

# Antoinette build part 2



This part of the Antoinette build deals with the tail feathers and the landing gear. This will be told primarily with pictures as most everything is basic cut and glue on the tail section. The landing gear is a little more complex.

First the tail. The only real work here was the lamination of two 1/8" balsa sheets to fabricate the curved outside stringers on the horizontal stabilizer and elevator. The wood used was all 1/4" square sticks and 1/4" sheet for gussets. The trailing edge of the horizontal and vertical stabilizers and the leading edges of the elevator and rudder being 1/4" square spruce.



The vertical stabilizer and rudder is about as simple as it gets, all straight sticks.

The landing gear is an assembly consisting of a 1/2" dowel main strut, 3/16" main axel, 1/8" side strut supports and fabricated assemblies to tie the gear to the main center post as well as landing gear, nose skid, and flying wire contact points. The plans called for 1/8" wire for the main axle but I decided to upgrade to 3/16" music wire for strength. The main gear assembly was made on a jig and brazed together. The sleeve assemblies were made from 1/2" copper tubing and copper sheet. These were assembled by soldering.



My latest foray into insanity is a scratch build of a 1/8th scale Sikorsky S-39 Amphibian. # Passing of a Legend - From excerpt by Linnea

Crowther (Legacy.com)

Chuck Yeager (1923–2020), first human to go faster than the speed of sound.

Yeager enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Forces just months before the U.S. entered World War II. Soon after his enlistment, Yeager's supervisors discovered his unusually keen eyesight – his 20/10 vision made him a natural as a fighter pilot. Flying for the Allies in the war, Yeager became an ace, shooting down at least five enemy aircraft. Indeed, he has the special distinction of "ace in a day," with five shot down in a single day, Oct. 12, 1944. Shot down over France, he escaped with the help of the French Resistance and was honored with the Bronze Star for aiding another airman in his escape.

#### Faster than the speed of sound

As the war ended, Yeager had risen to second lieutenant and chose to stay with the Army Air Forces, soon to become its own military branch, renamed the U.S. Air Force. He became a test pilot at Muroc Army Air Field (now Edwards Air Force Base) in California. Highly skilled at his work, Yeager was chosen to be the test pilot who would attempt to fly faster than the speed of sound in his Bell X-1, named "Glamorous Glennis" after his wife, the former Glennis Faye Dickhouse, whom he had married in 1945. Two days before his revolutionary flight was planned, Yeager fell from a horse, breaking two ribs. He kept the injury quiet from his superiors, determined to go ahead with his flight. Though Yeager needed help sealing the hatch of his plane, so painful was his injury, he still took off Oct. 14, 1947, becoming "the fastest man on Earth" as he broke the sound barrier by flying at Mach 1.07. His "Glamorous Glennis" X-1 is now displayed in the Smithsonian Institution's National Air and Space Museum. In the years that followed, Yeager continued testing the boundaries of flight, achieving ever-greater speed records.

# Brigadier General Yeager

In the 1950s and '60s, Yeager commanded squadrons, rising to colonel and later to brigadier general. He worked in Spain, the Philippines, Pakistan and beyond before his 1975 retirement. In the years after his retirement, he continued flying for the Air Force and NASA in some capacity, as well as performing test flights on light aircraft for Piper Aircraft.



## **Smooth Operator** - Andy Myers

During the weekend of January 9th, I braved the cold weather at Baugher Field to stretch my thumbs and fly my **Eflite Carbon Z Cub SS 2.1M.** This is one of my absolute favorite planes to fly and performs very well in all weather conditions.



Side Note — I've been a member of W.A.M. since April 2020 and I'm the current club President.



The plane utilizes a top hatch and battery tray which is removable and adjustable, it snaps into place using a retainer tab. The tray can accommodate anywhere from a 3200 mah to 7000 mah battery. I use a 6000 mah 6S pack which yields a 7-8 min flight time. The cost of the 6000 6S pack is \$85. Pictured is my SMART 5000 mah battery which provides telemetry data to my iX12 Tx on pack voltage, temp, and individual cell data.

I purchased the plane from Tim West earlier this year. This bird has no bad tendencies and can fly anywhere from very scale like to semi-3D. The extended ailerons and curved wing tips allow for extremely short STOLs and turns literally on a dime. Some of my favorite flying is simulating that of the "drunken farmer routine" often displayed at airshows. The 6S power allows for near vertical takeoffs and loops. The landing gear has been greatly improved over the previous version, being completely articulate and the soft over-sized tires make touch and goes wonderful. This plane has an 84.6-inch wing which classifies this plane as Giant Scale.

The plane sports a Eflite BL50 Electric Motor, 60 amp ESC, and uses a 3200-7000mAh 6S battery pack for power. Incorporates a Spektrum AR636 6-channel Rx w/AS3X and can be used to tow a sailplane with the optional tow hook and servo.



The giant scale plane sits on the flight bench perfectly and the wings come off in two pieces with a carbon fiber rod, no tools are required for assembly.



The plane must be seen in person to appreciate the size. Electric foam planes have come a long way in the last decade. The price new is \$429 BNF, which is a deal if you ask me!

# **Builder's Corner** - Andy Myers

Continuing on with my Sig Four Star 60 project, wing has been completed and finishing touches are in the works. The covering didn't happen exactly as planned, the plane will make a good 20-footer, but will never win any prizes for beauty. Installed Hitec 425bb standard servos in the ailerons connected by Sullivan quality Gold-n-clevises, 4-40 rods, and Sullivan hinges.



Modifying the plans from Sig, I removed a bay from both sides of the wing shortening from 71" to 64" which should help the roll rate. I planked and glassed the center section of the wing with 0.5 oz Sig brand cloth and sanded to finish. I had to make custom hatches for the aileron servos as the ones supplied were crap. Aligning the wing hold down bolts with the fuse was fun! I tapped the hold down blocks with a 1/4-inch/20 thread steel tap and hardened with thin CA. Worked well.





New offering from Horizon Hobby includes a new FW-190 A-8 from Eflite (One of my favorite WWII Planes). This plane is a 1.5M version similar to the Mustang offered in 2020 (see Tim West's plane in previous Talespinners). This one has an improved landing gear that includes a plastic backplate on the top of the wing to adsorb the impact. I noticed this was problem spot on Tim West's Mustang after hard landings. It uses the same 6S 5000 mah packs and incorporates the latest SMART telemetry features. The wing is a 3-piece setup that snaps apart and back on with no tools. The plane incorporates functional lights in the wing and tail. The hatch is also greatly improved with plastic hardening the edges to prevent paint chips and wear. All in all this an impressive foam plane that is worth every penny of \$500. -AM

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



LEDs line the inside of the canopy and throughout the plane itself. These lights can be actuated and light up for night flying.

Doug purchased the plane from Tim West earlier this year. This plane is very popular in the club as John Snyder, Paul Schaffner, and Steve Hare also own one. All four planes sport the same orange color as well. You know them make them in green too guys!

The plane sports a Potenza 500KV Electric Motor, 100 amp ESC, and uses a 6200mAh 6S battery pack for power. Wing configuration can be set to crow for extremely slow descents as demonstrated by Paul Schaffner.

# **Builder's Corner** - Andy Myers

Continuing on with my Sig Four Star 60 project, covering has continued and decals were installed on the fuselage. The tail feathers have been constructed and covered as well. To attach the control surfaces, I used Robart 1/8th metal pin hinges and the Robart jig to install.



Modifying the plans from Sig, I installed an elevator servo in the rear of the plane. Also installed a Sullivan 15 lb pull-pull kit for rudder control. The plane is really starting to come together. Sig Kits are very straight forward in design and the laser cut parts make it easy to assemble. I installed a "tiller style" tailwheel steering setup which turned out great.





# What's New On The Work Bench — Andy Myers



I bought a Top Flite 60 Size Gold Edition F4U Corsair at the Flea Market for about \$125 and included Century Jet Retracts— great deal. The plane was about 75% completed and I'm taking it the rest of the way. My plan is to use this plane to get acquainted with this type and train with it to learn to fly the Giant Scale Version which I also recently acquired. I'll have both the 60 size and 1/5th Scale Giant size TF Kits to compare:-) I've gone ahead installed my pilot, glued the canopy, and covered the fuse with Insignia Blue Monokote. Also cut out a hatch to install a control panel which I made (shown in the picture). Also bought all the goodies (DLE 20RA gas engine, Robart Air Tanks, Fortitude Gas tank). Also painted the firewall and canopy with Jadeite Green Folk Art Acrylic Paint.

I used a Miracle CNC Aluminum Low Vibration motor mount and installed the DLE 20RA Gas Engine. Installed specialize 3D printed mounts (from Morgan's Custom 3D printed parts) for the DLE ignition and retainer clips for the harness, neat and tidy.



Control panel will be removable through the hatch. The panel includes a Miracle II Dual Switch for Rx and Ignition, Robart Air Inlet Valve for the retracts, Robart Pressure Gauge, and Fuel Dot. I then epoxied the labels in place.





# **Building an Antoinette Monoplane**— Jim Hodges

In 1965, at the age of 12, my parents and I went to see the movie Those Magnificent Men and Their Flying Machines in 70 mm wide screen format. Being an aircraft enthusiast and model builder I was totally entranced by the antique planes flying in the movie not completely realizing that a good deal of the aerial shots were of models although many of the planes were reproductions that flew successfully. After seeing the movie I became interested in the Antoinette mono plane, one of the British entries in the movie. Why I am not completely sure, I think it was because with all the bi, tri, and plane with too many wings to count it stood out being a graceful looking single wing creation. From the day I saw the movie I wanted to build and fly an Antoinette so now 56 years later I put it in my bucket list and have started down that runway.

Antoinette began as a private venture led by the engineer Léon Levavasseur and financed by Jules Gastambide, who owned an el Antoinette electricity generating station in Algeria. While on holiday with Gastambide and his family in 1902, Levavasseur expressed his interest in the emerging field of aviation and proposed the development of light, powerful engines for use in aircraft. Levavasseur then suggest-





ed to Gastambide's daughter, Antoinette, that the engines should be named after her. La Sociéete Antoinette was incorporated in 1906, with Gastambide as president and Levavasseur as technical director.

Aviation pioneer Louis Blériot was the vicepresident.

Levavasseur experimented with the construction of aircraft and in 1906 the Antoinette company was contracted to build an aircraft for

Captain Ferdinand Ferber. In 1908 Blériot tried to dissuade the directors of Antoinette from becoming aircraft manufacturers, fearing that they would begin competing against him for customers. Blériot left the company when his advice was ignored.

In the spring of 1909, Latham made several impressive flights. This convinced Levavasseur that Latham could cross the English Channel in an Antoinette aircraft and win the *Daily Mail* prize for doing so. Latham made two attempts to cross the English Channel in July 1909, both of which were unsuccessful due to engine failure while over the Channel. Between Latham's attempts, former Antoinette vice-president Blériot successfully crossed the Channel in his own aircraft.

My current adventure begins with the purchase of the plans for the 96 inch wing span model from AMA Plans Service. The plans come on four sheets, two fuselage (one top view & one side view) and two wing

drawings. This was one wing panel on two sheets that needed to be matched up and joined together. To compound the issue the plans have been reproduced so many times the lines did not all line up and the amount of distortion varied between sheets. The fuselage was not too bad, redrawing some of the longitudinal lines in red so they would not be confused with the printed lines worked out well. The tail was not a

problem. The wing however I had to redraw from scratch so I made the wing drawing one sheet. I also traced out the ribs so I could get prints made for templates. After making all the necessary drawings I went to Staples and had copies made. Since there was only one wing panel drawing I had them also copy the drawing upside down. Now I have a left and a right wing panel drawing. Fuselage side view top

The build starts with the fuselage. The formers, found on the side view drawing, were traced then the tracing was stick glued to the 1/8 balsa sheet and cut out. The formers were finished with  $1/8 \times 1/4$  strips on both sides for strength. The centers were cut out to lighten the weight and holes drilled for the push rods. The fuselage is built upside down on the top view plan. The formers are glued to the upper longerons then the

bottom longeron (keel) is glued to the bottom of the formers. Keeping everything straight and square. Once the frame is complete and the push rods tubes are installed and the sides are covered with 1/16th balsa sheet. Forward of former 7 the sides get an overlay of 1/16th ply. Rear of former 7 the 1/16th sheet has triangular cut outs for strength, lightening, and simulating the plywood of the full scale plane. The top of the fuselage back to former 7 gets 2 hatches and a plywood cover. From the nose to former 3 the hatch covers the battery compartment, the fuel tank, and the throttle servo and will have the dummy engine built up and over the top half of the fuel tank. Former 3 to 5 is covered with the main hatch that serves as

the wing mount as well as covering the elevator and rudder servo. Five to 7 is the area where the pilot sat on the top of the fuselage and the control wheels are mounted..

Fitting the gear was fairly straight forward but space is limited as you can see.

I still have work to do on the fuselage and then I'll start on the tail. Hope to have all that for next month.



# **Builder's Corner** - Andy Myers

Finally finished with my Sig Four Star 60 project, including soldering the aileron 4-40 threaded rods to the gold-n-clevis connections. Dialed in all the servos and centered for maiden flight. Added an Ultimate 2.5 inch Tru-Turn Spinner and 14x6 MA Prop. Added a 2200 mAh SMART LiFe battery for the Spektrum AR20310 PowerSafe Rx & On-board Glow driver. I'm very happy with the setup, next is to get the CG right and tune the OS FS 91 Surpass.



Originally, I was going to install a cowl from Fiberglass Specialties, but the color I painted it didn't match and looked awful so I left it off. I got the 1/6 scale 'Pilot' on eBay for 8 bucks which works great. I trimmed the canopy to fit adding 4 screws on each side for maintenance if needed. Now that I've finished this project, it's on to the next which is a Sig 1/6 scale RC-3 Kit Cub. My Plans are to create a 'Penn State' themed covering job. The OS FS 52 Surpass in the photo is coming off, and being replaced with an OS FS 40, as the 52 is too big.







Have you considered an alternative to the Spektrum Ecosystem? If so, you should look at Jeti Transmitters and Receivers





graming. With Jeti, everything is user configurable. IF you can dream what you'd like your transmitter to do, it can likely be done with Jeti. The software is solid and logical. All the physical switches and knobs can be rearranged. Custom voice callouts can be programed for any switch or by timer. There are over 40 sensors that can be added for user configured features including battery capacity, fuel capacity, Engine RPM, Temp, Altitude, and the list goes on. The hardware is made in the Czech Republic and is of high quality—see to the left. They show you what's on the inside. The gimbals are hall-effect magnetic and last a lifetime. This all comes at a higher cost than Spektrum but the benefit is piece of mind that what your getting is solid and can do just about anything you'd like. The Tx battery is LiOn. The standard transmitter uses 3 redundant antenna signals (two which at 2.4 ghz and one which 900 mhz). Higher end models use up to 5. This is far superior to Spektrum. All Rx's can be extended using satellite Rx's. Everything they make is "Smart"

In today's age of computer technology our Tx's haven't changed much,

until now. I bought a Spektrum iX12

about a year ago and was just not happy with the user experience. The

me wrong. It just was limited and

# What's New On The Work Bench — Andy Myers



Continuing on with the Top Flite Corsair 60 project, I finished installing the wingtips and covering using monokote over the entire plane. I installed the Century Jet air retracts and tested the valve and lines.



The finished plane assembled for the first time. The DLE 20RA engine fit perfectly inside the factory cowl which I cut for the exhaust. It sports a 17x8 propeller from Valley View RC. I put a four-blade 18x8x4 prop on for static display.



The hatch and control panel I installed within the fuse and uses a set of magnets to attach the door. The switches, fuel dot, pneumatic gage, and air inlet are all labeled.
