lift. Some trike-gear designs actually have negative angles of attack when sitting on all wheels. This holds the airplane on the runway. Trikes have more positive ground steering because the nose wheel makes firmer contact with the runway than a tail wheel, especially at higher speeds.

Another little-known cause of bounce is main wheels that are too far apart. This may be shocking because this practice is generally considered good for ground handling. It usually is because it improves directional stability when rolling along the ground. What happens when the airplane lands and one wheel hits the ground before the other? A lateral form of bounce occurs from one wing to the other.

One might think that soft tires and springy struts would increase bounce. Not so. More often, bounce is aggravated by the landing gear that is too stiff. Rigidity does not absorb energy; it reflects it. The hardness of the runway contributes to bounce for the same reason. Some early racing airplanes, such as the Howard Ike, had landing gear so rigid they could not land on concrete runways because of the uncontrollable bouncing that occurred.

Moving the main gear close to the CG reduces bounce and

improves tracking. The Spitfire, for example, is quite bounce resistant, but it tips over easily on rough ground.

Moving nose and main gears closer together reduces bounce and loping, but it degrades tracking and increases the tendency to tip over on rough ground and in crosswinds.

Oleo struts help absorb impacts, but the spring tension must be just right—stiff enough to keep from bottoming out, soft enough to absorb shock. The same may be said of tires.

If your airplane rebounds into the air after a severe impact, head off further bounce by inching up the throttle slightly. Apply down elevator if necessary to level the nose. This increases air speed, prevents a stall, and lowers the rate of descent.

TIP TIME: What do you need in your flight box?

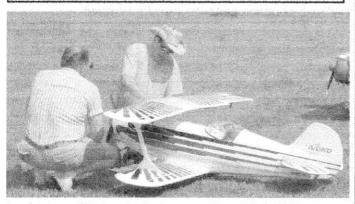
What do you consider necessary for your flight box? Usually, the most important are the items needed to keep you flying while at the field. Obviously, you can't carry everything. I tried that once. I custom built my own flight box. When finished, it more or less resembled a steamer truck, and I still didn't have what I needed at times!

When you are beginning, all you can do is make your best guess at what you will need at the field. Better yet, go ask some of the veteran members what they keep in their flight boxes. Some items can be substituted for others. For instance, if you don't use a starter, a leather glove, or a chicken stick to start your model, you'll have plenty of room for band-aids, which you'll surely need eventually!

A small roll of clear packing tape can patch up those cornfield MonoKote dings and allow you to keep flying. Of course, spare glow plugs and props are always high on the list. The nice thing about all this is that among the members who are usually at the field, someone will always have what you're looking for. Don't be afraid to ask for something if you need it.

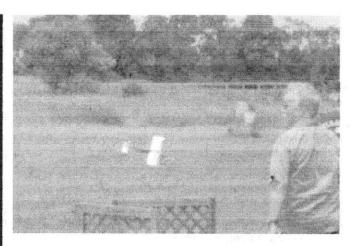

DEADSTICK REBUTTED

The following is an answer from John Sterrett to the five year old article from Deadstick that was republished last month.

Editors Jim and Chris saw fit to repeat the Deadstick article from five years earlier about John (Frugal) Sterrett in the September 2003 issue of the Talespinner. Because of this I think it is necessary to clear up several excusable inaccuracies about my approach to the hobby, especially for the benefit of the future members of WAM. However, several spouses of the big spenders did find the original article usefully informative. Most of the inaccuracies by Deadstick were no doubt obtained from Eddie the Editor Goldman and other big spenders like Bob Allen and Bill Hassert.

NO THROTTLE? NO WAY!

by Dale Johnston

Whenever people get talking about WWI airplanes someone is bound to declare that they did not throttles in them, that the only way they controlled the speed was to turn the ignition off and on! This is miss-leading at best and in most cases absolutely untrue. The aircraft that had in-line engines (that were usually liquid cooled) all had throttles just like internal combustion engines today and functioned exactly the same. The popular miss-conception is applied to rotary engines whose throttles were not nearly as responsive. Full throttle on these engines was about 1200 rpm, and the engine was started with the throttle set for about 1/2 that. A fine speed adjustment for the lower rpm was obtained by turning the ignition off momentarily with what was known as the "Blip" Switch". The blip switch was mostly used for landing and taxing, instructions for operating the engine clearly state that it was not to be used at higher rpm. The French LeRhone engines, used in the Nieuport 11 and 17 had brass slide carburetors with throttles, however some of the rotaries like the early Gnomes did not have carburetors as such but all had levers for control of fuel and air to the engine in the cockpit that were operated by the pilot, what else would you call this but a throttle? I have excerpts from factory drawings of the installations in the British FE 8 with 100 HP Gnome and the Sopwith Snipe with the Bentley BR2, the Fokker D VIII with Oberusel, and the Moraine Saulnier with 80 HP LeRhone all have the cockpit controls plainly marked

People have been lead to believe rotary engines had no throttles because if often says so in magazine articles and even on TV programs. It is anyone's guess how the myth got started but it is perpetuated by writers and commentators who expound hearsay without checking the authenticity of it.

A touching story by a school trip chaperone and his encounter with James Bradley

IWO JIMA

Each year I am hired to go to Washington, DC, with the eighth grade class from Clinton, WI, where I grew up, to videotape their trip. I greatly enjoy visiting our nation's capitol, and each year I take some special memories back with me. This fall's trip was especially memorable. On the last night of our trip we stopped at the Iwo Jima Memorial. This memorial is the largest bronze statue in the world and depicts one of the most famous photographs in history-that of the six brave soldiers raising the American

Flag at the top of a rocky hill on the island of Iwo Jima, Japan, during WWII. Over one hundred students and chaperones piled off the buses and headed towards the memorial.

I noticed a solitary figure at the base of the statue, and as I got closer he asked, "Where are you guys from?" I told him that we were from Wisconsin.

"Hey, I'm a cheesehead, too! Come gather around cheeseheads, and I will tell you a story."

James Bradley just happened to be in Washington, DC, to speak at the memorial the following day. He was there that night to say good night to his dad, who has since passed away. He was just about to leave when he saw the buses pull up. I videotaped him as he spoke to us, and received his permission to share what he said from my videotape. It is one thing to tour the incredible monuments filled with history in Washington, D.C., but it is quite another to get the kind of insight we received that night. When all

had gathered around he reverently began to speak. Here are his words that night.

"My name is James Bradley and I'm from Antigo, Wisconsin. My dad is on that statue, and I just wrote a book called "Flags of Our Fathers" which is #5 on the New York Times Best Seller list right now. It is the story of the six boys you see behind me. Six boys raised the flag. The first guy putting the pole in the ground is Harlon Block. Harlon was an all- state football player. He enlisted in the Marine Corps with all the senior members of hisfootball team. They were off to play another type of game. A game called "War."

But it didn't turn out to be a game. Harlon, at the age of 21, died with his intestines in his hands. I don't say that to gross you out, I say that because there are generals who stand in front of this statue and talk about the glory of war. You guys need to know that most of the boys in Iwo Jima were 17, 18 and 19 years old. (He pointed to the statue) You see this next guy? That's Rene Gagnon from New Hampshire. If you took Rene's helmet off at the moment this photo was taken, and looked in the webbing of that helmet, you would find a photograph -- a photograph of his girl friend, Rene put that in there for protection, because he was scared. He was 18 years old. Boys won the battle of Iwo Jima. Boys. Not old men.

The next guy here, the third guy in this tableau, was Sergeant Mike Strank. Mike is my hero. He was the hero of all these guys. They called him the "old man" because he was so old. He was already 24. When Mike

Would motivate his boys in training camp, he didn't say, "Let's go kill some Japanese" or "Let's die for our country." He knew he was talking to little boys. Instead he would say, "You do what I say, and I'll get you home to your mothers."

The last guy on this side of the statue is Ira Hayes, a Pima Indian from Arizona. Ira Hayes walked off Iwo Jima. He went into the White House with my dad. President Truman told him, "You're a hero." He told reporters, "How can I feel like a hero when 250 of my buddies hit the island with me and only 27 of us walked off alive?" So you take your class at school. 250 of you spending a year together having fun, doing everything together. Then all 250 of you hit the beach, but only 27 of

your classmates walk off alive.

That was Ira Hayes. He had images of horror in his mind. Ira Hayes died dead drunk, face down at the age of 32...ten years after this picture was taken.

The next guy, going around the statue, is Franklin Sousley from Hilltop, Kentucky. A funlovin' hillbilly boy. His best friend, who is now 70, told me, "Yeah, you know, we took two cows up on the porch of the Hilltop General Store. Then we strung wire across the stairs so the cows couldn't get down. Then we fed them Epsom salts. Those cows crapped all night." Yes, he was a fun-lovin' hillbilly boy. Franklin died on Iwo Jima at the age of 19. When the telegram came to tell his mother that he was dead, it went to the Hilltop General Store. A barefoot boy ran that telegram up to his mother's farm. The neighbors could hear her scream all night and into the morning. The neighbors lived a quarter of a mile away.

The next guy, as we continue to go around the

statue is my dad, John Bradley from Antigo, Wisconsin, where I was raised. My dad lived until 1994, but he would never give interviews. When Walter Cronkite's producers, or the New York Times would call, we were trained as little kids to say, "No, I'm sorry sir, my dad's not here. He is in Canada fishing. No, there is no phone there, sir. No, we don't know when he is coming back." My dad never fished or even went to Canada. Usually, he was sitting there right at the table eating his Cambell's soup. But we had to tell the press that he was out fishing. He didn't want to talk to the press. You see, my dad didn't see himself as a hero. Everyone thinks these guys are heroes, 'cause they are in a photo and a monument. My dad knew better. He was a medic. John Bradley from Wisconsin was a caregiver. In Iwo Jima he probably held over 200 boys as they died. And when boys died in Iwo Jima, they writhed and screamed in pain.

When I was a little boy, my third grade teacher told me that my dad was a hero. When I went home and told my dad that, he looked at me and said, "I want you always to remember that the heroes of Iwo Jima are the guys who did not come back. Did NOT come back."

So that's the story about six nice young boys. Three died on Iwo Jima, and three came back as national heroes. Overall 7000 boys died on Iwo Jima in the worst battle in the history of the Marine Corps. My voice is giving out, so I will end here. Thank you for your time."

Suddenly, the monument wasn't just a big old piece of metal with a flag sticking out of the top. It came to life before our eyes with the heartfelt words of a son who did indeed have a father who was a hero. Maybe not a hero for the reasons most people would believe, but a hero nonetheless.

We need to remember that God created this vast and glorious world for us to live in, freely, but also at great sacrifice. Let us never forget from the Revolutionary War to the Gulf War and all the wars in-between that sacrifice was made for our freedom. Remember to pray praises for this great country of ours and also pray for those still in murderous unrest around the world.

STOP, and thank God for being alive at someone else's sacrifice.

LETTER FROM A WEST VIRGINIA FARM KID, NOW AT PARIS ISLAND MARINE CORPS RECRUIT DEPOT

Dear Ma and Pa:

I am well. Hope you are. Tell Brother Walt and Brother Elmer the Marine Corps beats working for old man Minch by a mile. Tell them to join up quick

before maybe all of the places are filled. I was restless at first because you got to stay in bed till nearly 6 a.m., but am getting so I like to sleep late.

Tell Walt and Elmer all you do before breakfast is smooth your cot and shinc some things. No hogs to slop, feed to pitch, mash to mix, wood to split, fire to lay. Practically nothing. Men got to shave but it is not so bad, there's warm water.

Breakfast is strong on trimmings like fruit juice, cereal, eggs, bacon, etc. but kind of weak on chops, potatoes, ham, steak, fried eggplant, pie and other regular food. But tell Walt and Elmer you can always sit between two city boys that live on coffee. Their food plus yours holds you till noon, when you get fed again. It's no wonder these city boys can't walk much.

We go on "route" marches, which the Platoon Sergeant says are long walks to harden us. If he thinks so, it is not my place to tell him different A route march" is about as far as to our mailbox at home. Then the city guys get sore feet and we all ride back in trucks. The country is nice, but awful flat. The Sergeant is like a schoolteacher. He nags some. The Capt. is like the school board. Majors and Colonels just ride around and frown. They don't bother you none.

This next will kill Walt and Elmer with laughing. I keep getting medals for shooting. I don't know why. The bulls-eye is near as big as a chipmunk head

and don't move. And it ain't shooting at you, like the Higgett boys at home. All you got to do is lie there all comfortable and hit it. You don't even

load your own cartridges. They come in boxes. Then we have what they call hand-to- hand combat training. You get to wrestle with them city boys. I have

to be real careful though, they break real easy. It ain't like fighting with that ole bull at home. I'm about the best they got in this except for that Tug Jordan from over in Silver Lake. He joined up the same time as me. But Im only 5'6" and 130 pounds and he's 6'8" and weighs near 300 pounds dry.

THE WRIGHT BROTHERS

Wright, name of two American brothers who worked closely together in the early development of aeronautics. The Wrights invented and flew the first practical airplane.

Wilbur Wright (1867-1912)

Wilbur Wright was born in Millville, Indiana, on April 16, 1867. As boys, he and his younger brother Orville made simple mechanical toys, and in 1888 they built a large printing press. The following year they began to publish the Dayton, Ohio, West Side News, edited by Wilbur. Already successful printers, the brothers opened a bicycle repair shop and showroom in 1892, and three years later they began assembling bicycles with tools of their own invention.

The Wrights were admirers of the writings and feats of the German engineer Otto Lilienthal, the American engineer Octave Chanute (1832-1910), and other glider experimenters. In September 1900 at Kill Devil Hills, near Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, they tested their own glider. Carefully recording their findings, they concluded that the previously accepted aeronautical data on which they had relied were erroneous. In 1901 the brothers tested the effects of air pressure on more than 200 wing surfaces and in 1902, executing almost 1000 glides in a new glider, they confirmed their Kitty Hawk data. At Kitty Hawk the Wrights also proved to their satisfaction that planes could be balanced best by pilots, rather than by built-in engineering devices; this was the major idea covered by the first Wright patent.

In 1903 the brothers constructed their first propeller, from original calculations; it was about 35 percent more effective than other propellers then available. They next built a 337-kg (750-lb) machine with a 12-hp motor in which, on December 17, 1903, at Kitty Hawk, first Orville and then Wilbur made the first powered airplane flights in history. Despite public indifference they dedicated themselves to the development of better engines

and planes. The site of the first flight, now the Wright Brothers National Memorial, is administered by the National Park Service.

In 1908 Wilbur Wright set distance and altitude records in France. That same year the Wrights fulfilled a contract with the U.S. Army Signal Corps to produce a plane that could fly for 10 min at a speed of 64 km/hr (40 mph). They then toured Europe, where they were highly honored. Upon their return to the U.S. in 1909 they received further

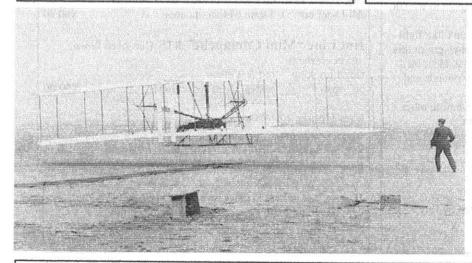
honors. Wilbur became president of the newly incorporated American Wright Company. He died in Dayton three years later, on May 30, 1912, of typhoid fever.

Orville Wright (1871-1948)

Orville Wright was born in Dayton on August 19, 1871. His individual contributions to the improvement of aircraft include the development of the first wind tunnel in 1901 and the_discovery, in 1902, that tailspins could be eliminated by substituting a movable vertical tail for the stationary one then in use.

In 1903, at Kitty Hawk, Orville Wright made the first successful flight, which lasted 12 sec, in a self-powered craft. On September 9, 1908, at Fort Meyer, Virginia, he simultaneously established several records when he flew the first Wright plane made under government contract for 62 min, completing 57 circles at an altitude of 36.6 m (120 ft); he became an immediate international celebrity. In 1910 Orville Wright formed the first Wright Exhibition Team, in which pilots trained by him performed in Wright planes. He also personally tested each new piece of equipment used on Wright planes and superintended production at the Wright plants. After the death of Wilbur in 1912, Orville Wright became president of the American Wright Company. Three years later he sold his stock in the company for over \$500,000. He subsequently worked as an engineering consultant. He died in Dayton on January 30, 1948.

Although the control system worked well and the structural design of the craft was sound, the lift of the gliders was substantially less than the Wrights' earlier calculations had predicted. They began to question seriously the aerodynamic data that they had used. Now at a critical juncture, Wilbur and Orville decided to conduct an extensive series of tests of wing shapes. They built a small wind tunnel in the fall of 1901 to gather a body of accurate aerodynamic data with which to design their next glider. The heart of the Wright wind tunnel was the ingeniously designed pair of test instruments that were mounted inside. These measured coefficients of lift and drag on small model wing shapes, the terms in the equations for calculating lift and drag about which the brothers were in doubt.

The Wrights' third glider, built in 1902 based on the wind tunnel experiments, was a dramatic success. The lift problems were solved, and with a few refinements to the control system (the key one being a movable vertical tail), they were able to make numerous extended controlled glides. They made between seven hundred and one thousand flights in 1902. The single best one was $622\frac{1}{2}$ feet in twenty-six seconds. The brothers were now convinced that they stood at the threshold of realizing mechanical flight.

During the spring and summer of 1903 they built their first powered airplane. Essentially a larger and sturdier version of the 1902 glider, the only fundamentally new component of the 1903 aircraft was the propulsion system. With the assistance of their bicycle shop mechanic, Charles Taylor, the Wrights built a small, twelve-horsepower gasoline engine. While the engine was a significant enough achievement, the genuinely innovative feature of the propulsion system was the propellers. The brothers conceived the propellers as rotary wings, producing a horizontal thrust force aerodynamically. By turning an airfoil section on its side and spinning it to create an air flow over the surface, the Wrights reasoned that a horizontal "lift" force would be generated that would propel the airplane forward. The concept was one of the most original and creative aspects of the Wrights' aeronautical work. The 1903 airplane was fitted with two propellers mounted behind the wings and connected to the engine, centrally located on the bottom wing, via a chain-and-sprocket transmission system.

By the fall of 1903, the powered airplane was ready for trial. A number of problems with the engine transmission system delayed the first flight attempt until mid-December. After winning the toss of a coin to determine which brother would make the first try, Wilbur took the pilot's position and made an unsuccessful attempt on December 14th, damaging the Flyer slightly. Repairs were completed for a second attempt on December 17. It was now Orville's turn. At 10:35 a.m. the Flyer lifted off the beach at Kitty Hawk for a twelve-second flight, traveling 120 feet. Three more flights were made that morning, the brothers alternating as pilot. The second and third were in the range of two hundred feet. With Wilbur at the controls, the fourth and last flight covered 852 feet in 59 seconds. With this final long, sustained effort, there was no question the Wrights had flown.

As the brothers and the others present discussed the long flight, a gust of wind overturned the Wright Flyer and sent it tumbling across the sand. The aircraft was severely damaged and never flown again. But the Wrights had achieved what they had set out to do. They had successfully demonstrated their design for a heavier-than-air flying machine. They built refined versions of the Flyer in 1904 and 1905, bringing the design to practicality. On October 5, 1905, with the brothers' third powered airplane, Wilbur made a spectacular thirty-nine-minute flight that covered 24½ miles over a closed course.

After the first powered Flyer of 1903 took its destructive tumble at Kitty Hawk, the Wrights crated it and shipped it back to Dayton where it remained in storage in a shed behind their bicycle shop, untouched for more than a decade. In March 1913, Dayton was hit by a serious flood, during which the boxes containing the Flyer were submerged in water and mud for eleven days. The airplane was uncrated, for the first time since Kitty Hawk, in the summer of 1916, when Orville repaired and reassembled the airplane for brief exhibition at

fron the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum

On December 17, 1903, the Wright brothers inaugurated the aerial age with their successful first flights of a heavier-than-air flying machine at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. This airplane, known as the Wright Flyer, sometimes referred to as the Kitty Hawk Flyer, was the product of a sophisticated four-year program of research and development conducted by Wilbur and Orville Wright beginning in 1899. During the Wrights' design and construction of their experimental aircraft they also pioneered many of the basic tenets and techniques of modern aeronautical engineering, such as the use of a wind tunnel and flight testing as design tools. Their seminal accomplishment encompassed not only the breakthrough first flight of an airplane, but also the equally important achievement of establishing the foundation of aeronautical engineering.

The Wright brothers had a passing interest in flight as youngsters. In 1878 their father gave them a toy flying helicopter model powered by strands of twisted rubber. They played and experimented with it extensively and even built several larger copies of the device. They also had some experience with kites. But not until 1896, prompted by the widely publicized fatal crash of famed glider pioneer Otto Lilienthal, did the Wrights begin serious study of flight. After absorbing what materials related to the subject the brothers had available locally, Wilbur wrote to the Smithsonian Institution on May 30, 1899, requesting any publications on aeronautics that it could offer.

Shortly after their receipt of the Smithsonian materials, the Wrights built their first aeronautical craft, a five-foot-wingspan biplane kite, in the summer of 1899. The Wrights chose to follow Lilienthal's lead of using gliders as a stepping stone towards a practical powered airplane. The 1899 kite was built as a preliminary test device to establish the viability of the control system that they planned to use in their first full-size glider. This means of control would be a central feature of the later successful powered airplane.

Rather than controlling the craft by altering the center of gravity by shifting the pilot's body weight as Lilienthal had done, the Wrights intended to balance their glider aerodynamically. They reasoned that if a wing generates lift when presented to an oncoming flow of air, producing differing amounts of lift on either end of the wing would cause one side to rise more than the other, which in turn would bank the entire aircraft. A mechanical means of inducing this differential lift would provide the pilot with effective lateral control of the airplane. The Wrights accomplished this by twisting, or warping, the tips of the wings in opposite directions via a series of lines attached to the outer edges of the wings that were manipulated by the pilot. The idea advanced aeronautical experimentation significantly because it provided an effective method of controlling an airplane in three-dimensional space and, because it was aerodynamically based, it did not limit the size of the aircraft as shifting body weight obviously did. The satisfactory performance of the 1899 kite demonstrated the practicality of the wing warping control system.

Encouraged by the success of their small wing warping kite, the brothers built and flew two full-size piloted gliders in 1900 and 1901. Beyond the issue of control, the Wrights had to grapple with developing an efficient airfoil shape and solving fundamental problems of structural design. Like the kite, these gliders were biplanes. For control of climb and descent, the gliders had forward-mounted horizontal stabilizers. Neither craft had a tail. The Wrights' home of Dayton, Ohio, did not offer suitable conditions for flying the gliders. An inquiry with the U.S. Weather Bureau identified Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, with its sandy, wide-open spaces and strong, steady winds as an optimal test site. In September 1900, the Wrights made their first trip to the little fishing hamlet that they would make world famous.

the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Several other brief displays followed. It was exhibited at the New York Aero Show in 1917, at a Society of Automotive Engineers meeting in Dayton in 1918, at the New York Aero Show in 1919, and at the National Air Races in Dayton in 1924. On each of these occasions the Wright Flyer was prepared and assembled for exhibition by a Wright Company mechanic named Jim Jacobs, working under the supervision of Orville.

In 1928 the airplane was placed on loan to the Science Museum in London. Before shipping it to Europe, Orville and Jim Jacobs refurbished the Flyer extensively. The fabric covering was replaced completely with new material, although it was of the same type as the original "Pride of the West" muslin. The remaining 1903 fabric that was on the airplane when it flew was saved and portions of it still exist in various places. During World War II, the airplane was kept in an underground storage facility near the village of Corsham, approximately 100 miles from London. where various British national treasures were secured. The Flyer was not stored in the London subway as has been often asserted. The airplane was returned to the United States in 1948 and formally donated to the Smithsonian Institution in an elaborate ceremony on December 17, the forty-fifth anniversary of the flights. and it has been on public display there ever since.

The Flyer received some minor repairs and cleaning in 1976 just before being moved into the Smithsonian's then new National Air and Space Museum building. In 1985, the airplane was given its first major treatment since preparing it for loan to the Science Museum in late 1926 and early 1927. It was completely disassembled, the parts thoroughly cleaned and preserved, and all new fabric covering applied. A careful search was made to locate new fabric that matched the original as closely as possible. When the fabric was replaced in 1927, it was sewn on in a slightly different way than originally done by the brothers in 1903. When stitching the new fabric in 1985, a large section of original flown 1903 wing covering was available and used as a pattern, ensuring the accuracy of the 1985 restoration.

What the Japanese used to attack Pearl Harbor

Many people, especially those of us not old enough to remember WWII, associate the Japanese air attack on Pearl Harbor with one airplane – the infamous "Zero".

In fact, the Japanese Naval Air Force had three different aircraf

In fact, the Japanese Naval Air Force had three different aircraft performing three distinct functions and each of them was more technically advanced than anything the allies had at the time. In addition, the Japanese technical experts had developed a torpedo that worked in the shallow water of the American harbor – normal torpedoes would have stuck in the seabed – and a bomb to pierce the battleship's armored decks, made by adding fins to an artillery shell.

The main dive-bomber of the Imperial Japanese Navy at the time of Pearl Harbor was the Aichi D3A. 126 "Vals" (as they were nicknamed by the Allies) took part in the attack. Aichi D3As sank more Allied naval ships than any other type of enemy aircraft during the war.

The most famous of all Japanese combat aircraft was the Mitsubishi A6M5 Reisen or "Zero". When the Zero first appeared in 1940, it outclassed every Allied fighter in the Pacific. This lightly built aircraft displayed outstanding maneuverability and had unparalleled range for the time.

Whereas the British Navy's torpedo-bomber in 1940 was the antiquated Swordfish biplane, the Japanese had developed the sleek Nakajima B5N2 ("Kate"), an all metal monoplane design bristling with modern features. After playing a major role at Pearl Harbor, it went on to help in the sinking of the aircraft carriers *Yorktown*, *Lexington*, and *Hornet*.
