Modifications Washout: advantages and disadvantages

from the Twin City Radio Controllers

"Every airplane needs washout, even a biplane," said Claude McCoullough, the famous designer for Sig.

I'm not sure that every airplane needs washout, but most do, especially the scale airplanes that Claude designed.

Washout is a twist in the wing from root to tip. This twist is usually three degrees but in rare cases can be more.

Washout forces the wing near the fuselage to meet the air at a more positive angle than the tip. As the model pulls its nose up and increases the overall angle at which the wing meets the air, it will eventually achieve the stall angle at which lift ceases.

With washout, the inner wing will stall first and gradually progress towards the tips. This is desirable because the loss of lift at the center will lower the nose and prevent further stalling. Meanwhile, aileron control is maintained even though the wing is partially stalled.

But there's much more. Consider the typical World War II fighter. A fighter will have a wing incidence at the root of about 2-degrees and a washout of about one and a ½-degree. At top speed, the incidence angle of the tip is 0-degrees. Drag at the tip is minimized and there is very little loss of lift by air creeping around the wingtip—very efficient for maximum speed. In addition, the up-going aileron causes the same drag as the down-going alleron, so that roll causes no yaw. Yawing with the rudder does not change the lift at the tips, so yaw does not induce roll. This is just what the fighter pilot needs for gun aiming, and what the modeler needs for precise scale flight.

Washout is a must in airplanes with long, thin, or pointy wings. Some can't fly without it. Next time you are at the airport, notice the washout of the airliners there. It's huge for safety and fuel efficiency.

Most biplanes don't need washout because one wing is typically set at a higher incidence angle, and one wing

will stall before the other. Allerons must therefore be on the wing with the lower incidence angle.

Washout has a dark side; it can interfere with aerobatic performance. In inverted flight, washout becomes washin and all the bad things that washout prevents in upright flight become worse in inverted flight. Snap rolls and spins, which require the wing to stall on command, can be difficult to start and control. Adverse yaw varies with airspeed. Scale models of fighters are only mildly aerobatic. Fully aerobatic airplanes generally do not include washout.

Summary: Washout improves alleron response at all airspeeds, reduces adverse yaw and softens the stall, but only in upright flight.

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Doolittle Raid on Japan, 18 April 1942

The April 1942 air attack on Japan, launched from the aircraft carrier <u>Hornet</u> and led by Lieutenant Colonel <u>James H. Doolittle</u>, was the most daring operation yet undertaken by the United States in the young Pacific War. Though conceived as a diversion that would also boost American and allied morale, the raid generated strategic benefits that far outweighed its limited goals.

The raid had its roots in a chance observation that it was possible to launch Army twin-engined bombers from an aircraft carrier, making feasible an early air attack on Japan. Appraised of the idea in January 1942, U.S. Fleet commander Admiral Ernest J. King and Air Forces leader General Henry H. Arnold greeted it with enthusiasm. Arnold assigned the technically-astute Doolittle to organize and lead a suitable air group. The modern, but relatively well-tested B-25B "Mitchell" medium bomber was selected as the delivery vehicle and tests showed that it could fly off a carrier with a useful bomb load and enough fuel to hit Japan and continue on to airfields in China.

Gathering volunteer air crews for an unspecified, but admittedly dangerous mission, Doolittle embarked on a vigourous program of special training for his men and modi-



fications to their planes. The new carrier *Hornet* was sent to the Pacific to undertake the Navy's part of the mission. So secret was the operation that her Commanding Officer, Captain Marc A. Mitscher, had no idea of his ship's upcoming employment until shortly before sixteen B-25s were loaded on her flight deck. On 2 April 1942 *Hornet* put to sea and headed west across the vast Pacific.

Joined in mid-ocean on 13 April by Vice Admiral William F. Halsey's flagship Enterprise, which would provide air cover during the approach, Hornet steamed toward a planned 18 April afternoon launching point some 400 miles from Japan. However, before dawn on 18 April, enemy picket boats were encountered much further east than expected. These were evaded or sunk, but got off radio warnings, forcing the planes to take off around

8 AM, while still more than 600 miles out.

Most of the sixteen B-25s, each with a five-man crew, attacked the Tokyo area, with a few hitting Nagoya. Damage to the intended military targets was modest, and none of the planes reached the Chinese airfields (though all but a few of their crewmen survived). However, the Japanese high command was deeply embarrassed. Three of the eight American airmen they had captured were executed. Spurred by Combined Fleet commander Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto, they also resolved to eliminate the risk of any more such raids by the early destruction of America's aircraft carriers, a decision that led them to disaster at the Battle of Midway a month and a half later.

Speaking of mishaps, John (Kamikaze) Sterrett was taking names to put on his list for this years award.


The food was supplied by the Bradleys and Linda made her special hand made burgers and the drinks by John Sterrett. Special thanks to them for an excellent spread.

Why not consider those spectacular crashes that start at high altitudes by members who fly sailplanes? I'm thinking in particular of one member who has managed to crash the same glider (his Clipped- Wing Butterfiop) at least four times over the past couple of years John (Frugal) Sterrett. He has had help from tow plane specialist Bob Allen who insists that he has never been responsible for any of the crashes even when Bob's Space Walker ripped the wings off the Butterfiop. There are many witnesses to these mishaps since most of them occurred in front of a large audience at Fun Flys. In addition John crashed his Spirit 100 sailplane recently after a piggy back carry on his Telemaster piloted by Bob Jenness. John says the wind caused it!

The above crashes occurred in 2003, but John has added to his crash record in 2004 with considerable help from Bob Allenagain during Fun Flys. Two crashes occurred during takeoff glider tows and the third occurred when his modified Electra sail-plane crashed on landing from 30 MPH wind gusts. His crashes are never due to pilot error—he says..

Based on John's crash performance it seems only right that he should be considered this year for the infamous KAMIKAZE award! I understand that he repairs his own sailplanes which could also lead to additional crashes. I hope that the WAM KAMIKAZE committee will seriously consider this recommendation. He might have won in 2003 if it hadn't been for Jim Hodges.

from the Aero RC Club of Flint's newsletter, Flint MIFive John Hice, editor

There are five aspects of aircraft design that are crucial to desired flight performance—call them the Fab Five. There are others, but these five are fundamental, easy to check, and should be understood by every pilot. They are: 1) Balance: fore and aft 2) Balance: wing tip to wing tip 3) Wing incidence 4) Engine thrust line: up or down5) Engine thrust line: left or right

These are all usually specified on plans or building instructions. If not, such as with many almost ready to fly models, it is important to know an appropriate starting point for each, and to verify all five before attempting flight.

Tip-to-tip balance: It is either good or it isn't. You may need help from another person to check it. Hold the front by the spinner or propeller shaft and the rear at the center of the fuselage. It may help to insert a pin or hook at the rear to aid in suspending the airplane. High wingers should be held upside-down. If either wing drops, add weight to the opposite wingtip until balanced. A heavy wing condition will cause the ailerons to trim with one up and one down.

Fore-to-aft balance: The airplane should balance at a point about 25 to 35% back from the LE of the wing. This is the envelope or range of balance that will provide safe, controllable flight.

A tail heavy airplane is unstable in flight, difficult to control, and if excessively tail heavy, it can be unsafe—a danger to persons and property.

A nose-heavy airplane may be difficult to trim in flight, drop the nose when power is reduced, and require a lot of down elevator when inverted. It's better to be a bit nose heavy, however, than the opposite. Flight testing will determine if a change in balance is desired.

Wing incidence: It is normally a few degrees "positive" for sport flying. This means the LE of the wing is higher than the trailing edge in reference to the plane of the elevator. You can hold a straight edge on top of the elevator surface and draw a line along the fuselage with an erasable pen as a reference line. Then measure from this line to the E and TE to find the incidence. You can plot this on paper and measure the angle.

Flight performance will indicate if a change is necessary. Too much positive will make the airplane climb as power is added, zoom upward when pulling out of a dive, and tend to climb when turning. Negative, or too little positive incidence, causes a diving tendency throughout flight.

Engine thrust up or down: A small amount of engine down thrust is common in sport models. It helps to counteract the climbing effect of positive wing incidence as power is added without affecting the glide angle at low throttle. Too much down thrust may require excessive up trim for level flight, and may cause the model to nose up when power is cut. Up thrust will cause the opposite of these.

Engine thrust right or left: Some right engine thrust, usually two or three degrees, is essential to counteract the torque of the engine. If there is too little right thrust, the model will pull to the left as it loses speed in a steep climb. It will also pull to the left at the top of a loop. Too much right thrust will cause the opposite. Technical Editor's Note: Torque causes the airframe to rotate opposite of the propeller, therefore, right-thrust would have no effect on torque reaction. In fact, most aircraft have their engines set at zero right or left thrust. The turning effect that torque is blamed for happens on the ground at relatively slow speeds. Some claim that the turning effect is due to the P-factor (or P-effect), but that claim runs into large difficulties when you consider that the tricycle geared airframes (the full sized P-38, for example, before the rotation of one of the engines is changed) shows the same tendency to turn right under power while still on the ground.

The flight effects of changes in these Fab Five are contingent upon whether airframe was been built and assembled straight and true. A slightly warped wing, cocked rudder, twisted fuselage, etc., can cause similar effects and make it difficult to achieve a well-mannered, predictable model in flight. And everything is a trade-off. Changing one thing will often require changing something else. Be prepared for a lot of checking, trial and error. A good performing plane with no bad habits is worth the effort. It makes flying enjoyable.

MAY 14, 2004 FRIDAY

Lodge at Baraque de Fraiture
I woke about 6 AM, suffering from the time difference, and looked out the window. The weather was foggy with visibility down to about a hundred yards. Except for the warmer weather this is what we remember about December '44 at this place. I almost expected to hear the sound of a tank moving up the road. (Just "almost," I have gotten over that.) The sun soon burned away the fog.

We met with two Belgian gentlemen, Florent Lambert and Gilbert Sion, at the Auberge this morning. They were there to escort us to an area of the battlefield that we were not familiar with. Both are English speaking so we had no language problem. We traveled first to Manhay, then Grand Menil where a German

Panther tank sits on a concrete pad, still leaking oil from the engine compartment. Then on to Sadzot, the scene of bitter fighting between the Germans and the 509th PIB and other American troops. We visited Soy where the 3rd AD fought, and Erezee. Here I have to tell you a little bit about our guide, Florent Lambert. Florent is not only a historian about the battle, but he is also an artist who has illustrated his own books.

His latest one is titled, von Rundstedt in the Vallies of the Ourthe and the Aisne.

Florent has personally erected monuments in the area in several locations. This one at Melines is dedicated to an American G.I., Cpl.

John Shields, (23rd AECB) who was killed here. It is massive, made of stone, cement block and slate. It is enhanced with the likeness of John Shields engraved on slate and fronted by a high stone obelisk. (see photo)

It was time for a bit of lunch, so we took advantage of a local place out here in the sticks. The building was a one-time barn, but has been made over into a nice restaurant. After eating, the owner showed us his small collection of Harley-Davidson motorcycles, stored in another barn across the road. The most unlikely places sometimes yield the most unusual things.

We drove on to Hotton and LaRoche, both places of bitter fighting and almost totally demolished during the war. Looking down from the wooded hill on LaRoche, with the Ourthe River slowly flowing through, one would never imagine that this was once not a peaceful place.

Well, today is when we were expected to make a showing at the office of the Bourgmestre of Vielsalm, M. Jacques Gennen.

- o This is absolutely not acceptable, especially with helicopters! We all understand that sometimes your visual perspective goes off momentarily but that is not the problem. Here are some things to think about...
- ALL low passes should be called and only be made when safe
- ♦ ALL takeoffs and landings should be called
- → Touch and Go's are only allowed if you are the only one in the air or you have called them AND been recognized
- Going outside the flight zone
- O This is really a "Baughers only" problem. Please don't fly out over Rte. 31 if you can avoid it and especially don't perform any aerobatic maneuvers over the road. If you lose control and your plane meets the windshield of a car at 60 mph, it could mean huge lawsuits and the end of the club!
- Pit safety
- Please don't start your plane in the pits unless it is secured to a fixed object or you have someone holding it

Check your prop-nut/spinner before you attempt to start your plane. I have seen too many spinners "take flight" without the plane attached

Instructors should be very aware that they are responsible for anything the airplane does while under their control

If you choose to get on the other end of a buddy-box, I encourage you to work with our existing instructors to simulate "take back" situations. Remember also that the best instruction starts in the pits. A safe, flight worthy airplane is a lot easier to fly. Introducing new flyers to our sport is the lifeblood of keeping it alive, and more qualified instructors are always needed. Just don't fly out of your comfort zone.

WOW! What a great flying season we've had so far. I can only think of two Wednesday nights that have been bad and only one or two weekends where we couldn't fly.

Yes, some days have been incredibly hot, but when the breeze is right down the runway it doesn't seem to matter.

Which brings me to another important subject – SAFETY!!! I have noticed, and been told by other members, that we are getting a little bit lax in keeping up with safety standards.

I mention this only because we have excellent facilities at our disposal that will be gone in a heartbeat if we are faced with any kind of accident lawsuit. So please keep this in mind as you ponder your own abilities to fly a particular airplane.

As an example, here are a few of the things I have personally observed and have been reported to me by others (and yes been guilty of some myself!)

- Taking off and landing before being "soloed" by a certified instructor.
- O People should not have to duck for cover or be uncomfortable while you are in the air. If you are not sure of yourself, at a minimum, have an experienced person with you to talk you through the maneuvers.
- Flying close to or over the pits





HISTORY RE-VISITED

As you may have heard, flying examples of two World War II aircraft visited Jack Poage Field in Westminster in early October. The B-17 Flying Fortress and the B-24 Liberator are extremely rare airplanes these days and though there are about a dozen B-17s restored and airworthy, this B-24, *Witchcraft*, of the Collings Foundation is the only B-24 flying today in the world.

American Industry produced more than 18,300 B-24 Liberators during WW II, Approximately 5,000 more than the famed Flying Fortress. It was notoriously difficult to fly. There were no creature comforts. At 20,000 feet temperatures dropped to as low as 40 degrees or more below zero, and the aircraft was neither heated nor pressurized. The cost of an Allied victory was high. More than 50,000 airmen perished in WW II. Think about it.

The B-24 visiting Westminster represented the legendary *Witchcraft* that held the 8th Air Force record for 130 completed combat missions without the loss of any crew. It was in the company of the Collings Foundation B-17, *Nine-O-Nine*, another storied name in WW II aviation history.

Witchcraft served with the 467th Bomb Group in Great Britain from 1944 to 1945. On April 10, 1943 the group began combat operations against Nazi targets in Occupied Europe including harbor facilities at Kiel, chemical plants at Bonn, textile factories at Stuttgart, power plants at Hamm, steel works at Osnabruck, and numerous other targets vital to the enemy's war effort. The final combat mission for the 467th took place on April 25, 1945. The 467th Bomb Group lost 243 crews while flying from UK bases.

The original *Witchcraft* was scrapped after the war, but thanks to the Collings Foundation, the name lives on. One had the privilege of buying a ride in either of these great airplanes while they were here. It was a rare and wonderful opportunity for a veteran airman to re-live his experience of sixty years ago.

Which is Better: PPM vs PCM

by Ed Olszewski

Aside from all the other choices when selecting an RC radio system, the terms PPM and PCM comes up. PPM or Pulse Position Modulation is standard FM. The next step up is PCM or Pulse Code Modulation which seems to be shrouded in mysticism. In a nutshell, it is not what frequency each is on, but how they use their frequencies.

To demystify PCM somewhat you should understand that there is no range increase with PCM, It is not on some special side band or frequency. It shares the exact same FM frequency everyone else on your channel is using, and is susceptible to the same interference. There is, however, improvement in noise reduction and safe performance while the noise is received.

Noise is the undesirable signals on your frequency. They can be caused by anything from sunspots to another transmitter horning in on your frequency. Today's modern radios operate on a narrow band that eliminates most of the random noise.

Basically, the PCM radio takes your FM signal and "codes" it digitally (the "C" in PCM). Then the PCM receiver "decodes" the signal to utilize it.

Since noise is not a normally recognized code, it is ignored by the PCM receiver, and is not sent as servo instructions. In addition PCM does not transmit position signals for each servo in each transmitter pulse. Rather it transmits movement commands as required, and occasional positions confirmation commands. Short periods of interference will simply leave the servo at its last known position, and not show such radio interference as glitches or fluttering. If your PCM receiver continuously receives interference past the preset time, it then switches into "failsafe mode," and obeys some preset commands you programmed in the receiver. For example, you may set failsafe to throttle down and move all other surfaces to the neutral position. This is great if you are in level flight, but disastrous if you are exiting a loop. If set to continue the last command, it will often keep your model in the loop. Unfortunately, failsafe settings will put your model in a precarious situation you didn't want it locked into.

A third level of protection may be obtained by using a pilot assist module in combination with preset positions on the failsafe settings. You can help ensure your model will go to level flight at a slow—but safe—airspeed and hopefully safely ride out the interference.

Even though the radio does not glitch, it is not to say the PCM radio was in good contact at all times. If another radio is transmitting on your frequency, it can—and likely will—interfere with your receiver's ability to receive the proper signal from your transmitter. The CB radio enthusiast in the seventies used to call this being "walked on." PCM will help keep your receiver from acting on a bad signal, but there is nothing it can do if a good signal can not be received over the interference.

The logic of PCM is that it is better to momentarily do nothing than act on a bad signal. PCM benefits are purely in precise transmitter/receiver communication. PCM does, unfortunately, have a serious weakness. Even minimal atmospheric or external noise can foul up those wonderful intricate binary numbers beyond any correction. In that case, the receiver is up a creek without a paddle. Think of it as if trying to communicate a grocery list via cell phone in a "one bar" area—some things are not going to make it in the grocery cart. With PCM the main purpose is to hide glitches by

Continued from page 3 - not transmitting them to a control surface command. As far as the pilot is concerned, there is only an unnoticeable momentary loss of control. If the radio interference is persistent, the pilot will probably be unaware and may lead to total loss of control sending the airplane either into the wild blue yonder or to the ground.

On the other hand, the simple PPM pulses may be corrupted with some information getting through. When things go bad, the choice is between no control (PCM)—and some control (PPM), Most RC pilots would prefer having some control even if erratic. When a model aircraft is suddenly doing the funky chicken, it is normally a signal to land,

Most radio interferences are normally small glitches and are recoverable, giving the PPM pilot a chance to land and find the cause of the problem.

The bottom line is if you are looking for a bullet-proof radio system to keep your airplane from falling from the sky, it does not exist. A system sporting PCM is an excellent choice for larger acrobatic and 3-D fliers with quick throws, where a small glitch may send it suddenly into the ground. PCM will of course work on smaller, more docile airplanes. These airplanes will benefit less from the added features, and PPM is probably a good bet.

Remember there is no substitute for a good battery charge and a range check. If another radio on your frequency is turned on, there is little any radio can do to keep you from being "shot down."

Fast Charging: Will it Harm My Packs?

First, let's define fast charge. The industry standard is any charge rate that will charge the cells in one hour or less. This fast charge capability thing is very interesting. Almost all Ni-Cds manufactured to-day for RC systems can accept fast charge (up to C rate, that's the rate at which you can charge the cells in approximately one hour).

Cells that are specifically sold as fast chargeable go through another step in the process. This step involves charging a sample from the production lot, and then measuring the end of charge voltage. Cells with the highest end of charge voltage are then analyzed for internal pressure. If the internal pressure is acceptable—that is not above a preset limit—the whole production lot is blessed as being fast chargeable. Of course this adds a finite amount of cost to the cell as they must be "formed" prior to being shipped in order to be fast chargeable.

Cells not destined for fast charge applications are shipped "unformed" by some manufacturers. The first charge after the assembly is what "forms" the cell. When you charge your RC system packs for the first time you are "forming" them. That is why the instructions tell you to charge the packs for 16 to 24 hours before you first use the system.

So in most instances you are safe fast charging the RC packs (transmitter or receiver) on the market if you first make sure they get a good first cycle formation charge—24 hours at a slow rate.

Where the problems arise is that some of the fast charge systems available are a little sloppy when it comes to terminating the fast charge, or they are pushing the cells too hard (higher than the C rate charge) and then damage occurs.

As a rule of thumb if your packs are not getting hot (slightly warm is okay) you are not damaging them in the fast-charge process. When pushing too much current into cells not designed to accept it there is the risk of driving the cells above 1.6 volts (the hydrogen-over-voltage point) and electrolyzing the water in the electrolyte and generating hydrogen. This is a cumulative event and repeated fast charge at these rates will result in sufficient accumulation of hydrogen to cause the cells to vent. When they do vent, there is a chance that the chemical balance will be disturbed and the cell capacity will fade.

Understand that the pack may not be fully charged when the fast charge terminates. It is a good practice, if you are going to fast charge frequently, to top off the packs using the slow charger. This will bring all cells to the same state of charge and "balance" the pack. Otherwise the cell that is not fully charged will be the limiting cell on the next discharge. This continues until there is a major unbalance in the pack and one cell can be driven into reverse (if you don't crash first).


